BOYS' HOME.

NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Nineteenth Annual Meeting in connection with the Boys' Home was held on Monday, the 3rd February, 1879, at the "Home," in George Street. There was a large attendance of ladies and gentlemen.

Mr. MAYOR BEATY occupied the chair.

Rev. J. M. KING offered up a prayer for the continued success of the Home.

The Chairman addressed the meeting briefly. He said it was the custom of the City Council to make annual grants to the different charitable institutions in the city. It was sometimes supported and advocated that these amounts should be reduced. But when they considered the good work the institutions accomplished, and the important results that followed, the Council would make a mistake if it decreased or withdrew the yearly grants. He was disposed to think that, notwithstanding the difficulty surrounding the civic affairs and civic finances, the Council would not deprive the institutions of the amounts received in former years. If the citizens generally understood the work that was being accomplished for the benefit of those cast upon the world, with neither friends nor support, they would give more attention to these matters. He thought that something should be done to bring the different charities more prominently before the public.

Hon. GEORGE W. ALLAN read the Nineteenth Annual Report of the Lady Managers, as follows :—

The lady managers of the Boys' Home have much pleasure in presenting to the public their nineteenth annual report, which will how-

ever, be brief, the year just ended, though rich in blessings, having been unmarked by any events of importance.

In January last there were 87 boys in the Home; 61 were admitted during the past twelve months, making a total of 148 boys who have benefited by this charity during the year 1878. Of these 80 were removed by their parents, 17 absconded, and 18 were sent out to service—3 in the city and 15 to farmers in the country. Of this last number, 5 have proved satisfactory and are now bound to their employers, and 8 have been adopted by most worthy people as their own children. The average number of boys in the Home at any time during the past twelve months was 85—a large family to be clothed, fed, and cared for. The number of lads still serving their terms of apprenticeship is 26. During the past year 2 have fulfilled their term of service, and have received the money paid for them, which has been, as usual, placed out at interest by the treasurer of that fund until they were of age to receive it. The managers felt much encouraged in this particular branch of their work lately, by hearing from one of their boys who had gone to Manitoba with his employer some years ago, that he had now taken up land for himself, and hoped to make himself a home in the far west.

The managers have watched with much pleasure the steady and indeed rapid improvement made by the boys under their excellent teacher, Mrs. Arthurs. They passed a most creditable examination last summer, astonishing those present by the rapidity and correctness of their answers. At the conclusion nine of the boys were rewarded with prizes distributed by the Trustees of the Public Schools.

The managers have suffered much annoyance and anxiety during the past year on account of the very defective state of the drainage on the premises of the Home. During the heavy rains last summer the ground on either side of the house was constantly submerged, and then left covered with stagnant water, and though no expense was spared in endeavouring to remedy this evil, it is found impossible to prevent the basement of the house from being damp and uncomfortable. That the children enjoyed good health under these adverse circumstances can only be attributed, under Providence, to the excellent care and attention they received from the kind and indefatigable matron, Mrs. Munro.

The managers also feel that the many pleasant days' outings the boys enjoyed on the steamer *Waterdown*, through the kind thoughtfulness of Capt. Jackman, went far to strengthen and invigorate them during the trying heat of last summer.

The defective state of the drainage and the absence of the necessary modern improvements in the building, lead the managers to think that the time is not far distant when, if the institution is to be maintained in a high state of efficiency, and a constant increase of numbers to continue as heretofore, the present Home will have to be abandoned for one better suited to modern sanitary requirements. The managers believe that this could be accomplished without the expenditure of a great amount of fresh capital, were the present building and land surrounding it, now such valuable property for city purposes, sold to advantage, and a new building erected in a more salubrious situation and on higher ground.

In the spring of last year the funds of the institution were so low that the managers could not contemplate without deep concern and anxiety the six months that must elapse before the annual contributions could be solicited. With the assistance of kind friends a popular entertainment was held in the Grand Opera House for the benefit of the institution, the net proceeds of which amounted to \$477.14. The managers would take this opportunity of publicly thanking the ladies and gentlemen, and even children, who devoted so much time to ensure the success of the entertainment. While grateful for the assistance thus timely rendered, it is, they think, however, to be regretted that so necessary and deserving a charity found it imperative to make use of these means to replenish their exhausted exchequer.

