

ST. ANN'S ACADEMY

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Nem Mestminster, B.C.

THIS Institution, founded in 1865, is conducted by the Sisters of St. Ann, an order devoted in an especial manner to the education of girls. It is pleasantly situated on an eminence commanding an extensive and beautiful view, and receiving the full benefit of the pure air from the Fraser River. The location is remarkably healthy.

The discipline is mild, but firm, uniting a careful training of manners and character with the best intellectual and physical development. Weekly instructions are given in the rules of etiquette and all that constitutes correct, lady-like deportment.



CHAPEL

Christian doctrine and Church history are studied by Catholic students only. No distinction is made in the reception of pupils on account of their religious opinions, and all interference with the convictions of non-Catholics is carefully avoided. Good order, however, requires that all should conform to the general external regulations of the Academy.

The pupils are kept within the line of duty more by a sense of honor and justice than fear of punishment. Bulletins, reporting the student's deportment, neatness, and progress, are sent monthly to parents.

The Curriculum embraces the Primary, Intermediate, Grammar and Academic Grades. A complete and practical Commercial Course, including Shorthand, Typewriting and Bookkeeping, is also attached to the establishment. Special advantages in Music are offered the pupils. Hours for lessons and practice do not disturb the classes, but are arranged so that one does not interfere with the other.

Particular attention is paid to plain sewing; a regular period for darning and mending is allotted to the boarders each week, that they may keep their wardrobes in perfect order. Ornamental needlework of all kinds is taught free of charge.

The scholastic year, composed of ten months, commences on the first Tuesday in September, and ends last week of June. Pupils are received at any time and

charged only from date of entrance. Payments are made monthly or quarterly in advance.

When parents or guardians wish to withdraw their children or wards, they must give timely notice, settle all accounts, and forward money to defray traveling expenses. No deduction is made for occasional withdrawals.

On Saturday and Sunday, in the afternoon, pupils are permitted to receive visits from their parents or guardians, and from friends introduced by them.

All correspondence will be subject to the inspection of the Superior. Only such papers and other publications will be tolerated as meet the approval of the Superior.

For clothing, books, laundry, etc., no advances are made by the Institution. To meet such incidental expenses, a sufficient sum must be left with the pupil or with the Directress of the Boarding School. This rule will be strictly enforced in all cases.

Books, stationery, and all necessaries except clothing, can be obtained at the Institution at current prices.

Special Regulations

Students are not allowed to lend, borrow, or exchange personal effects of any kind.

No students are accessible to callers during study or recitation hours, except in extraordinary cases.

Resident students are not permitted to leave the premises unless chaperoned by parents, guardians, or teachers. Under no consideration, will pupils be allowed to remain out of the Academy over night, except with parents or quardians.

Parents are requested to furnish a list of the persons with whom they are willing to have their daughters correspond. It is recommended that these lists be short
