LONDON'S NEW HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN



First Appeal of Its Kind Made Since Organization — Controversy Between Poles and Lithuanians Will Be Carefully Considered As Latter May Not Abide by Decision.

Paris, Scpt. 18.—For the first time since its organization the council of the League of Nations has been asked to arbitrate between two nations in an endeavor to avoid war. The council deliberated yesterday afternoon on the Lithuanian dispute. Ignace Jan Paderewski, former premier of Poland, presented the Polish viewpoint of the controversy, and Professor Woldemar, foreign minister, gave Lithuania's side of the disagreement. foreign minister, gave Lithuania's side of the disagreement.

No decision is expected to be arrived at by the council before next week, and perhaps later. The league is proceeding cautiously, as it has been intimated that Lithuania might not abide by the decision of the council if it were unfavorable to the Lithuanian viewpoint.

Paris, Sept. 18.—Finland and Sweden have agreed to accept the intervention of the League of Nations for the settlement of the dispute between them as to the possession of the Aland Islands, lying at the mouth of the Gulf of Bothnia between the two countries. A commission will be appointed by the executive council of the league to investigate the question and reach an early decision. Acceptance of the council as arbitrator is regarded by the members of the council as a long step toward the recognition of the league by the nations of the world as a medium for the prevention of future wars.

Attorney-General Palmer Declares Every Possible Effort Will Be Made To Find the Criminals Responsible For Thursday's Tragedy-Little Importance Attached To Arrest of Edwin Fischer At Hamilton

Sept. 18.—Convinced that the explosion which snuffed out the lives of 35 persons and injured nearly 300 others in Wall street Thursday noon was deliberately planned by radicals, officials of the department of justice, headed by Attorney-General Palmer himself, today spread a dragnet ever the country in efforts to trap its originators.

ATTEMPT TO ENTER BANK AT BEACHVILLE STOPPED BY SHOTS

Bank Employee Roused From Sleep Scares Away Would-Be Thieves.

WOODSTOCK. Sept. 17.—Early this morning robbers attempted to force their way into the Merchants Bank at Beachville. They were discovered in the act of forcing in the window, and fled when a bank employee, 'aroused from his slumbers, fired at them through a window. CANADIAN CREDITS TO EUROPEAN NATIONS WILL BE WOUND UP

After Middle of November Only Open Credit Will Be For Timber.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Sept. 17. - Canadian credits to European countries will be wound up by the middle of November, when outstanding contracts for serges and freizes have been filled. After that the only open credit will be that for timber, for which an amount of \$50,000,000 was provided. Of the amount, Great Britain took up \$23,458,839.

A total of \$157,000,000 in credits was set aside by the Government. Of this amount something in the neighborhood of \$65,000,000 has been taken up.

The following are the amounts in detail: Rumania, \$20,483,676; Greece, \$7,121,300; Italy, \$6,000,000; France, \$5,000,000; Belgium, \$1.772,206; Great Britain (for timber), \$23,458,839. Every livery stable in the city is being tanvassed to determine whether a horse and truck are missing. Examination of the horse's body disclosed that it had been newly-clipped and shod. This and a mark on the horse's shoes furnish the only clues to its identity. Conflicting descriptions of the wagon itself have been received by the police. All available bits of the vehicle have been taken to police headquarters, where efforts are being made to reconstruct the vehicle sufficiently to determine its exact type. A cursory examination indicates it was of unusual breadth, which leads Detective Chief Coughlin to believe it was of the type used in transporting crates of eggs. Official opinion is almost unanimous that it was not the regular type of wagon used in the transportation of power or explosives through city streets.

Good Description.

One of the best descriptions of the mysterious vehicle was furnished by Lawrence Serbin, who, with his partner, was engaged in selling chocolates to the midday crowd from a corner of Nassau and Wall street, less than 300 feet from the scene of the explosion. He declared the cart came from New street, and was driven by a man who spoke with a pronounced Scottish accent.

Just before 12 o'clock Thursday noon, Serbin said, he and his partner were doing business on Broad street, where the new stock exchange building is being built, when they were chased away by a man in civilian clothes, whom they took to be an officer. "My wagon was on the right side of Wall street, looking toward Broad," he added, "and across the street from me was an automobile. We began to do a good business with the noon crowds; then someone sang out to me in a Scotch accent, 'Pull your horse up, buddy.' I looked up at him and his wagon.

"He must have come from New street ecause I was watching the cop or Broadway all the time. My partner was doing the selling. If he came down Wail street I couldn't have missed him. When I pulled out of the way he went straight down Wall street, and about a minute later I was knocked down and

didn't remember anything until I came to in the Broad street hospital.

