FORGET SCORES HIS OWN

Ottawa, May 1.-Rodolphe Forget (Conservative), expressed the disappointment with which he had sat in the House and listened to the debate on the autonomy bill. He regretted that for two months the House had listened to addresses by members of the Opposition who had been carrying on an agitation, against the bill apparently with the object of embarrassing the Government. Such politics he could not approve. He believed he had been sent there, like other members, to work for the progress, for the prosperity and for the advancement of the Dominion, thereby making a nation of it. But it was not by talking religion for eight weeks, or by setting French-Canadians against English, Roman Catholics against Protestants, or province against province, but by respecting each other's opinions and religion that such an ideal could be attained. Mr. Forget resented the charges of bigotry leveled against Quebec, and gave illustrations of the generosity of French-Canadians towards their English-speaking fellows in sharing public honors with them. He announced his intention of not only voting against the amendment proposed by his political leader, but of



The incurable or defective are at once placed in suitable quarters, where they are detained till the vessel starts on her return journey, when they are dispatched back to Europe, at the expense of the shipowners. A knowledge that such a disposition will be made of unsuitable immigrants has made the shipping companies very careful as to whom they sell tickets. If the immigrant is merely suffering from a curable trouble, he is placed in a specially fitted up detention hospital, where he must remain till the physician in charge gives hima certificate of good health.

But the immigrant has to pass a further examination after he is through with the doctors. He must prove to the civil officials that he is neither a pauper, nor one of the criminal class, vocalist and musician; permanent posiand that he is possessed of sufficient means to prevent his becoming a burden on the community. Then only can he start off for the place he has chosen as his new home.
