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

THE RITUAL.

I. BAPTISM OF INFANTS.

HYMN 254. L.M.

- 1 This child we dedicate to Thee, O God of grace and purity! Shield it from sin and threatening wrong, And let Thy love its life prolong.
- O may Thy Spirit gently draw
 Its willing soul to keep Thy law!
 May virtue, piety, and truth
 Dawn even with its dawning youth.

THE MINISTRATION OF THE SACRA-MENT OF BAPTISM TO INFANTS.

The Minister coming to the font, which is to be filled with pure water, shall use the following, or some other exhortation suitable to this sacred office:

Dearly Beloved: Forasmuch as our Lord Jesus Christ gave commandment to His Church to make disciples of all nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and whereas these persons here present do bring this child, and do now present him for baptism, I beseech you to call upon God the Father, through our Lord Jesus Christ, that having, of His bounteous mercy, redeemed this child by

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the blood of His Son, He will grant that he, being baptized with water, may also be baptized with the Holy Spirit, and received into Christ's holy Church, and become a living member of the same.

Then shall the Minister say:

Let us pray.

Almighty and everlasting God, who of Thy great mercy didst save Noah and his family in the ark from Lerishing by water; and also didst safely lead the children of Israel, Thy people, through the Red Sea, figuring thereby Thy holy Baptism; and hast set apart water for this holy sacrament; and hast condescended to enter into gracious covenant with man, wherein Thou hast included children as partakers of its benefits, declaring that "of such is the kingdom of heaven"; we beseech Thee for Thine infinite mercies that Thou wilt look upon this child; wash him, and sanctify him with the Holy Spirit; that he, being saved by Thy grace, may be received into the ark of Christ's Church, and being

steadfast in faith, joyful through hope, and rooted in love, may so pass the waves of this troublesome world, that finally he may come to the land of everlasting life, there to reign with Thee, world without end, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

O merciful God, grant that the old Adam in this child may be so buried that the new man may be raised up in him. Amen.

Grant that all earnal affection may die in him, and that all things belonging to the Spirit may live and grow in him. AMEN.

Grant that he may have power and strength to have victory, and to triumph against the devil, the world, and the flesh. Amen.

Grant that being dedicated to Thee in baptism, he may also be endued with heavenly virtues, and everlastingly rewarded through Thy mercy, O blessel Lord God, who dost live and govern all things, world without end. AMEN.

Then shall the people stand up, and the Minister shall read one or more of the following portions of Scripture:

Hear the word of the Lord written in the Book of Genesis (chap. 17: 7): And I will establish My covenant between Me and thee and thy seed after thee in their generations for an everlasting covenant, to be a God unto thee, and to thy seed after thee.

The Apostle Peter declares (Acts 2:39): The promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off.

The Apostle Paul likewise saith in the Epistle to the Galatians (chap. 3:13, 14, 29): Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for us: for it is written, Cursed is every one that hangeth on a tree: that the blessing of Abraham might come on the Gentiles, through Jesus Christ. And if ye be Christ's then are ye Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise.

The Lord hath by His servant Ezekiel (chap. 36: 25) said: Then will I sprinkle

clean water upon you, and ye shall be clean: from all your filthiness, and from all your idols, will I cleanse you.

Hear also the words of the Gospel written by St. Mark, in the tenth chapter, beginning at the thirteenth verse: They brought young children to Him, that He should touch them: and His disciples rebuked those that brought them. But when Jesus saw it, He was much displeased, and said unto them, Suffer the little children to come unto Me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God. Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein. And He took them up in His arms, put His hands upon them, and blessed them.

Then may the Minister say':

DEARLY BELOVED: For a smuch as this child is now presented by you for Christian baptism, you must remember that it is your part and duty to see that he be

taught, as soon as he shall be able to learn, the nature and end of this holy sacrament, and all those truths of the Holy Scriptures which reveal our duty and God's will concerning us. Bring him up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, so that he may lead a virtuous and holy life, and, being sheltered from the dangers and temptations of the world, and kept safe from ungodly teaching and example, may be led to trust in Christ his Saviour, and abide through life a faithful member of His holy Church.

Then shall the Minister say:

Let us pray.

Almighty, everliving God, whose most dearly beloved Son, Jesus Christ, for the forgiveness of our sins, did shed out of His most precious side both water and blood, and gave commandment to His disciples, that they should go and teach all nations, and baptize them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit; regard, we beseech Thee,

our supplications, and grant that this child, now to be baptized, may receive the fullness of Thy grace, and be found at last in the number of Thy faithful and elect children, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

O merciful God and heavenly Father, be pleased to give Thy Holy Spirit to the parents of this child, that they may have wisdom and grace to bring up their offspring in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, and in the faith of Thy holy Word, through Jesus Christ, our only Mediator and Redeemer. Amen.

