What he asks is that the people of this country do not forget all these things conveniently and later buy German made goods because they can save ten cents. Once a Hun al ways a Hun, is his emphatic declaration, and anyone who would not remember this and act acordingly in order that civilization may be freed from such a race is not worthy of th name of Briton.

Certainly one thing is evident, that if what Mr. Wright says is true, the Hun is lower than the beast.

Furthermore, Canadians, he remarks, should not grow weary in every effort for re-establishment of the men who are coming back. He spoke of them as gallant men whom he had seen standing, hour after hour, in the freezing water up to their hips, who had suffered unrelatable pain and agonies, who had stood as a living wall between the beastfality of the Hun and ourselves nd if we do not honor them as they deserve to be honored we are not discharging the debt that he knows

This service is provided by the Medical Branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment.

An ex-soldier or ex-sailor who has a recurrence of a war disability should, if he is not too ill, go at once to the local medical officer of this Department.

If he is too ill he should have that medical officer notified at once.

Should he be taken ill in a place where there is no representative of the Department, he should call in a local physician to give him the necessary immediate treatment and ask him to communicate immediately all details of the case to the nearest medical officer of the Department.

The name of the authorized medical representative of this Department for each locality is given along-

Treatment at the expense of this Department can only be secured through these representatives. The Department cannot pay any bills for treatment which have not been authorized by the Department.

If the medical officers recommend it, pay is given to patients, and allowances are granted to their dependents by the Department, during the period of treatment.

The established scale of pay and allowances that may be granted depends upon the extent to which the treatment recommended by the medical officer of the Department prevents the patient from doing his regular work.

Arrangements for special care of patients of the Department have been made with hospitals in all the larger towns and cities from coast to coast.

Sanatoria for treating tuberculosis under most favorable conditions are operated in every Province under the direct supervision of the Department.





Tuberculosis In Cattle.

One reason why farmers should ave their cattle tested for bereplosis is the financial loss tubercular animals in their herds. As the disease is at first slow in development and does not induce sudden death, like anthrax, black leg or hog cholers, the farmer does not realize the loss that he endures by having tuberculesis in his herd until one or more animals develop the disease in an advanced degree and disease in an advanced tegree and disease in the disease in a disease in an advanced tegree and tegree once seen to be rotten with the dis-ease. Such animals will have had the ease. Such animals will have had the disease a long time without it being suspected and will have been giving off in their milk, saliva and droppings, large numbers of tuberculosis facilli. In this way the bacilli are spread around, the feed, water and atmosphere in the stable get contracted with these and other memtaminated with them and other members of the herd contract the disease from these contaminated materials. The tuberculin test will indicate whether or not an animal is tuber-sular long before any chinical symptoms are visible, thus enabling one to deal with such an animal before it becomes a dangerous spreader of

When an animal is shown to be tubercular it should not be allowed to mix with the rest of the herd. When cattle are purchased to add to the herd it should be only when subject to the tuberculin test, as cattle may have every visible indication of good health and yet be tubercular, the disease not yet having developed

to an advanced degree.

It is therefore strongly recom-mended that farmers ist. Have their herds tested for tuberculosis with the tuberculin test. 2nd. That they slaughter the animals that have the disease in an ad-

vanced degree. 3rd. That they separate the cattle

that react to the test from those which do not react. 4th. That they remove the calves from tubercular mothers as soon as dropped, and feed them on milk from healthy cows or on their mother's milk after it has been properly pas-teurized, i.e., after it has been heated to 145 deg. F. for half an hour.

5th. That they apply the tuber sulin test to every new purchase of cattle that are to be placed in the slean herd. 6th. That the herd he tested with





The Dates to Plant for Heaviest

To Make Most Money From Wool Shearing Must Be Done Properly and Wool Eandled Carefully-A Few Hints Which Have Saved Farmers Dollars.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

HERE is a best time to sew each class of farm crops to secure the highest returns. It is difficult, however, to which are the most favorable dates for the best returns of the different crops in all seasons. The results of experiments conducted over a series of years form a good general guide. Some crops give best results from later seedings. Seasons vary so much that in some years the grains are practically all sown by the dates at which it is only possible to start sowing in other years. It is of the utmost importance, however, to start cultivating the land as early as Flo at the Grand Opera House it is dry enough to work to good advantage. The first cultivations should take place for those crops which should be first sown. In this connection it is interesting to study the results of an experiment which was conducted in each of five years at the Ontario Agricultural College. Spring wheat, barley, oats and peas were sown on each of six dates. One week was allowed between each two dates. Sheep Shearing. Shearing and Tying the Fleece.-Shearing should only be carried on under the most favorable conditions; upon bright, warm sunshiny days when the sheep are dry of fleece and the wool has "risen" somewhat from the body. Cleanliness and care in the removal of all fleeces is very es-sential and the shearing floor should doubles beauty of your bair be swept after each fleece has been removed and tied. This will elim-inate a great deal of foreign matter which, although it may add weight, does so at the expense of quality.

Dung Locks or Tags.—It will be noticed with many fleeces that there are certain hard dung locks or tags adhering to the britch ends. These contain a great deal of moisture and if left on and rolled into the fleece produce a damp heavy condition that means a higher shrinkage and hence less value. They should, whenever present, be snipped off with the
