Toronto, Oct. 13.—As a result of financial difficulties, following unfortunate investments or speculations on the part of the general manager, Charles McGill, the Ontario Bank will to-day be taken over by the Bank of Montreal.

Losses to the Ontario Bank, placed in round figures as at least one million dollars, have caused this unusual transaction. AN Official Statement. AN Official Statement.

Alexander Laird, assistant general manager of the bank of Commerce, authorized the following brief statement after the meeting at 2 o'clock this morning.

morning:

"A meeting of the representatives of the Toronto banks was held last night to consider what action should be taken in connection with the Ontario bank.

"Arrangements are now in

"Arrangements are now in progress, to be consummated on the arrival this morning in the city of the representative of the Bank of Montreal, for securing payment of all liabilities."

A meeting will be held early in the morning at which it will be settled whether the bank will be opened. All arrangements depend on the initiative of the Bank of Montreal.

Public Need Not Be Uneasy.

The object of the bankers is to prevent any run on the bank and to protect the depositors and this will be done. The general public need feel no uneasiness.

As to the position of the stockholders, nothing was announced, but it was rather intimated that their position is not so comfortable.

The Ontario Bank was incorporated in 1867. Its officers are: G. R. R. Cockburn, president; Donald Mackay, vice-president; R. D. Perry, Hon. R. Harcourt, R. Grass, Thomas Walmsley and John Flett.

It has branches in Alliston, Aurora, Bowmanville, Buckingham, Q., Collingwood, Cornwall, Fort William, Holstein, King City, Kingston, Lindsay; Montreal, Mount Forest, Newmarket, Ottawa, Peterboro, Port Arthur, Sudbury, Toronto, Trenton, Tweed, Waterford, and Warsaw.

Funds Misappropriated.

G. R. R. Cockburn was interviewed as to the cause of the trouble. He stated that misappropriation of the funds was the real difficulty, and this had all occurred in the last few months. Hundreds Burn To Death On Str. Hankow At Hong Kong

A VERITABLE FURNACE

Hong Kong, Oct. 15.—Hundreds of passengers of the steamer Hankow of the China Navigation Co.'s fleet of London were burned to death yesterday in a fire which completely destroyed the vessel while she was moored at her wharf. Many others jumped into the harbor and were drowned.

The Hankow carried 2,000 Chinese passengers, men, women and children, and seven Europeans and a cargo including 300 bales of matting, 560 bales of raw slik and 400 bales of waste slik. The vessel arrived from Canton at 3 o'clock yesterday morning and was shortly afterwards moored at the wharf.

The chief officer reported to Capt. Branch that the ship was afire. The captain then directed the chief engineer to turn on the water through the fire hose, This was impossible, for the reason that within five minutes after the alarm was given the Hankow was siblaze fore and aft.

Capt. Branch then awakened the European passengers, who were rushed down the gangway, the ladies in their nightelofihes.

A Veritable Furnace.

The crew was compelled to leave the chip, which, by this time, was a veritable furnace. The Chinese steerage passengers were thrown into a frightful panic. Horrifying shrieks and cries to save their lives were heard, but it was impossible, owing to the infiammable nature of the cargo.

Responding to signals from the British cruiser Flora, the naval dockyard dispatched contingents of engines and assistance. The land and floating brigades of fremen made herculean efforts to extinguish the flames, which leaped to a height of over 50 feet.

The British steamer Pow An, which was berthed at the same wharf, was towed out to save her from destruction.

A neighboring pier 100 yards distant was burned to the water's edge. Governor Nathan, accompanied by his aide de camp, arrived at the scene at 4.15 a.m. Governor Nathan suggested scutting the ship, but the suggestion was found to be impracticable.

The fire was brought under control at 6 a.m., at which time only the shell and hull of the Hankow remained. The gruesome work of recovering the dead was then begun.

Many of them were huddled together and only singed, while others were incinerated beyond recognition. Of the cargo 200 bales of raw silk were saved, but badly damaged by water. The remainder was totally destroyed.



TERRORISTS OF RUSSIA

REVOLUTIONISTS OF THE CZAR'S EMPIRE AND THEIR METHODS.

auses of the Nihilist Movement and the System Now Pursued By the "Fighting Section" of the Socialist Revolutionary Party-An Arrest of Revolutionists At Night-Career of Mme. Catherine Breshkovsky.