Then shall the Minister take the child in his arms, and say to the parents or friends of the child:

Name this child.

And then, naming it after them, he shall baptize the child, saying:

N, I baptize thee in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

We receive this child into the congregation of Christ's flock, that he may be

instructed and trained in the actrines, privileges, and duties of the Christian religion, and trust that he will be Christ's faithful servant unto his life's end.

The Minister may close with extempore prayer.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God the Father, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with you all. Amen.

II. BAPTISM OF ADULTS.

THE MINISTRATION OF THE SACRA-MENT OF BAPTISM TO SUCH AS ARE OF RIPER YEARS.

The Congregation shall rise, and the Minister shall say:

Dearly Beloved: Forasmuch as our Lord Jesus Christ gave commandment to His Church to make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit; and, forasmuch as this person here present, not having been baptized in his infancy, seeks now in the presence of this congregation to be admitted into Christ's Church, through the ordinance which He hath appointed for that end; let us, being gathered together in the name of Christ, and in obedience to His command, hear, for our instruction and encouragement, the teaching of His holy Word concerning this sacrament:

And Jesus came and spake unto them, saying, I power is given unto Me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son,

and of the Holy Spirit: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. AMEN.

—Matt. 28: 18-20.

Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit.—Acts 2: 38.

Ananias....said....Brother Saul.... why tarriest thou? Arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord.—Acts 22: 12-16.

Then the Minister shall speak to the pront to be baptized on this wise:

Well beloved, thou hast been instructed, according to Christ's commandment, in the principles of His doctrine, and by the coming hither desiring to receive His holy baptism dost solemnly profess, before God and this congregation, thy belief in the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit, into whose name thou art about to be baptized, and dost confess with thy mouth

the Lord Jesus. Thou hast heard the command of God by the mouth of His Apostle, Repent, and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ; and the words spoken to Saul of Tarsus, Arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord. Thou art also reminded that all such as are baptized into Jesus Christ are joined unto Him in one Spirit. Thou must therefore, for thy part, declare thy faith in Christ, and must promise in the presence of this congregation that thou wilt, by the grace of God, renounce the devil and all his works and wilt steadfastly believe God's holy promises, and obediently keep His commandments.

Then shall the Minister demand of each of the persons to be baptized, severally:

Ques. Dost thou renounce the devil and all his works, the vain pomp and glory of the world, with all covetous desires of the same, and the carnal desires of the flesh, so that thou wilt not follow nor be led by them?

Ans. I renounce them all.

Ques. Dost thou believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth? and in Jesus Christ His only begotten Son our Lord? and that He was conceived of the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary? that He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried? that He rose again the third day? that He ascended into heaven, and sitteth at the right hand of God the Father Almighty, and from thence He shall come again, at the end of the world, to judge the quick and the dead? And dost thou believe in the Hol. Spirit; the holy catholic Church; the communion of saints; the remission of sins; the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting?

Ans. All this I steadfastly believe.

Ques. Wilt thou be baptized in this faith?

Ans. This is my desire.

Ques. Wilt thou then obediently keep God's holy will and commandments, and walk in the same all the days of thy life?

Ans. I will endeavour so to do, God being my helper.

Then shall the Minister ask the name of the person to be baptized, and repeating the same shall baptize him, saying:

N, I baptize thee in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. AMEN.

After which he shall say:

Grant, O merciful Father, that this person whom we now receive into Thy Church by baptism, may never hereafter be ashamed to confess the Faith of Christ crucified, and manfully fight under His banner against sin, the world, and the devil; and that he may continue Christ's faithful soldier and servant unto his life's end. AMEN.

After which the Minister shall say:

Almighty and everlasting God, our heavenly Father, we give Thee humble thanks for that Thou hast vouchsafed to call us to the knowledge of Thy grace and faith in Thee. Give Thy Holy Spirit to this person, that he may be made an

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Grant that all carnal affections may die in him, and that all things belonging to the Spirit may live and grow in him. AMEN.

Grant that he may have power and strength to have victory, and to triumph against the devil, the world, and the flesh. Amen

Grant that he, being dedicated to Thee by our office and ministry, may also be endued with heavenly virtues, and everlastingly rewarded, through Thy mercy, O blessed Lord God, who dost live and govern all things, world without erd. Amen.

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

Then the Minister, speaking to the newly-baptized, shall say:

Dearly Beloved: Thou hast now been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus; I exhort thee to bear in mind that it is thy part and duty to walk answerably to thy high and holy calling, as becometh the child of light, blameless and harmless, without rebuke in the midst of an ungodly world; remembering always that baptism representeth unto us our profession; which is to follow the example of our Saviour Christ, and to be made like unto Him, that as He died and rose again for us, so should we that are baptized die to sin and rise again unto righteousness; continually mortifying all our evil and corrupt affections, and daily proceeding in all virtue and godliness of living.