"The wagon was a bum work wagon with dark, dirty red paint, something like a dirt wagon, and about twice the size of those used by street cleaners. It was a rusty red color, and was drawn by an old brown hosse.

Much interest has been aroused over the Japanese building program, which calls for construction of eight superdreadnaughts and eight battle cruisers—the eight-eight program, as it is termed.

Four 40,000 ton dreadnaughts are being built, the Akagi, Amagi, Atago and Atako. It is said that they are being built under cover of the greatest secrecy, as were the superdreadnaughts Negato and Mutsu. 



Officially nothing so good has ever been accomplished before, though Thomson came to Antwerp credited with having done 14 2-5 seconds at home over practically the same distance. The world's previous best was 15 seconds, by F. C. Smithson, running for America in the Olympic games in 1908. Thomson, who is a Canadian, is the most wonderful hurdler ever seen. It is not possible to find in all athletic history a man who possessed such phenomenal speed or one who took fences flying as he does. He is a freak. Even to run at lightning speed as he did this afternoon, seemed ridiculously easy; he kind of played ninepins with the five men who were his competitors; and these five, representing America, New Zealand, and Sweden, were great and distinguished hurdlers. Like Thomson in the heats, Harold Barrow, America, had equalled record: Walter Smith and Fred Murray, his fellow-countryman Wilson. New Zealand, and Christienssen, Sweden, may be regarded as tremendous fellows, but from the crack of the pistol to the breaking of the tape they were almost as selling platers to a Derby winner compared with Thomson. 



Work of Draft Evaders.

The resolution of the Toronto Trades and Labor Council recommending that the workers of Canada align themselves with the workers' political parties of other countries, and that they base their platform on advocacy of an industrial system of production for use instead of for profit, and that the congress grant \$5,000 to the provincial labor party to be spent for educational purposes to attain this, was sponsored by James Simpson, who explained that what was really sought was a nationalization of industries the same as had been successfully tried in Queensland, Australia and New Zealand.

P. M. Draper, the secretary, however, thought that what was really the object of the resolution was \$5,000 from the congress treasury and supported the recommendation of the committee that the resolution be not concurred in, and the convention voted noncorrence.

Other features of the day were election of officers, resulting in the reelection of President Tom Moore, and Secretary-treasurer P. M. Draper by acclamation, the selection of Winnipeg as the next place of meeting, the adoption of the report of the committee on resolutions, condemning any attempt to enforce the anti-loading law and an address by J. E. Davidson. The British fraternal delegate, in his address, predicted a general election in Great Britain within a month and reiterated his declaration of yesterday that the workers of Britain would demand the entire fruits of their labor.

In addition to the discussion on the Irish question and nationalization of industries during the afternoon session the congress passed salary increases to the president of \$1,500, making his salary \$2,000 per annum. Six hundred dollars was voted to the fraternal delegate to the American Federation of Labor, and \$1,500 to the delegate to the British Trades Union Congress.

The consideration of the report of the committee on resolutions was continued on the convention resuming business for its first night session at 8 o'clock.

This was followed by the report of the committee on ways and means, which first recommended that the salary of the president be raised from \$3,500 to \$4,500, and Delegate Burton of Hamilton meved in amendment that it be made \$4,000, which was seconded by Mr. Moore himself.

Secretary-Treasurer Draper then spoke for the adoption of the committee's report, and Henry Barrett of London moved that the increase, instead of being \$1,000, be made \$1,500, and this was carried unanimously, as was the increase of \$500 to Secretary-Treasurer Draper, making his honorarium \$2,000 per annum. A grant of \$600 was made to the fraternal delegate to the American Federation of Labor convention to be held at Denver, and \$1,500 to the fraternal delegate to the British Trades Union Congress, although the committee's recommendation was only for \$1,000.

Heard in an Uproar.





Hospitals Are Still Treating 60,000, Including 1,000 Insane Cases.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Sept. 17 .- That the em ployment of returned soldiers physically fit should in the future be reduced to a civilian basis is the policy now to a civilian basis is the policy now adopted by the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment. Now that the employment branch of the department has practically completed its work it is felt that the regular labor agencies should take up the work and that the returned men who have all their faculties should be treated as civilians and their military service should not be emphasized. This is not meant to apply strictly to such as have been in military hospitals. Some six thousand patients are still being treated. Of these 1,500 are tubercular, 1,000 insane and 103 are incurables. 


