LEAGUE OF NATIONS COUNCIL CALLED UPON TO ARBITRATE DISPUTE AND PREVENT WAR

First Appeal of Its Kind Made Since Organization—Controversy Between Poles and Lithuanians Will Be Carefully Considered As Latter May Not Abide by Decision.

Paris, Sept. 18.—For the first time since its organization the council of the League of Nations has been asked to arbitrate between two nations in an endeavor to avoid war.

Ignace Jan Paderewski, former premier of Poland, presented the Polish viewpoint of the controversy, and Professor Woldegar, foreign minister, gave Lithuania's side of the disagreement.

No decision is expected to be arrived at by the council before next week, and perhaps later. The league is proceeding cautiously, as it has been intimated that Lithuania might not abide by the decision of the council if it were unfavorable to the Lithuanian viewpoint.

DRAGNET SPREAD OVER U. S. IN AN EFFORT TO TRAP ORIGINATORS OF WALL STREET'S BOMB OUTRAGE

Attorney-General Palmer Declares Every Possible Effort Will Be Made To Find the Criminals Responsible For Thursday's Tragedy—Little Importance Attached To Arrest of Edwin Fischer At Hamilton.

New York, Sept. 18.—Convinced that the explosion which snuffed out the lives of 35 persons and injured nearly 200 others at Wall Street Thursday noon was deliberately planned by radicals, officials of the department of justice, headed by Attorney-General Palmer, today spread a dragnet over the country in efforts to trap its originators.

Chief Flynn based his opinion on the finding of radical literature in post-office boxes near the scene of the tragedy. There were still about 150 injured being cared for in hospitals today, many of whom were said to be still in serious condition.

REDS SEND WARNING. EXACT CAUSE OF EXPLOSION STILL REMAINS MYSTERY. NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—The exact cause of the explosion which in the twinkling of an eye yesterday noon transformed Wall Street, near Broad, from a scene of bustling activity to a scene of dreadful carnage, remains tonight a mystery.

Attorney General Palmer said this same precaution was in vogue throughout the United States to make sure of thwarting any possible radical movement of the country-wide scope.

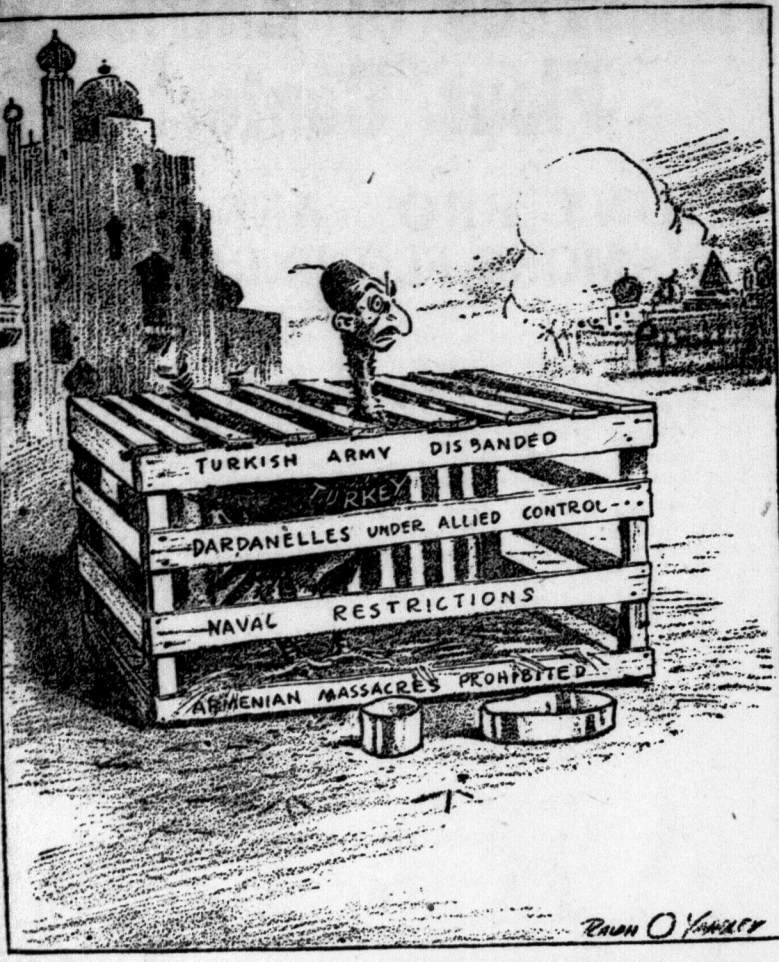

Good Description. One of the best descriptions of the mysterious vehicle was furnished by Lawrence Serbin, who, with his partner, was engaged in selling chocolates to the midday crowd from a corner of Nassau and Wall street, less than 300 feet from the scene of the explosion.