The Minister may conclude the Service with exhortation and extempore prayer:

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with you all. Amen.

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III. RECEPTION OF MEMBERS.

HYMN 644. C.M.

1 Come in, thou blessed of the Lord, Stranger nor foe art thou; We welcome thee with warm accord, Our friend, our brother, now.

2 The hand of fellowship, the heart Of love, we offer thee; Leaving the world, thou dost but part From lies and vanity.

3 Come with us; we will do thee good, As God to us bath done; Stand but in Him, as those have stood Whose faith the victory won.

RECEPTION INTO FULL MEMBERSHIP.

Upon the day appointed, all that are to be received shall be called forward, and the Minister, addressing the Congregation, shall say:

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN: The Scriptures teach us that the Church is the household of God, the body of which Christ is the Head, and that it is the design of the Gospel to bring together, in one, all who are in Christ. The fellowship of the Church is the communion which its members enjoy one with another. The ends of this fellowship are the maintenance of sound doctrine, and the ordinance of Christian worship, and the exercise of that power of godly admonition and discipline which Christ has committed to His Church for the promotion of holiness.

It is the duty of all men to unite in this fellowship, for it is only those that be "planted in the house of the Lord, that shall flourish in the courts of our God." Their more particular duties are to promote peace and unity; to bear one another's burdens; to prevent each other's stumbling; to seek the intimacy of friendly societ among themselves: to continue steadfast in the faith and worship of the Gospel; and to pray and sympathize with each other. Among their privileges are peculiar incitements to holiness from the

hearing of God's Word, and sharing in Christ's ordinances; the being placed under the watchful care of pastors, and the enjoyment of the blessings which are promised to those only who are of the household of faith. Into this holy fellowship the persons before you, who have already received the sacrament of Baptism, and having been for three months on probation, come seeking admission. We now propose, in the fear of God, to question them as to their faith and purposes, that you may know that they are proper persons to be admitted into the Church.

Then the Minister may address the applicants in the following or similar language:

Dearly Beloved: You come hither seeking the great privilege of union with the Church our Saviour has purchased with His own blood. We rejoice in the grace of God vouchsafed unto you in that He has called you to be His followers, and thus far you have run

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well. You have heard how blessed are the privileges and how solemn are the duties of membership in Christ's Church; and before you are fully admitted thereto, it is proper that you do here publicly renew your vows, confess your faith, and declare your purposes, by answering the following questions:

Ques. Do you here, in the presence of God and of this congregation, renew the solemn consecration of yourself to God, and take upon you the sacred obligation involved and set forth in the holy ordinance of baptism, and do you purpose that in heart and life, in death and for ever, you will be a true servant of God and of Christ?

Ans. I do. Such is my purpose, by God's help.

Ques. Do you believe in our Lord Jesus Christ, as the only, and all-sufficient, propitiation for the sins of mankind, and do you look to Him for the remission of sin and eternal life?

Aus. Such are my faith and hope.

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sus nt, nd of Ques. Do you believe in the inspiration and divine authority of the Holy Scriptures, and accept the same as a sufficient rule of faith and practice?

Ans. I do.

Ques. Will you cheerfully be governed by the rules of The Methodist Church, hold sacred the ordinances of God, and endeavour, as much as in you lies, to promote the welfare of your brethren, and the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom?

Ans. I will.

Ques. Will you contribute of your earthly substance, according to your ability, to the support of the Gospel and the various benevolent enterprises of the Church?

Ans. I will.

Then the 1 sister, addressing the Congregation, shall say:

Brethren: You have heard the responses given to our inquiries. Have any of you any reason to allege why these

persons should not be received into full membership in the Church?

No objection being alleged, the Minister shall say to the Candidates:

We welcome you to the communion of the Church of God; and, in testimony of our Christian affection and the cordiality with which we receive you, I hereby extend to you the right hand of fellowship; and may God grant that you may be faithful and useful members of the Church militant until you are called to the fellowship of the Church triumphant, which is "without fault before the throne of God."

Then shall the Minister offer extempore prayer.

ADVANCEMENT FROM CATECHUMEN MEMBERSHIP TO ADULT MEMBERSHIP.

Upon the day appointed, all that are to be so advanced shall be called forward, and the Minister, addressing the congregation. shall say:

Dearly Beloved: These young people who now present themselves before you were at a former time received into the

Church through the ordinance of Baptism, that they might be instructed and trained in the doctrines, privileges and duties of the Christian religion. Having been so instructed and trained, and having attained the age when, according to our Discipline, they are eligible to present themselves as candidates for adult membership, and having intimated their desire for such advancement, we now propose to question them as to their readiness to accept the obligations that were involved in their baptism.

