Autumn Care of the Dairy Cow.
A CRITICAL PERIOD.—PROTECTION
FROM INFLUENZA WEATHER.
At this season of the year, when
farmers are extremely busy preparing
for winter, the dairy cows are apt to
be neglected. Frequently they are
left to pick a scanty living from bare
pastures and the fence corners of
grain fields, exposed to all the incle-
mencies of the autumn weather. The
highly organized dairy cow is very
sensitive to sudden and extreme
changes in the weather, and nothing
could be more detrimental to econom-
ical milk production. The flow of
milk is often so materially lessened
that it cannot be brought back to the
normal standard during the winter.

Exposure to storms and lying on the
cold, damp ground at night not only
lead to a decreased flow of milk but
are very apt to cause undue troubles,
rheumatism and other diseases, and
in some cases even death. It is, there-
fore, advisable to see that the cows
get a sufficient supply of suitable
food during this critical period, and
that they are protected from storms
during the day and comfortably stabled
at night. That eminent dairy auth-
ority, Prof. Haecker of the Minne-
sota Experiment Station, has given
considerable attention to this subject,
and some of his experiments and con-
clusions are well worthy of consid-
eration by owners of cows. In the
course of an article on the fall care of
cows he says:

"One night or even a few hours of
rain causes an enormous shrink-
age of milk. Food, comfort and
contentment are the prime factors in
successful dairying, and it is not too
much to say that comfort is the pri-
mest factor. To feel well but disre-
gard the bodily comfort of the cow is
to court and insure disappointment.
A cow will fail to elaborate a full
mess of milk if she is wet or shivering
from cold, no matter how generously she
is fed.

Autumn is a more critical period
for a cow fresh in milk than winter.
Cold rains and raw winds are fruit-
less causes of decreasing milk. The
first makes inactive the muscular system,
while the latter so disturbs the nerv-
ous system that it fails to perform its
work. Cows should therefore not be
exposed to fall rains, left out during
cold nights, or confined in muddy or
wet yards at any time.

The proof of this theory was clearly
demonstrated by the Minnesota Sta-
tion herd two years ago. Some changes
were being made in the cow barn
which made it inconvenient to stable
the cows for a few days, and just then
a cold, rainy spell set in, to which the
cows were exposed. There were not
only a very marked shrinkage in milk
and butter fat at once, but they failed
to recover during the winter, though
the feed was liberal and the care the
best that could be given. The cows
gave 16.11 lbs. of milk and 2 lbs. of
butter fat a day during the winter. It
was known when the shrinkage took
place and why, but the attempt to
recover failed. The next year such
an experience was guarded against,
and the same herd gave a daily aver-
age of 28.4 lbs. milk and 1.2 lbs fat.

It may be asked what the cows did
with their food, since they were fed
liberally during the winter. They

made beef or fat with it, for each
gained an average of nearly half a
pound a day, a gain that did neither
the cows nor the owner any good.
During the two winters the herd was
composed of the same cows, fed the
same rations and received in every
way the same careful attention, and
yet because of that mishap the herd
failed by just fifty per cent of doing its
normal or possible work. Please
think of this, and do not lose money
by needlessly exposing cows in the
autumn.

When Poisoned by Ivy
The leaves of poison ivy often
change to beautiful tones of yellow
and red in the fall and are sources of
great temptation to any one who is
out hunting autumn decoration.
Poison ivy has three leaflets, and
Virginia creeper has five. The former
has white berries and the latter purp-
le.
All the drugs in the world are o
no use in preventing a bad case of
poisoning unless one begins to do
something as soon as the telltale itch-
ing begins. When the pustules break
open, one is almost sure to be in for
three days or a week of suffering. It
is well to have a little bottle of ex-
tract of grindelia in the house all the
time. Rub it on the affected parts
ever after you get up until the trouble is
over, and be sure to lose no time
in beginning.

Liberal Political Meeting.

The present Earl is the eighth of his line. The fourth, from whom he is directly descended, was a prominent member of the Government and First Lord of the Admiralty in the days of Capt. Cook's adventures in the Pacific, and hence the title of the Sandwich Islands, which has clung so persistently to the Hawaiian group, on one of which Cook finally lost his life.

Denmark.

A LARGE AND PROSPEROUS SOCIETY—GOOD WORK AND A BRIGHT OUTLOOK.

The Temperance Union of Denmark is the largest and most influential temperance society in the progressive little country whose name it bears. This organization started in the year 1878 and has just celebrated at Copenhagen its twenty-fifth anniversary. Last year it had a membership of 53,000, and during the present year its progress has been very great. The yearly Congress of the Union is a great event in the Danish Kingdom. Each annual meeting is quite interested in the problem of the place for the next Congress, there being generally received many invitations from provincial towns. The present President of the Society is the man who was first chosen for that position more than twenty years ago. His name is Claus Johannsen. He is a farmer, a member of a County Council and an ex-member of the Danish Parliament. Peter Dam, of Næstved writes to the English Temperance Record an interesting statement of the usual order of business in connection with these Congresses. He says:
The Congress lasts three days, about a dozen questions are debated, the sittings take place in the early hours of the day, usually from six o'clock, only the first day the afternoon hours are spent in discussion. Five hundred to seven hundred delegates are met, and live as guests with the inhabitants of the town. The first evening an open-air meeting gathers thousands of men and women from

Denmark.

A LARGE AND PROSPEROUS SOCIETY—GOOD WORK AND A BRIGHT OUTLOOK.

The Temperance Union of Denmark is the largest and most influential temperance society in the progressive little country whose name it bears. This organization started in the year 1878 and has just celebrated at Copenhagen its twenty-fifth anniversary. Last year it had a membership of 53,000, and during the present year its progress has been very great. The yearly Congress of the Union is a great event in the Danish Kingdom. Each annual meeting is quite interested in the problem of the place for the next Congress, there being generally received many invitations from provincial towns. The present President of the Society is the man who was first chosen for that position more than twenty years ago. His name is Claus Johannsen. He is a farmer, a member of a County Council and an ex-member of the Danish Parliament. Peter Dam, of Næstved writes to the English Temperance Record an interesting statement of the usual order of business in connection with these Congresses. He says:
The Congress lasts three days, about a dozen questions are debated, the sittings take place in the early hours of the day, usually from six o'clock, only the first day the afternoon hours are spent in discussion. Five hundred to seven hundred delegates are met, and live as guests with the inhabitants of the town. The first evening an open-air meeting gathers thousands of men and women from