War has been started again on the ruling classes of Russia by the "fighting section" of the Social Revolutionary party. They are waging it with such persistence that scarcely a day passes without some new record of horror. The Russians who believe in promoting reform by use of the pistol and bomb hope and believe that out of the wreck of an autocratic government will rise one under which liberty and happiness may prevall in their land. Whether this is an illusion or not time alone can tell. In the meantime political assassinations have become so common that the recital of them has grown almost monotonous. There is, however, something particularly fiendish about a method of warfare which involves promiscuous slaughter of women and children along with the involves promiscuous slaughter of women and children along with the



MME. CATHERINE BEESHKOVSKY. men held responsible for conditions complained of by the malcontents. The latter do not attempt to justify such a method of war except on the ground of

method of war except on the ground of the desperate nature of the case. One of the most active of the revolutionists is an aged woman, Mme. Catherine Breshkovsky. Mme. Breshkovsky was cradled in luxury, but when as a young woman she attempted to work for the ignorant and oppressed people she fell under the suspicion of the government, was kept a long time in prison and then exiled to Siberia, which she reached after a terrible journey of 5,000 miles and where she labored for years in a gold mine. On obtaining freedom she swore devotion to the revolutionary cause and is now in Russia in disguise helping to promote the downfall of the present regime.

The revolutionists of Russia are known under different names, and violence and assassination are favored by only the most extreme of the elements now contending for change in the constitution of the Government.

There are several different groups of revolutionists, and their mutual relations shift from time to time according to the developments of the general movement for constitutional government in the empire. The "red series" of assassinations, as it is known, was begun some forty or more years ago, and at first the movement was chiefly confined to a dissatisfied element composed largely of students or members of the educated classes. In recent years the working classes of the large cities have furnished many recruits to the movement, and strikes and other

symptoms of social protest have been incidents of the general unrest. Formerly the term "nihilist" was applied to the Russian revolutionist who bed lieved in resorting to the pistol and bomb to secure reforms, and it is still used, though it does not have quite the signification that it once had.

There is a story that the nihilist movement was started in the early sixties by students who were aroused to desperation by the brutal treatment accorded the family of one of their number by agents of the imperial government. They met in secret and swore to fight for liberty of speech, the press and religion, using every means to accomplish such reforms, even the weapon of assassination. The movement, at any rate, included many of the wealthy and educated classes, and even women were sometimes chosen to execute sentence of death upon those selected as victims for the pistol, the knife of the bomb.

Since 1993 over thirty prominent bureaucrais and military tyrants, including a grand duke and several princes, counts, governors and generals, have fallen victims to the wrath of the revolutionists, and the latter, under the direction of a "grand central committee," have issued proclamations stating that the policy of assassination will be pursued to the ultermost, even to the killing of hundreds of persons connected with the government, unless the latter yields to the popular demands.



But this is not an accurate view of the case. At all events, the new volume of the Archives of Canada, which give a mass of documents not hitherto printed on this subject, leaves a different impression. It is to be remembered that Acadia came to the British as a result of the Treaty of Utrecht. That treaty was signed in 1713, and it was in 1755 that the expulsion took place. expulsion took place.

The King of France was anxious to drive England out, and, with this end in view, the country was constantly harassed. In the operations against the English occupation the Indians were engaged, and there was at one time directly influencing them to raid the British settlements a French priest by the name of Le Loutre, whose correspondence with the French authorities is now published. Le Loutre writes, on July 29, 1749, to the French Minister that he is keeping the Indians busy with the English, who are being taught that no Egglish settlement will be permitted in Acadia. If the English persist in their design to colonize there will never be peace, says Le Loutre. Meanwhile Le Loutre and other emissaries appear to have been exercising influence with the Acadians. Bigot reports to France in September, 1749, that the English are trying to induce the Acadians to take the oath of allegiance, and he adds that, if they do, they will have to take up arms against the Indians.

It seems clear that the English and the French were pulling the Acadians in opposite directions. The English wanted them to take the oath and to become British subjects in the fullest sense of the word, in order, no doubt, that they might offer resistance to the attempts of the Indians under Le Loutre and the French commanders to dislodge the British, On the other hand, the emissaries of France were persuading the Acadians to resist the oath and to leave the country rather than take it. They wanted the Acadians to be neutral, except when openly on the French side. The Acadians were willing to take a restricted oath, such as was given them in 1726, accompanied 20th.

They said they had taken an oath of fidelity "with all the circumstances and reservations granted to us in the name of the King, and we are resolved, with one consent and one voice, to take no other oath." Another party declared that they would not take such an oath as that which was taken by the natural subjects of His Majesty, nor would they take one "which changes ever so little the conditions and the privileges obtained for us by our sovereigns and our fathers in the past." The Acadians here maintained that the oath taken in 1726, which exempted them from the defence of the country, was of the nature of a bargain with them, and they were opposing any deviation from that supposed compact.

There will nevor be a unanimous opinion touching the justice of this deplorable event in Canadian history.