Then the Minister may address the candidates in the following or similar language:

Dearly Beloved: Having been dedicated to God in holy baptism, and having reached an age of understanding and deliberate choice, not rests with yourselves to say whose you will be and whom you will serve, we rejoice that so early you have embraced the opportunity to present yourselves before this congregation, gratefully to acknowledge your appreciation of the privileges that were conferred upon you at the time of your

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ople you the baptism, and to declare your purpose now and henceforward to fulfil the obligations that were set forth in that ordinance.

We now propose, in the fear of God, to question you to make clear your attitude to Christ and His Church.

Ques. Do you love and trust the Lord Jesus Christ as your Saviour, Friend, and Guide?

Ans. I do.

Ques. Are you resolved as long as you live to obey and serve Him?

Ans. I am.

Ques. Will you search the Scriptures diligently for instruction in the way of eternal life?

Ans. I will.

Ques. Have you read carefully the Rules of the Methodist Church?

Ans. I have.

Ques. Are you willing to be governed by them?

Ans. Lam.

Ques. Will you, as you become able, contribute to the support of the Gospel and the various enterprises of the Church?

Ans. I will.

Brethren: You have heard the responses given to our inquiries. Have any of you any reason to allege why these persons should not be advanced to the status of adult members of the Church?

No objection being alleged, the Minister shall say to the candidates:

In the name of our common Master and of His Church, we heartily congratulate you upon having come to realize the higher privileges and duties that are yours as members of the Church; and we trust that through His grace given unto you, you may abide therein loyal and faithful servants of our Saviour and Lord while life shall last.

Then shall the Minister offer extempore prayer.

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IV. THE LORD'S SUPPER.

HYMN 258. C.M.

- 1 In memory of the Saviour's love

THE MINISTRATION OF THE SACRA-MENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER.

While the collection for the poor is being taken up, the Minisier shall read one or more of these sentences:

Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven.—Matt. 5:16.

Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal; but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal—Matt. 6:19, 20.

Whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets.—Matt. 7:12.

Not every one that saith unto Me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of My Father which is in heaven.—Matt. 7:21.

Zaccheus stood, and said unto the Lord: Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor: and if I have taken anything from any man by false accusation, I restore him fourfold.—Luke 19:8.

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He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully. Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver.—2 Cor. 9: 6, 7.

As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith.—Gal. 6:10.

Godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out.—1 Tim. 6: 6, 7.

Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not highminded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy; that they do good, that they be rich in good works, ready to distribute, willing to communicate; laying up in store for themselves a good foundation against the time to come, that they may lay hold on eternal life.—1 Tim. 6: 17-19.

God is not unrighteous to forget your work and labour of love, which ye have showed towards His name, in that ye have ministered to the saints, and do minister.—Heb. 6:10

To do good and to communicate forget not; for with such sacrifices God is well pleased.—Heb. 13:16.

Whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him?—
1 John 3: 17.

He that hath pity on the poor lendeth unto the Lord; and that which He hath given will Hz pay him again.—Prov. 19:17.

Blessed is he that considereth the poor; the Lord will deliver him in time of trouble.—Psalm 41:1.

While these sentences a: being read, some person or persons, appointed for that purpose, shall receive the alms for the poor: and then bring them to the Minister, who shall place them upon the table.

[If the Minister be straitened for time he may omit any part of the following service except the prayer of consecration. The Minister may ask one or more members of the Quarterly Official Board to distribute the bread and wine.]

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After which the Minister shall say:

Ye that do truly and earnestly repent of your sins, and are in love and charity with your neighbours, and intend to lead a new life, following the commandments of God, and walking from henceforth in His holy ways; draw near with faith, and take this holy sacrament to your comfort; and make your humble confession to Almighty God, meekly kneeling upon your knees.

Then shall this general confession be made by the Minister in the name of all those that are minded to receive the Holy Communion, both he and all the people devoutly kneeling and saying:

Almighty God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Maker of all things, Judge of all men; we acknowledge and bewail our manifold sins, which we from time to time most grievously have committed, by thought, word and deed, against Thy Divine Majesty, provoking most justly Thy wrath and indignation against us. We do earnestly repent and are heartily sorry for these our misdoings; the re-

membrance of them is grievous unto us. Have mercy upon us, have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, forgive us all that is past, and grant that we may ever hereafter serve and please Thee in newness of life, to the honour and glory of Thy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord. AMEN.

Then shall the Minister say:

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of Thy great mercy hast promised forgiveness of sins to all them that with hearty repentance and true faith turn unto Thee; have mercy upon us; pardon and deliver us from all our sins, confirm and strengthen us in all goodness and bring us to everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Collect.