Came from New Street. "He must have come from New street because I was watching the cop on Broadway all the time. My partner was doing the selling. If he came down Wall street I pulled out of the way he went straight down Wall street, and about a minute later I was knocked down and didn't remember anything until I came to in the Broad street hospital."

"The wagon was a bum work wagon with dark, dirty red paint, something like a dirt wagon, and about twice the size of those used by street cleaners. It was a rust red color, and was drawn by an old brown horse."

"The driver was a dark complexioned, unshaven man, probably 35 or 40 years old, and dressed in working clothes and a dark cap. He seemed to be about five feet six inches tall. He had dark hair."

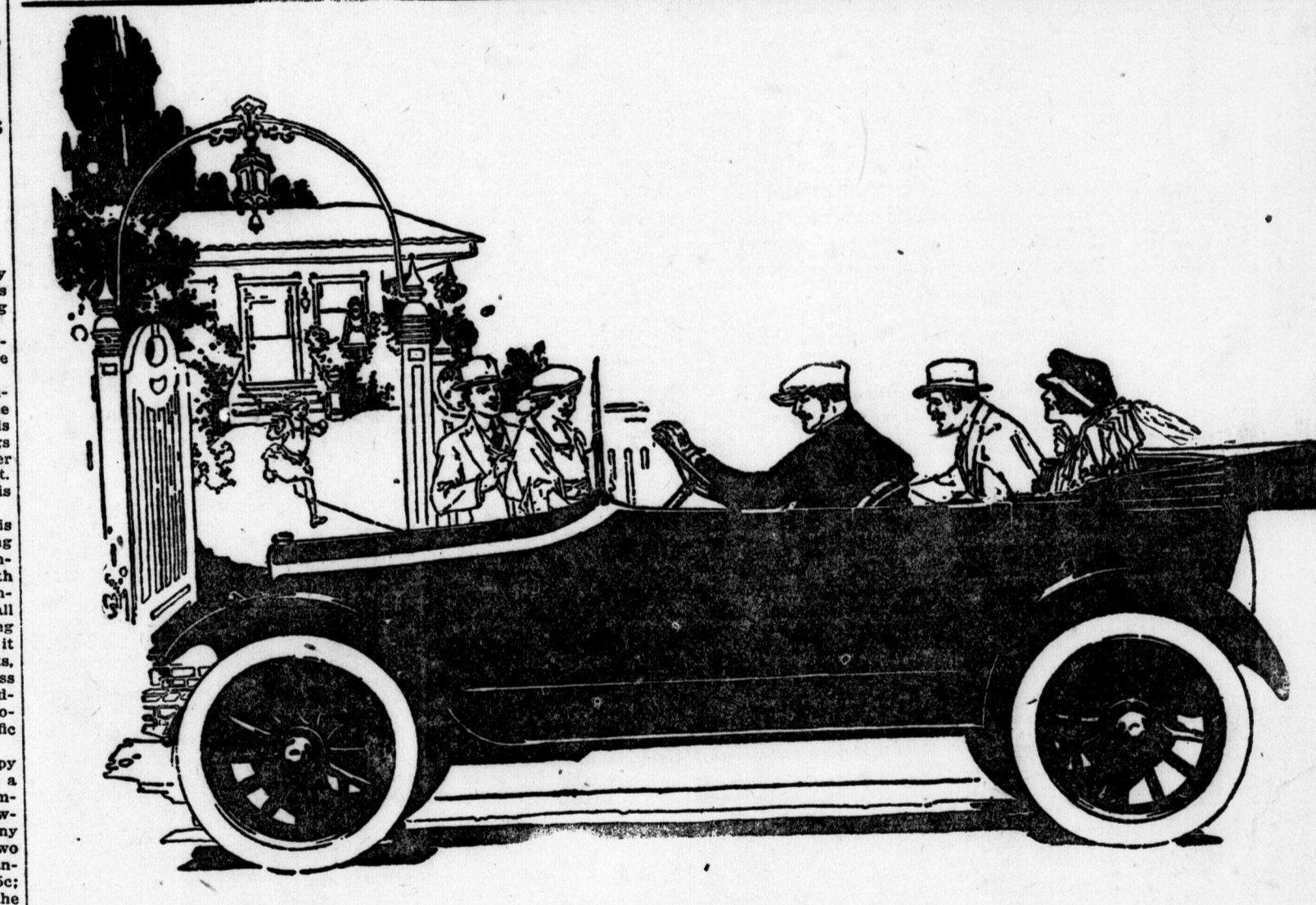

EXPERT DISCUSSES

DETROIT-WINDSOR BRIDGE PROPOSITION

Outlines Plan For Harbor Development—70 Clerks Get Wage Increase.

