At the opening of court this after noon. Judge Crockett retired the 'jury and referred to some statements which had been published regarding the position of men and women as to law, and rules of evidence relating to them. He also said that, on the eve of the trial he received a resolution passed by an organization of women complaining of inequality as far as they referred to women. His Honor stated this action had been taken for the purpose of affecting the course of trial judge and was, as such, a most grave offense and a contempt of court. In such case the effect would be to prejudice the free and untrammeled course of justice.



George Kelly, first hase ian of the Glants, has been advan d by partisans of his team and league as the hitter who will dethrone Babe Ruth, the recognized king of ome run hitters.

Kelly appears to be on his way to new record for home runs in the National League, and there are many Ruth admirers who will be pulling strongly for the big first baseman of he Giants to reach this goal He has nade himself extremely popular by his game fight against odds, by his ability to rise to stardom in his pro fession after a poor start which drev ocean voyage. Although the first baseman nov holds a slight advantage over Ruth in number of home runs, with six to his credit against five for the Yankee slugger, it is unreasonable to expect of him to set the pace, or even to trail closely. There are factors entering into such a contest, if it can be called such, which place Kelly at a disadvantage. In the first place neither the Giants' first sacker nor any other player in all the history of baseball has been able to drive a baseball as Ruth does. The swing which is natural to Kelly never can generate the power which Ruth able to put into his effort. Ruth's swing is longer and he puts all his weight and power behind it, so much so that he gives the spectator a thrill even when he fails to connect, sometimes failing from his

Another element to be considered is that concerning the fields on which these two supermen of the mace must perform. Kelly hits usually to left field; Ruth is a pronounced right field hitter. On most major league parks left field is longer than right, and even if two hitters carried equal hitting power, Kelly's task would therefore be greater There are some parks in the National League where the left field walls have defied human endeavor to date; and Kelly probably will not drive any baseballs over them. The tar gets which Ruth must aim at in the American League are difficult enough for most players, but he has been able for two years in succession to hit balls out of every park along the American circuit.

Ruth has averaged forty-two homruns a season during the past two years, and he is starting better this year than in either campaign. While hoping that Kelly sets a new league record, why handicap him by execting the apparently impossible?

9,178 SETTLERS VIA C.P. FLEET

English Settlers Brought \$175,-000 Here to Buy Land

Despite the strengthening of restrictions against fresh immigration into this country, and the continuation of the ruling that all new settlers must show \$250 in cash and their railway fare to their destination before being admitted into the Dominion, these new settlers continue to arrive in large and increasing numbers.

During the months of January, February and March no less than 9,187 new colonists entered St. John via the Canadian Pacific vessels alone, being 1,450 in January, 2,045 in February and 5,672 in March. These numbers would have been considerably larger, so the shipping men aver, if the \$250 resuirement had been dropped to the former \$50 rate, as it was recently thought would be done. In fact, steamship officials state that many hundred intending immigrants cancelled their bookings upon learning that the high rate was to be maintained.

In detail, the Canadian Pacific records for the three months are as follows:

During January, five of the company's steamers arrived at St. John, W.B., with a total passenger list of