Almighty God, unto whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration

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of Thy Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love Thee, and worthily magnify Thy holy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Then shall the Minister say:

It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks unto Thee, O Lord, Holy Father, Almighty, Everlasting God.

Therefore, with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we laud and magnify Thy glorious name, evermore praising Thee and saying, Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of Hosts, heaven and earth are full of Thy glory. Glory be to Thee, O Lord most high. Amen.

We do not presume to come to this Thy table. O merciful God, trusting in our own righteousness, but in Thy manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under Thy table. But Thou art the same Lord, whose property is always to have mercy. Grant us, therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of Thy

dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink His blood, that our sinful souls and bodies may be made clean by His death, and washed through His most precious blood, that we may evermore dwell in Him, and He in us. Amen.

Then the Minister shall offer the Prayer of Consecration as followeth:

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of Thy tender mercy didst give Thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption: who made there, by His oblation of Himself once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction for the sins of the whole world; and did institute, and in His holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that His precious death until His coming again: hear us, O merciful Father we most humbly beseech Thee, and grant that we, receiving these Thy creatures of bread and wine, according to Thy Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ's holy institution, in

remembrance of His death and passion, may be partakers of His most blessed body and blood; who, in the same night that He was betrayed, took bread; and when He had given thanks, He brake it and gave it to His disciples, saying, Take, eat; this is My body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of Me. Likewise after supper He took the cup; and when He had given thanks He gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of this: for this is My blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins; this do ye, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of Me. AMEN.

Then shall the Minister or Ministers receive the Communion in both kinds; and deliver the same to the people also, in order, into their uncovered hands. And when he delivereth the bread he shall say:

The body of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was given for thee, preserve thy soul and body unto everlasting life. Take

and eat this in remembrance that Christ died for *thee*, and feed on Him in *thy heart* by faith, with thanksgiving.

And the Minister that delivereth the cup shall say:

The blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was shed for thee, preserve thy soul and body unto everlast in life. Drink of this in remembrance to the Christ's blood was shed for thee, and be thankful.

If the cansecrated bread or wine be all spent before all have communed, the Minister may consecrate more by repeating the Prayer of Consecvation.

When all have communed, the Minister shall return to the Lord's Table, and place upon it what remainsth of the conservated elements, covering the same with a fair linear cloth.

Then may the Minister say the Lord's Prayer, the people repeating after him every petition.

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us

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from evil; for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. AMEN.

After which may be said as followeth:

O Lord, our heavenly Father, we Thy humble servants desire Thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving: most humbly beseeching Thee to grant that, by the merits and death of Thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in His blood, we and Thy whole Church may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of His passion. And here we offer and present unto Thee, O Lord, ourselves, our souls and bodies. to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto Thee: humbly beseeching Thee that all we who are partakers of this holy communion may be filled with Thy grace and heavenly benediction. And although we be unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto Thee any sacrifice, yet we besecch Thee to accept this our bounden duty and service: not weighing onr merits, but pardoning our offences, through Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be unto Thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. AMEN.

Then may be said:

Glory be to God on high, and on earth peace, good will towards men. We praise Thee, we bless Thee, we worship Thee, we glorify Thee, we give thanks to Thee for Thy great glory, O Lord God, heavenly King, God the Father Almighty.

O Lord, the only begotten Son, Jesns Christ: O Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, that takest away the sins of the world, have merey upon us. Thou that takest away the sins of the world, receive our prayer. Thou that sittest at the right hand of God the Father, have mercy upon us. For Thou only art holy, Thou only art the Lord; Thou only, O Christ, with the Holy Spirit, art most high in the glory of God the Father.

AMEN.

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Then the Minister, if he see it expedient, may offer an extempore prayer; and afterwards shall let the people depart with this blessing:

May the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God and of His Son Jesus Christ our Lord; and the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be amongst you, and remain with you always. AMEN.

V. MATRIMONY.

FORM FOR THE SOLEMNIZATION OF MATRIMONY.

First, the banns of all that are to be married must be published in the Congregation according to law, unless in cases where liveuse has been obtained.

At the time appointed for the solemnization of matrimony, the persons to be married standing together, the man at the right hand of the woman, the Minister shall say:

DEARLY BELOVED: We are gathered together here, in the sight of God, and in the presence of these witnesses, to join

matrimony, which is an honourable estate, instituted of God in the time of man's mocence, signifying unto us the mysticial union that is betwixt Christ and His Church; which holy estate Christ adorned and beautified with His presence, and first miracle that He wrought in Cana of Galilee, and is commended of St. Paul to be honourable among all men; and therefore is not by any to be enterprised or taken in hand unadvisedly, but reverently, discreetly, advisedly, and in the fear of God.