BIG SCOUT RALLY

WINDSOR, Sept. 18.—Plans for making a great harbor on the Detroit River at Windsor and Detroit were discussed at a meeting of the Detroit City Club committee in the Board of Commerce this tonight, at which Charles Ewan Fowler, noted bridge and harbor engineer and promoter of the proposed Windsor-Detroit bridge, which is to link the two countries, outlined plans that would assist in developing the water fronts of the cities to enable them to take full advantage of the opportunities the deepening of the river has to offer in the St. Lawrence River and the Great Lakes system will afford export trade from this section and the western states and provinces.

The proposed long span bridge that is to be built crossing the river is to be incorporated into the general harbor scheme of the two cities, and it was with this aspect in mind that Mr. Fowler dealt particularly.

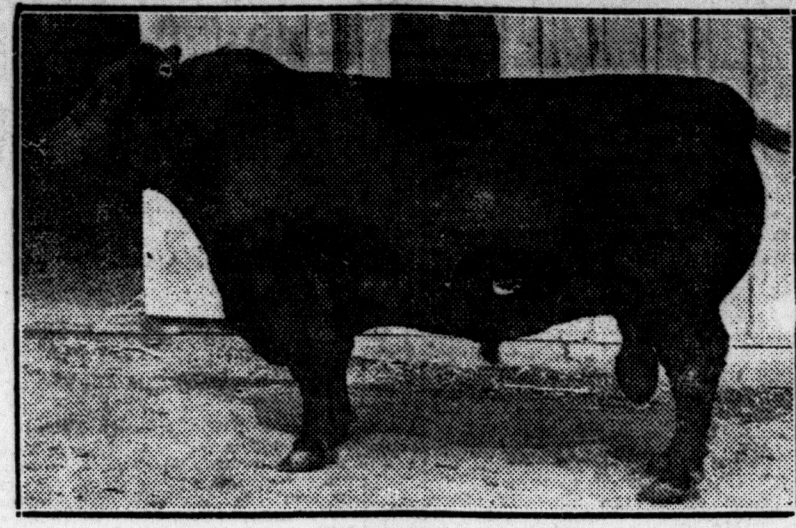

Japan's Eight-Eight Program. Much interest has been aroused over the Japanese building program, which calls for construction of eight super-dreadnaughts and eight battle cruisers—the eight-eight program, as it is termed.

Four 40,000-ton dreadnaughts are being built, the Akagi, Amagi, Atago and Akiaki. It is said that they are being built under cover of the greatest secrecy, as were the superdreadnaughts Negato and Mutsu. Figures obtainable show the following comparative measurements of the Akagi class with the United States Saratoga class: Akagi Class—Full load displacement, 40,000 tons; speed, 30 knots per hour; main battery, eight 16-inch guns; shaft horsepower not definitely known. The Saratoga Class—Full load displacement, 35,500 tons; speed, 32.25 knots per hour; main battery, eight 16-inch guns; shaft horsepower, 180,000.

A comparison of the United States and Japanese fleets in 1923 will show the following: United States—Battleships, 17; 14 inch guns, 84; 16 inch guns, 104; displacement, 624,074 tons. Battle cruisers, 4; 16 inch guns, none; 18 inch guns, 48; displacement, 261,000 tons. Total weight of broadside fire of American battle cruisers, 76,704 pounds.

IRISH RESOLUTION IS DEFEATED BY NATIONALIZATION LABOR CONGRESS

Says Sergt. J. McNamara in Discussion On Russian Resolution At Labor Congress—Resolutions On Ireland and Nationalization of Industries Defeated—Tom Moore and Secretary Draper Re-elected by Acclamation—Heated Discussions Feature of Friday's Sessions.

