





A Clean Man

Household Notes.

To keep flies from the house dip a sponge in boiling water and place it in a saucer. Pour on this half a teaspoonful of oil of lavender, which for some reason or other is very odorous to flies. The sponge requires moistening with boiling water about twice a day, with oil about once a week.

To protect the ruffles of petticoats from the inevitable wear and tear, bind the edge of the outer ruffle with rick-rack braid and the dust ruffle with fatted braid, which is coarser. Not only will the lace and lawn be protected from harm, but the appearance of the ruffle itself will be improved.

To dry clean a white coat lay the coat on a table and cover it with a mixture of powdered borax and French chalk. Leave it for half an hour or so, then take a clean cloth and rub it well all over. Let it lie twenty-four hours, then shake and brush it well, when it will probably look quite fresh.

really one a wound, and is susceptible to treatment with antiseptics and healing lotions.

Make your curtains with hems of equal width at top and bottom. After washing them, hang them upside down, slipping the rod through what was before the bottom hem. This equalizes wear and tear and prolongs their life. Be careful not to make such curtains of a material whose fibres are not reversible in position.

A good way to wash white silk gloves: Rub them well in luke-warm water to which a little ammonia has been added, and rinse quickly in clear water of the same temperature. Hang them where they will dry rapidly, and then put them between sheets of white paper and under a weight. Treated in this way they will not turn yellow.

Wall paper may be successfully cleaned with stale bread. A loaf of ordinary size is used. The bread should be two days old. Dust the paper with a soft cloth wrapped about a broom. Use light strokes in order not to stretch the paper. When the dust has been removed, cut the loaf of bread into four parts and sweep down the paper with a light, steady stroke.

A most effective trimming for a dress can be secured by selecting a pattern of lace with a decided floral figure, and painting the flowers and leaves with oil paints of dyes. These colors will not fade when laundered if pressed with a hot iron immediately after being painted. Paint the outline of the design in a tone slightly darker than the rest.

A poison for flies which is harmless to domestic animals is made by mixing together a teaspoonful each of black pepper and sugar with either butter or cream. Spread this on a plate, and leave it in any room where flies are troublesome. It is wise also to wash over the panes of windows with a weak solution of carbolic acid.

A very effective method of catching flies is to take a square of blue paper, or cardboard and cut a small hole in the centre. Cover it thickly on the underside with treacle, taking care to put plenty of treacle round the opening. Then place the cardboard, treacle side down, over a bowl of spiced, when the flies, attracted by the treacle, will fall into the snare. This fly trap is especially good, as no poisonous compound is used.

F. Roller, chief trainer; Johann Koch, German athlete; Messer Coleman and a German chef, who will prepare all the food. At New York the wrestler will pick up Tom Jenkins, who will accompany him to Chicago.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Aug. 10.
The neighbourhood of the docks is practically under mob rule to-day, with the result that such dwindling food supplies are coming in that the metropolis is experiencing something akin to what might happen if a hostile foreign force should succeed in interrupting Britain's trade routes.
Unless good progress is made to-day in negotiations looking for the settlement of the strike with the dock workers, the calling out of the troops seems inevitable. The police are seriously outnumbered, and are unable to deal with an emergency.
The only quarter where relief was experienced was Billingsgate, where the striking fish porters obtained all they asked, and returned to work. On the other hand, hundreds of railroad car men quit work this morning, and several stations are practically in a state of seige.
The strikers have all places picketed, and are preventing by force, all attempts to handle goods. The only traffic allowed to pass without fear of interference is the vans carrying hospital stores.
The troops at Aldershot are held under arms, ready to be called at any moment.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Aug. 10.
The resolution to pay the members of the Commons \$2,000 annually, was carried to-day by a vote of 256 to 159. The resolution was moved by Chancellor Lloyd George, who said that Britain was the only country in the world that did not pay members for work in parliament, which nowadays is becoming so strenuous that members had little time to attend to anything else.
The Unionists opposed the Bill on the ground that payment of members would be a violation of the principle of gratuitous public services; also, that it would be improper for members to vote themselves salaries. In the official Unionist amendment against the payment of salaries, it was argued in effect that Lloyd George's Bill would mean the keeping of the best types of politicians out of parliament, and fill it with professional politicians.

McDonald, Labor Leader, said he believed the measure would cause corruption, and would tend to help the tide to flow as it does now in American politics.

On the whole, however, the match was full of real interest to the spectators, who followed it with close attention till the last whistle, when the record showed the Stars to be the winners by 4 goals to 3.