Into which holy estate these two persons present come now to be joined. Therefore, if any one can show any just cause why they may not lawfully be joined together, let him now speak, or else hereafter for ever hold his peace.

And also speaking unto the persons that are to be married, he shall say:

I require and charge you both (as you will answer at the dreadful day of judg-

ment, when the secrets of all hearts shall be disclosed), that if either of you know any impediment why you may not be lawfully joined together in matrimony, you do now confess it. For be ye well assured, that so many as are coupled together otherwise than as God's Word doth allow, are not joined together by God, neither is their matrimony lawful.

If no impediment be alleged, then shall the Minister say unto the man:

M, wilt thou have this woman to be thy wedded wife, to live together after God's ordinance, in the holy estate of matrimony? Wilt thou love her, comfort her, honour and keep her, in sickness and in health, and forsaking all other, keep thee only unto her, so long as ye both shall live?

The man shall answer:

I will.

Then shall the Minister say unto the woman:

N, wilt thou have this man to be thy wedded husband, to live together after

God's ordinance, in the holy estate of matrimony? Wilt thou love him, honour and keep him, in sickness and in health, and forsaking all other, keep thee only unto him, so long as ye both shall live?

The woman shall answer:

I will.

Then the Minister shall cause the man, with his right hand, to take the woman by her right hand, and to say after him as followeth:

I, M, take thee, N, to be my wedded wife, to have and to hold, from this day forward, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part, according to God's holy ordinance; and thereto I plight thee my faith.

Then shall they loose their hands, and the woman, with her right hand, taking the man by his right hand, shall likewise say after the Minister:

I, N, take thee, M, to be my wedded husband, to have and to hold, from this day forward, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part, according to God's holy ordinance: and thereto I plight thee my faith.

When the parties desire to be married with a ring, the following form may be used: The man, placing the ring upon the fourth finger of the woman's left hand, shall say after the Minister:

With this ring, a token and pledge of the vow and covenant now made between me and thee, I do thee wed, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Then shall the Minister say:

Let us pray.

O Eternal God, Creator and Preserver of all mankind, Giver of all spiritual grace, the Author of everlasting life, send Thy blessing upon these Thy servants, this man and this woman, whom we bless in Thy name; that they may surely perform and keep the vow and covenant betwixt them made, and may ever remain in perfect love and peace together, and

live according to Thy laws, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then shall the Minister say:

O God of Abraham, God of Isaac, God of Jacob, bless this man and this woman, and sow the seed of eternal life in their hearts, that whatsoever in Thy holy Word they shall profitably learn, they may indeed fulfil the same. Look, O Lord, mercifully on them from heaven, and bless them. And as Thou didst send Thy blessings upon Abraham and Sarah, to their great comfort, so vouchsafe to send Thy blessings upon this man and this woman, that they, obeying Thy will, and always being in safety under Thy protection, may abide in Thy love until their lives' end, through Jesus Christ our Lord. AMEN.

Then shall the Minister join their right hands together, and say:

Those whom God hath joined together, let no man put asunder.

Forasmuch as M and N have consented together in holy wedlock, and have witnessed the same before God and this company, and thereto have pledged their faith, either to other, and have declared the same by joining of hands, and by the giving and receiving of a ring, I pronounce that they are husband and wife together.—In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

And the Minister shall add this blessing:

God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Spirit, bless, preserve, and keep you; the Lord mercifully with His favour look upon you, and so fill you with all spiritual benediction and grace, that ye may so live together in this life that in the world to come ye may have life everlasting. Amen.

Then shall the Minister say:

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive them that trespass (gainst us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. AMEN.

VI. SCRIPTURE SELECTIONS AND HYMNS FOR FUNERAL SERVICES.

"David therefore besought God for the child; and David fasted, and went in, and lay all night upon the earth. And the servants of David feared to tell him that the child was dead: for they said, Behold, while the child was yet alive, we spake unto him, and he would not

hearken unto our voice: how will he then vex himself, if we tell him that the child is dead? But when David saw that his servants whispered, David perceived that the child was dead: therefore David said unto his servants, Is the child dead? And they said, He is dead. Then David arose from the earth, and washed, and anointed himself, and changed his apparel, and came into the house of the Lord, and worshipped: then he came to his own house; and when he required, they set bread before him, and he did eat. Then said his servants unto him, What thing is this that thou hast done? thou didst fast and weep for the child, while it was alive; but when the child was dead, thou didst rise and eat bread. And he said, While the child was yet alive, I fasted and wept: for I said, Who can tell whether God will be gracious to me, that the child may live? But now he is dead, wherefore should I fast ? can I bring him back again ? I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me." -2 Sam. 12: 16-23.