[By Canadian Press.] Windsor, Sept. 17.—Self-determination for Ireland and the nationalization of industries divided attention as politics interested at today's afternoon session of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada. The convention carried the recommendation of the committee on resolutions in both instances, "that the resolutions be not concurred in."

The Irish question was introduced with the delayed resolution from Toronto, which was No. 86 on the report, and the resolution tracing its parentage to John Thompson of Montreal, 711, International Association of Machinists, and the committee added a rider to their recommendation that the congress reiterate its declaration of the Hamilton convention favoring dominion rule for Ireland, the same as that enjoyed by Canada, Australia, South Africa and other nations within the British Empire.

Work of Draft Evaders. He declared that the crimes committed in Ireland were not the crimes of Irishmen, but inferred that they were the crimes of draft evaders who could not be caught. He said that most of the crimes were committed in the south of Ireland, and that the men who would not kill a man in war, but thought nothing of killing British soldiers in Ireland, were the same men who were now being drafted into the army.

Mr. White declared they should have a padded cell in the Labor Temple in Toronto for the members of the Trades and Labor Council; that it was not representative of organized labor; that the meanest, lowest and dirtiest set of Bolsheviks in the world were sitting on the Toronto Trades and Labor Council, and quoted James Simpson as having said he would rather be sitting on a Soviet council than be a member of the British House of Commons.

At the opening of the afternoon session the report of the committee on union labels was presented, and the recommendation made that the delegates to the convention should be asked to demand goods with the union label.

Secretary-Treasurer Draper then spoke of the adoption of the committee's report, and Henry Barrett of London moved that the increase, instead of \$1,000, be \$2,000. A grant of \$2,000 per annum. A grant of \$2,000 was made to the fraternal delegates to the American Federation of Labor convention to be held at Denver, and \$1,500 to the fraternal delegates to the British Trades Union Congress, although the committee's recommendation was only for \$1,000.

On the reading of the resolution favoring an Irish republic and the recommendation of the committee "that they be not concurred in," John Thompson of Montreal who declared himself an Ulsterman, using all the lung power available to overcome the disorder, which started with a murmur and ended with a roar as his speech proceeded, declared that Ireland didn't want home rule.

GOES TO GENEVA CONFERENCE

W. J. Jeffrey of Saint Ste. Marie, Ont., who terminated the debate by moving that the convention do not pass the resolution presented by the Toronto Trades and Labor Council asking that \$5,000 of the congress' funds be devoted to carrying on propaganda to bring this about, and the convention adjourned until evening.

The Toronto resolution on Russia was taken up on the opening of the evening session and started the first real fireworks of the convention, the committee recommending the deletion of the first part of the resolution dealing with armed intervention in Russia, and substituting one affirming the stand taken by Congress at the Hamilton convention, condemning military intervention in a country which had changed its form of government during the war, and recommending that the workers of Canada align themselves with the workers' political parties of all countries.

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Mr. White continued that the Toronto Trades and Labor Council did not represent 50 per cent of the organized labor in that city, and declared that a few weeks ago a delegate had come from Winnipeg, who was now sitting on the Toronto Trades and Labor Council, and quoted James Simpson as having said he would rather be sitting on a Soviet council than be a member of the British House of Commons.

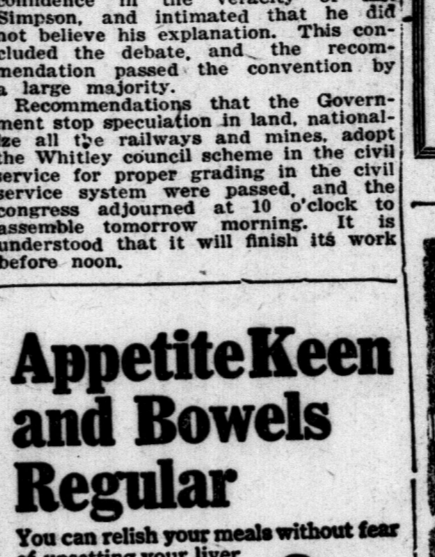
Secretary Joseph McNamara, M.P., of Toronto, a veteran of the great war, coatless and minus one arm, then came forward, ascended half way up the stairs leading to the platform and facing the audience, in an impassioned speech, pleaded the cause of British democracy, for which he had sacrificed an arm, declaring that British democracy would never succumb to the attacks of Sovietism.

"Why don't you go over?" "There would be no Irish question. We wouldn't have to ask England for what we talk about taking it." This was greeted by loud and raucous booms.
