DISASTER TO NORTHERN ONTARIO WORSE THAN FIRST REPORTED

North Bay Reports Many Towns Menaced Along the C. P. R. -Great Distress Prevails at Cochrane.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
North Bay, Ont., July 12. — Thirty lives, it is known, have been lost in the fires which raged over the Porcupine District. The dead include Captain White, of West Dome, and his whole family. Dozens of persans have been injured. A big hospital train is now being rushed into the north country, with doctors and medical supplies. Its destination is Iroquois Falls. Every train that arrives brings news that the disaster is one of the worst in the history of the Province.


BAILEY BLOCKED VOTE ON RECIPROCITY



For Hot Weather.

Dig a hole in the cellar, three feet long, eighteen inches wide and nine inches deep, and with cement and sand make a concrete wall around, for the box and also for the floor. Proportions of cement and sand are as follows: One part cement and five parts of sand, mixed with water. When finished, put a wooden lid over all. Its purpose is to keep milk and butter cool in hot weather. You will find the butter will come out of that place just right for the table and, of course, other things can be put into it just as well. The lid over it keeps the warm air in the cellar from coming into contact with the articles, and conserves the cold inside of the receptacle.



MICHIGAN TOWNS ARE IN ASHES

Oscoda and Au Sable Destroyed by the Flames.

THOUSANDS SHELTERLESS

Relief Trains Plunge Through Walls of Fire to Reach Stricken

[Canadian Press.] Detroit, July 12.-Early reports to day from the fire-swept district of Northern Michigan say that several settlers' families and lumber cam crews near Wolverine and several families near Gaylord are missing (the two towns of Oscoda and Au Sable only a school and two dwellings in the south end of Au Sable are left standing. Reports continue to be received

of possible loss of life. Towns in Ashes.

Bay City, Mich., July 12.- The twin towns of Oscoda and Au Sable, opposite each other, at the meuth of the Au Sable river, and having a combined population of 1,800 people, are in ashes, while such of its inhabitants as have not escaped on board the steamer Kongo, or the Detroit and Marine City relief trains, are shelter-less in the swamp and helds about the burning towns.