"Like as a father pitieth his children, so the Lord pitieth them that fear Him. For He knoweth our frame; He remembereth that we are dust."—Psa. 103: 13, 14.

"He shall feed His flock like a shepherd: He shall gather the lambs with His arms, and carry them in His bosom."—Isa. 40:11.

"At the same time came the disciples unto Jesus, saying, Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven? And Jesus called a little child unto Him, and set him in the midst of them, and said, Verily I say unto you, Except ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven. Whosoever therefore shall humble himself as this little child, the same is greatest in the kingdom of heaven. And whose shall receive one such little child in My name receiveth Me. But whose shall offend one of these little ones which believe in Me, it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea. Take heed that ye despise not one of these little ones; for I say unto you, That in heaven their angels do always behold the face of My Father which is in heaven. For the Son of man is come to save that which was lost. How think ye? if a man have an hundred sheep, and one of them be gone astray, doth he not leave the ninety and nine, and goeth into the mountains, and seeketh that which is gone astray? And if so be that he find it, verily I say unto you, he rejoiceth more of that sheep, than of the ninety and nine which went not astray. Even so it is not the will of your Father which is in heaven, that one of these little ones should perish."-Matt. 18: 1-6, 10-14.

"And, behold, there cometh one of the rulers of the synagogue. Jairus by name; and when he saw Him, he fell at His feet, and besought Him greatly, saying, My little daughter lieth at the point of death: I pray Thee, come and lay Thy hands on her, that she may be healed; and she

shall live. While He yet spake, there came from the ruler of the synagogue's house certain which said, Thy daughter is dead; why troublest thou the Master any further? As soon as Jesus heard the word that was spoken, He saith unto the ruler of the synagogue, Be not afraid, only believe. And He suffered no man to follow Him, save Peter, and James, and John the brother of James. And He cometh the house of the ruler of the synage and seeth the tumult, and them that wept and wailed greatly. And when He was come in, He saith unto them, Why make ye this ado, and weep? the damsel is not dead, but sleepeth. And they laughed Him to scorn. But when He had put them all out, He taketh the father and the mother of the damsel, and them that were with Him, and entereth in where the damsel was lying. And He took the damsel by the hand, and said unto her, Talitha cumi; which is, being interpreted, Damsel, I say unto thee, arise. And straightway the damsel arose

and walked; for she was of the age of twelve years. And they were astonished with a great astonishment. And He charged them straitly that no man should know it; and commanded that something should be given her to eat."—Mark 5: 22, 23, 35-43.

"And they brought young children to Him, that He should touch them: and His disciples rebuked those that brought them. But when Jesus saw it, He was much displeased, and said unto them, Suffer the little children to come unto Me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God. Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein. And He took them up in His arms, put His hands upon them, and blessed them."—Mark 10: 13-16.

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"And it came to pass the day after, that He went into a city called Nain; and many of His disciples went with Him, and much people. Now when He came nigh to the gate of the city, behold, there was a dead man carried out, the only son of his mother, and she was a widow: and much people of the city was with her. And when the Lord saw her, He had compassion on her, and said unto her, Weep not. And He came and touched the bier: and they that bare him stood still. And He said, Young man, I say unto thee, Arise. And he that was dead sat up, and began to speak. And He delivered him to his mother."—Lnke 7:11-15.

"Verily, verily, I say unto you, The hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God: and they that hear shall live. For as the Father hath life in Himself; so hath He given to the Son to have life in Himself; and hath given Him authority to execute judgment also, because He is the Son of man. Marvel not at this: for the

hour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear His voice, and shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation."—John 5: 25-29.

"Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in Me shall never die."--John 11:25, 26. / "But now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the firstfruits of them that slept. For since by man came death, by man came also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive. But every man in his own order: Christ the firstfruits; afterward they that are Christ's at His coming. Then cometh the end, when He shall have delivered up the kingdom to God, even the Father; when He shall have put down all rule and all authority and power. For He must reign, till He hath put all enemies under His feet. The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death. But some man will say, How are the dead raised up? and with what body do they come? Thou fool, that which thou sowest is not quickened, except it die: and that which thou sowest, thou sowest not that body that shall be, but bare grain, it may chance of wheat, or of some other grain: but God giveth it a body as it hath pleased Him, and to every seed his own body. All flesh is not the same flesh: but there is one kind of flesh of men, another flesh of beasts, another of fishes, and another of birds. There are also celestial bodies, and bodies terrestrial: but the glory of the celestial is one, and the glory of the terrestrial is another. There is one glory of the sun, and another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars: for one star differeth from another star in glory. So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown in corruption; it is raised in incorruption: it is sown in dishonour; it is raised in glory: it is sown in weakness; it is raised in power: it is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. There is a natural body, and there is a spiritual body. And so it is written, The first man Adam was made a living soul; the last Adam was made a quickening spirit. Howbeit that was not first which is spiritual, but that which is natural; and afterward that which is spiritual. The first man is of the earth, earthy: the second man is the Lord from heaven. As is the earthy, such are they also that are earthy: and as is the heavenly, such are they also that are heavenly. And as we have borne the image of the earthy, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly. Now this I say, brethren, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, neither doth corruption inherit incorruption. Behold, I shew you a mystery; We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump: for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. For