St. George's Welcomes the Apostolic Delegate and Its Bishop, the Rt. Rev. M. F. Power.

(Continued from Monday's Telegram.)

On the next morning the installation of the Bishop took place, and of that beautiful and inspiring ceremony I will say nothing, being convinced that a report of it is already in your hands.

At the close of Mass came the presentation of the addresses; that of the people to the Delegate was presented by Magistrate McDonald, and those of the Star Society by the President and Secretary, Messrs. Ambrose O'Reilly and M. A. White.

The Delegate replied in Latin and well chosen words, and with an undercurrent of deeper feeling which touched every heart. Then saying that he understood that French was the mother tongue of many in the congregation, he begged leave to say a few words to them in that language.

He spoke of the glorious days of old when France was first in honour among the nations, first in faith, first in loyalty to the Holy See; he spoke of her missionary labors to the farthest ends of the earth and the long succession of discoverers and teachers who brought a knowledge of the Cross to the people of many lands. He referred to the New France which has grown up on this side of the water, which holds all the best traditions and displays all the best qualities of the old, and exhorted his hearers always to live faithful to that glorious past and always to be true and steadfast followers of Holy Church.

His Lordship's Bishop Power in replying to the address of the Clergy of

the diocese was visibly affected and spoke to us in such touching words and in tones which showed how heartfelt were his utterances as to deeply move members of the Star of the Sea Association he thanked them for their address, and spoke of their duties and privileges as a Catholic Society and of the work they had done and would no doubt more and more continue to do for the honor and glory of God.

To the vast throng who listened to his reply to the addresses it seemed, indeed, that the work of advancing the interests of the Master in this diocese which his two illustrious predecessors had changed for, perhaps, heavier tasks for that Master in wider spheres of influence, had fallen indeed into good hands. May God prosper him in the work he has to do and spare him long to his people.

At 2.30 o'clock Monsignor Stagni, the Bishop and party accompanied by the Citizens' Committee and a Guard of Honor of the Officers of the S. S. A. took voyage on the S. S. Acadia to visit the pavilion of St. George's and Port au Port. The Delegate and Clergy were entertained at the Mansie in each parish and lavish hospitality was dispensed elsewhere to the visiting committee and officers of the Guard of Honor, particularly was this so at the former parish. At night the party returned to find St. George's again illuminated and to be received with another hearty welcome.

Throughout the whole celebration there was but one shadow of regret.

Among the numbers here who had known and loved Archbishop Howley at the time that he worked here among difficulties and privations as our pioneer Bishop, great joy was felt when we heard that he was coming once more to visit us, and it was with deep regret we learned that other cares and duties had prevented him.

Greatly was his well loved face and magnetic personality missed from the visiting prelates; many were there who longed to clasp again the hand that had often been extended to them in love and kindness. Among the throng the words could often be heard, "Where is Archbishop Howley, didn't he come? What a pity, he would have been proud of us to-day!"

To one whose imagination has become calloused or whose blood runs sluggishly through his veins, the enthusiasm of those days may be hard to explain. To one of Catholic sentiment it is easy to enter into the spirit of the people and to understand the welcome given to the Apostolic Delegate.

The welcome to Bishop Power comes from similar motives and is yet slightly different. We receive him with the love and respect with which Catholic people always receive those whom the Church appoints to guide them; we welcome him because he comes of a race which endured long centuries of suffering for the faith, we rejoice because he is one of our very own, a son of the soil, a Newfoundland and in this we all join, no matter how we may differ in points of belief who has been placed among the highest in the land, who has been found worthy to sit in the Ruler's seat, and we rejoice that "the old times change their place to new," and no longer can it be said as it was of old time, "Can any good come out of Galilee."—Com.

Death of Mr. Archibald Drover.

By the death of Mr. Archibald Drover, which sad event occurred at his residence, 13 William Street, on Wednesday night last, a highly respected citizen and silver fisherman-planter has passed from amongst us.

Mr. Drover was born in Upper Island Cove sixty-nine years ago, and sprung from the pioneer family of that thriving little settlement in Conception Bay. From boyhood, up to twelve or fourteen years ago, like all his ancestors, he followed up the fisheries; and was for many years master and owner of a schooner in which he presided the great industry at Cape Ballard and Cape St. Mary's. By honest industry and perseverance he attained a very fair measure of success, and was always looked upon by people of all classes as an upright, independent fisherman of the old school. He also went considerably into the supplying trade, and took a deep interest in the affairs of our country. He enjoyed phenom and good health until about eight weeks ago when he was stricken with an illness which culminated in his death. Mr. Drover was a man of splendid physique, as well as a courteous, cultured and hospitable gentleman. For about ten years he was a trusted employee of the Rennie Baking Co. of this city, and for the past few months was employed by the Marine and Fisheries Department. He leaves a widow, who is one of the Reeves family and pioneers of Bell Island, but no children. His many friends in Conception Bay and elsewhere will read this obituary of this truly honest and industrious old Newfoundlanders with the deepest regret, and the Telegram extends its sincere sympathy to the widow and friends in their sad loss.