The managers desire to gratefully acknowledge the handsome bequest of \$400 under the will of the late Mr. John McBean; also the sums of \$100 from Lieut.-Col. Ozowski, \$50 from Mr. Samuel Alocorn, and \$50 from Mr. James Lesslie. To Dr. Thorburn they are also deeply indebted for his unremitting kindness and attention to the inmates of the "Home" during the past year. Many thanks are also offered to the Rev. Mr. Rainsford for the bountiful treat he provided for the boys at his own house on Hallowe'en.

The committee feel that special acknowledgments are due to the

many kind friends who visit the "Home" every Sunday for the purpose of giving religious instruction to the children, and also to those who administer to their temporal wants by most generous donations from time to time of provisions of all kinds.

To the editors of the daily papers the managers are much indebted for the insertion of matters relating to the institution during the past year.

The Treasurer's annual statement of receipts and expenditure will be found annexed. From the accounts it will be seen that the total amount of moneys received by the collectors during the past year amounted to but \$1,590.25. This sum the managers are of opinion would be greatly increased were the public better acquainted with the good work accomplished by this charity. They bespeak, therefore, for their collectors in the coming autumn, subscriptions more in proportion with the wealth and size of the city.

It should be remembered that the duty of collecting money is an arduous one to the lady managers, and that cheerful giving, be the amount ever so small, facilitates the labour and encourages the the labourer, and they would conclude by impressing on the citizens generally, that the smallest as well as the largest contributions will be very gratefully received.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

Dr. THORBURN then made his annual report, which stated that during the past year there has been an unusual amount of inflammatory disease, especially of the throat and lungs, among the inmates. There had been forty-five cases of croup and ulcerated throat; one little fellow succumbed to the former in December. The Doctor regretted to say that although much time and money had been expended in endeavouring to improve the ventilation and drainage of the building last autumn, only partial success had rewarded the efforts made, and he feared that the diseases alluded to were greatly aggravated by the defective drainage. He thought it useless to spend any more money in this direction, and suggested that the property be

sold, and another more suitable purchased in a healthy and convenient locality. He had often referred to Mrs. Munro, the matron, in looking after the comforts and happiness of the boys, and again added his testimony to her worth.

ADOPTION OF THE REPORTS.

Prof. WILSON moved a resolution to the effect that the reports as read be adopted, and printed for circulation. He said this was a pleasant duty that he had had more than once to perform. The object of a meeting of this kind was to appeal for support from the citizens at large, and this appeal could not be too strongly made. He was glad to learn from the Mayor that there was no prospect of the Council reducing its annual grant to the institution. The annual report was very satisfactory as regards the operations of the Home during the year; it was gratifying to know that so much good was being accomplished. He had no doubt the time would arrive when liberal contributions would come back to the Home from those who had been reared and instructed in it.

Lieut.-Col. GZOWSKI seconded the motion. He said it was due to the Secretary to say that, although he had listened to many former reports of the institution, he had never heard one that placed the operations of the Home so practically before the public as the one just read. The Council ought not to diminish its grant to the Home, because if it were not for it and kindred institutions the city would be put to a large expense in supporting and looking after the many boys who would run loose about the streets. While the location of the Home made its drainage difficult, still it would not do to lead the public to believe that the premises could not be drained. This was not so. The drainage could be remedied, but want of money prevented the work being done. A change in the location of the institution would undoubtedly be of advantage. In building a new Home he advised the managers to build on a limited basis, and then they would know to what extreme they could go. Financially, he was utterly astonished at the result for the year. The cost of maintaining each boy was not over 15 cents per day, and he asked what boarding-house keeper could produce such boys at the same figure. The finances

were, indeed, very economically managed. He noticed that the managers had \$870 to their credit. But the public should not understand that because the Board had this amount on hand it did not require more. That sum was only one-seventh of what would be required to maintain the institution during 1879.

The resolution was carried unanimously.

The mover said the thanks of the institution and the public at large were due to the ladies who had acted as managers, and he hoped that they might long continue in the management of the Home.

HOD. GEORGE W. ALLAN seconded the resolution. He said it was desirable that the public should know more about what the Home was doing, and its wants. The citizens generally did not know that there were from 85 to 100 boys who, were it not for this Home, would grow up without care and instruction, and whose lives would probably end in vice and wretchedness. When the citizens fully realized this fact the managers would, without doubt, have more funds at their disposal.

The resolution was adopted unanimously.

THANKS TO PROVIDENCE.