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this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality. So when this corruptible shall have put on incorruption, and this mortal shall have put on immortality, then shall be brought to pass the saying that is written, Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory? The sting of death is sin; and the strength of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." \(\psi \) 1 Cor. 15: 20-26, 35-58.

"Yea doubtless, and I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord: for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and do count them but refuse, that I may win Christ, and be found in Him, not having mine own righteousness, which is of the law, but that which is through the faith

Wherefore comfort one another with these words."—1 Thess. 4: 13-18.

6. JUDGMENT.

"Because He hath appointed a day, in the which He will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom He hath ordained; whereof He hath given assurance unto all men, in that He hath raised Him from the dead."—Acts 17: 31.

"So then every one of us shall give account of himself to God."—Rom. 14:12.

"For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad."—2 Cor. 5: 10.

Wherefore we labour, that, whether present or absent, we may be accepted of Him."—2 Cor. 5: 1-9.

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, which according -1 Peter 1: 3-5.

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"And one of the elders answered, saying unto me, What are these which are arrayed in white robes? and whence came they? And I said unto him, Sir, thou knowest. And he said to me, These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. Therefore are they before the throne of God, and serve Him day and night in His temple: and He that sitteth on the throne shall dwell among them. They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more; neither shall the sun light on them, nor any heat. For the Lamb which is in the midst of the throne shall feed them, and shall lead them unto living fountains of waters: and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes."—Rev. 7: 13-17.

"And I saw a new heaven and a new earth: for the first heaven and the first earth were passed away; and there was no more sea. And I John saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And the nations of them which are saved shall walk in the light of it: and the kings of the earth do bring their glory and honour into it. And the gates of it shall not be shut at all by day: for there shall be no night there. And they shall bring the glory and honour of the nations into it. And there shall in no wise enter into it anything that defileth, neither whatsoever worketh abomination or maketh a lie: but they which are written in the Lamb's book of life."—Rev. 21:1-5, 22-27.

"And he shewed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and of the Lamb. In the midst of the street of it, and on either side of the river, was there the tree of life, which bare twelve manner of fruits, and yielded her fruit every month: and the leaves of the tree were for the







VII. BURIAL SERVICE.

FORM FOR THE BURIAL OF THE DEAD.

[N.B.—The following or some other solemn service shall be used.]

The Minister meeting the corpse, and going before it, shall say:

I am the resurrection, and the life, saith the Lord: he that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in Me shall never die.—John 11: 25, 26.

I know that my redeemer liveth, and that He shall stand at the latter day upon the earth: and though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God: whom I shall see for myself, and mine eyes shall behold, and not another.—Job 19: 25-27.

We brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out. The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord.

—1 Tim. 6: 7; Job 1: 21.

At the grave, when the corpse is laid in the earth the Minister shall say:

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)n in Man, that is born of a woman, hath but a short time to live. He cometh up, and is cut down as a flower; he fleeth as it were a shadow, and never continueth in one stay.

In the midst of life we are in death; of whom may we seek for succour, but of Thee, O Lord, who for our sins art justly displeased?

Yet, O Lord God most holy, O Lord most mighty, O holy and most merciful Saviour, deliver us not into the bitter pains of eternal death.

Thou knowest, Lord, the secrets of our hearts; shut not Thy merciful ears to our prayers, but spare us, Lord most holy, O God most mighty, O holy and merciful Saviour, Thou most worthy Judge eternal, and suffer us not at our last hour for any pains of death to fall from Thee.

Then while the earth shall be cast upon the body by some standing by, the Minister shall say:

Forasmuch as it has pleased Almighty God in His wise providence to take out of the world the soul of the departed, we therefore commit his body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust; looking for the general resurrection in the last day, and the life of the world to come, through our Lord Jesus Christ; at whose second coming in glorious majesty to judge the world, the earth and the sea shall give up their dead; and the corruptible body of those who sleep in Him shall be changed, and made like unto His own glorious body; according to the mighty working whereby He is able to subdue all things unto Himself.

Then shall be said:

I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me, Write, Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them.

Then shall the Minister say:

Lord, have mercy upon us, Christ, have mercy upon us, Lord, have mercy upon us.

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. AMEN.