Smuggled Seeds.

Imported Plants Which Have Made Countries Wealthy.

At the banquet given at the end of the recent International Rubber Exhibition at the Agricultural Hall, a cheque for £1,000 was presented to Mr. H. A. Wickham, who, in 1876, brought out of Brazil the seeds from which have sprung the vast rubber plantations of Ceylon, the Malay States, and other parts of the Far East.

Mr. Wickham well deserves the testimonial. In those days Brazil had a monopoly of the Para rubber, which is the best in the world, and jealously refused to permit plants or seeds to leave her shores.

Mr. Wickham chartered a steamer, went up the Amazon, and collected 70,000 seeds. With great difficulty he smuggled them aboard and was off full steam for home.

Rubber seeds are very perishable, and it was known that they would not survive the journey to Ceylon. So the moment he arrived in London Mr. Wickham took a hansom and drove straight to Kew. It was the middle of the night when he arrived there, but the seeds were planted at once.

One in ten germinated, and a year later 1,700 of the plants were sent in miniature hot-houses to Ceylon, where to-day they stand, huge forest monarchs twelve feet in girth.

The rubber industry of the East is already worth at least fifty millions sterling, and growing fast.

Why Quinine is Cheap.

If Ceylon owes a heavy debt to Mr. Wickham, the island also cherishes the name of Sir Clements Markham, best known as the great Arctic explorer. Nearly fifty years ago Sir Clements brought the cinchona tree, from the bark of which is made quinine, from South America to Ceylon.

Before that, quinine cost a guinea an ounce in India. To-day it is exported in large quantities.

The story of how the mango was introduced into the British West Indies is interesting. In the year 1782 H. M. S. Flora, one of Lord Rodney's squadron, chased and captured a French ship, which was found to be bound from Mauritius to Haiti.

On board this vessel was a collection of plants, all named and numbered, and among them were several young mango trees. The ship was sent as a prize into Kingston, Jamaica, and the mangoes were planted at Gordon Town.

The numbers got mixed or lost, all but one. This bore the label, "No. 11." To-day "Number 11" grows all over the island, and bears immense crops of delicious fruit. It is the commonest and hardiest tree in the whole country. Mangoes are shipped in great quantities from Jamaica, and in the season the people eat dozens per head daily.

In 1819 the British Government imported no fewer than 100,000 nutmeg trees into Ceylon and Bengal. It was labour lost, for the trees refused to grow. Indeed, they will not do any good outside their home in the islands of the Malay Archipelago.

Plans Upset by Pigeons.

Nutmeg growing is so profitable that the Dutch made up their minds to make a monopoly of the trade, and with that object in view set to work and cut down all the nutmeg trees in the Moluccas except those in the island of Banda.

But they had not counted on the pigeons, which happen to be very fond of mace. The birds soon conveyed the seeds all over the archipelago, and to-day the nutmeg tree is just as plentiful in all the other islands as it is in Banda, much to the profit of the inhabitants.

It was in exactly the same sort of way that the Dutch over-reached themselves in the matter of the clove tree, which, like the nutmeg, is a native of the Moluccas. They destroyed it on all the islands except Amboyna, and there only allowed a limited number to be grown, lest the price should fall too low.

Very naturally this set everyone scheming to get ahead of them. It was a Frenchman who succeeded. An agent of a French firm managed to smuggle out a little packet of seed, and took it to the Isle of Bourbon. There the plants were grown successfully, and later on some were sent to French Guiana, where they have since become a great source of profit to the colonists.—P. W.

To Clean Gas Stoves.

1. Lift off all the bars from the top
2. Wash the top of the stove under the burners with hot soda water.
3. Clean the burners every now and then with an old brush dipped in paraffin if they are greasy.
4. Do not poke wire into the holes in the burners as this enlarges them and leads to an increased use of gas.
5. Wash bars with hot soda water, and polish them with blacklead, unless the bars are of steel, when they must be cleaned with emery paper.
6. Clean the brass taps and fittings.
7. Scrub and wash the shelves with hot soda and water.
8. Replace all the parts.