Rev. JOHN PEARSON moved,

That this meeting has learned with much pleasure of the continued success of this institution; and while recognizing how largely under the Divine blessing this is due to the assiduous care and kindness of the ladies by whom its operations are carried on, they desire to record their thanks to Almighty God, without whom all our labours are in vain.

The mover and Rev. D. J. MACDONNELL both spoke to the resolution, which was adopted.

A vote of thanks was tendered to the Mayor for his services as chairman, after which the meeting terminated with the pronouncing of the benediction.

 OBJECT OF THE BOYS' HOME.

Duties of the Board of Management and Officers.

The Institution is open to boys of the ages mentioned in second Rule of the Regulations, the claims of admission being the utter friendliness of the applicant, or being a child of drunken and dissolute parents. The object of this Institution is the prevention of juvenile crime, by training poor outcasts in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

The management is vested in a Committee of Ladies, chosen from the Subscribers at the Annual General Meeting, in February of each year; said Committee to consist of thirty-three members; from among whom eight shall be chosen as Directresses; and among them there shall be a first and second Directress, Treasurer, and Secretary.

The first Directress, or in her absence one other Directress, shall preside at the monthly meetings, audit and sign the accounts presented for that purpose by the Treasurer, propose and declare the resolutions, and sign the minutes of each preceding meeting.

The Treasurer shall receive and keep an account of all money belonging to the Institution, as also the earnings of all the boys, a separate account of which must be kept with each. All the accounts

must be presented each month, at the meeting of the Managers for the signature of the first Directress, or in her absence, the Lady presiding.

The Secretary shall conduct all the correspondence of the Society ; keep a list of the names, ages, and peculiar circumstances, as far as practicable, of all the boys, in a book provided for that purpose ; attend at each monthly meeting, take the names of those present, and minute the proceedings in a book, which must be read at each ensuing meeting, and be signed by the presiding Lady.

Two members of the Committee in rotation, shall visit the " Home " daily, each week ; inspect the house ; ascertain from the Matron the conduct of the boys, and enter a report at the weekly meeting on the Monday.

The Weekly or Finance Committee shall consist of the Directress, Treasurer, Secretary, and two of the Committee, who shall have been appointed to purchase or otherwise obtain the necessary clothing for the boys. Three shall form a quorum, and their order shall be sufficient authority to the Treasurer to advance the money requisite for the above purpose, or supply such things as may be considered necessary for the " Home."

The General Committee shall meet on the second Monday of the month, at eleven o'clock a.m. Each meeting shall be opened with prayer. The minutes of the preceding meeting having been read and signed, the vouchers of the Treasurer produced and signed, the Secretary shall inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place during the last month, and the first Directress shall put before the meeting such resolutions as may be put into her hands, take the votes, and declare the decision. Seven shall form a quorum, and when a tie arises, the presiding Lady shall give the casting vote. All admissions that have taken place during the past month shall either be ratified or disallowed, at the discretion of the meeting.

As soon as the meeting is opened, all conversation not addressed to the presiding Lady, shall be pronounced by her to be out of order and stopped.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BOYS' HOME.

I. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the boys; to conduct the household affairs generally; to admit applicants with the doctor's certificate, subject to the approval of the Weekly Committee; and she shall daily see to the personal cleanliness of each boy, and every morning and evening conduct family prayer.

II. Boys from the age of 5 to 14 are admitted as inmates, and none shall be placed in a permanent situation until he has been one year in the Institution. This rule may be suspended under peculiar circumstances, at the discretion of the Managers.

III. The boys shall rise at six a.m. until the 30th of September, and at seven a.m. from 1st October to 1st May; the time for going to rest being from six to eight p.m. Their meals to be at regular hours.—Breakfast at 8 a.m., Dinner at 12, and Tea at 5:30 p.m. Grace to be said before and after meals, by one of the elder boys; and all hours not occupied by such meals, or by instruction, to be employed, under the supervision of the Matron, in bodily exercise, house cleaning, or in play.

IV. All the boys shall regularly attend Sunday School, and Divine Service in the Protestant Church, every Sunday, in charge of the Matron; and in the afternoon receive such religious instruction as can be given by the Matron, or any visiting friend of the Institution.

V. The charge for each boy of parents, or friends, who are able to pay, shall be \$4.00 per month, unless an exceptional case shall occur. If more than one boy of the same parents or friends gains admittance a reduction shall be made, as approved of by the ladies of the Weekly Committee.

VI. Prompt and implicit obedience must be given to the orders of the Matron.
