The Second Recital.

"Great critics have taught us on essential rule . .

that if ever we should find ourselves disposed not to admire those writers or artists, Livy and Virgil, for instance, Raphael or Michael Angelo, whom all the learned had admired, not to follow our own fancies, but to study them until we know how and what we ought to admire; and if we cannot arrive at this combination of admiration with knowledge, rather to believe that we are dull than that the rest of the world has been imposed

on. So wrote Burke some 120 years ago, and with this admonition in our min we wended our way to hear Mark Hambourg who has gained a world

wide fame for inspiring interpretation on the pianoforte of the musical classics of masters in music. These masterpieces are pre-eminent because they are lofty in theme, pregnant in power, exquisite in melody, God-like in harmony, and their soul appeals to the divinity in man. Their range is universal. They are not limited by the Babel of languages or disturbed by the cacophony of tongues. "Music is the true universal speech of mankind," as Weber puts it.

Such indeed was the impression recital last night. Musicians might appreciate the technique and the wonderful skill of the master, but the

musical savage could enjoy the melody which flowed from the master and the instrument, both keyed up to concert pitch, and the souls of both in harmony, as the spirit of music made captive the listeners and held them spell-bound. The tense attention and silence which spoke during

the recital were indeed as eloquent of the appreciation of the audience as the burst of applause which more formally expressed the feelings of those present. The programme of the recital as follows:--






