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#### Rotary Luncheon

THE PRIME MINISTER SPEAKS ON THE LIGHTER SIDE OF THE IMPERIAL CONFERENCE.

A large number of Rotarians and guests were present at the weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club held esterday at Wood's West End Restaurant. The Hon. Dr. W. R. Warren. Prime Minister, entertained the gathering with some impressions of the Imperial Conference which he attended in London, The Prime Minister being introduced by Rotarian "Will" Barker, chairman of the day. said that at the short time at his disposal, he would only touch on the lighter side of the work of the Conference, but at some future date, the Rotarians so desired, he would he very glad to deal with the more serious work in which he and the other Dominion Prime Ministers were

Mr. Warren was very appreciative of the hospitality extended to the various Prime Ministers who attended the Conference. Accommodation was provided at the very best hotels; motor cars were also at their disposal, and on the radiator top of each Prime Minister's car was the flag of his Dominion; the Chief of Police also furnished them with passes so that they would not be tied up in street traffic. It was gratifying to note that the line of policemen at Whitehall soon began to recognize e Newfoundland flag, and the right way was quickly provided for the Newfoundland car. An amusing incident, however, was the fact that the chauffeur who was apparently engaged for the occasion became quite ated when given the blue pass card rom the Chief of Police. He was filled up so much with his sense of I authority that he thought he had the right to run down any of the traffic officers at sight. Going to the theatre ne night, one of the traffic officers neld up the car, but the chauffeur duly ensible of the rights of the blue pass which he held, became incensed and pushed the front of his car into policeman. The superb dignity of the London police was quite upset for the moment, and trouble began to brew. However, nothing was heard about the incident. On another occasion near Piccadilly, the chauffeur took it upon himself to pull out of the Isual traffic line in order to forge shead but when he found it necessary get back in the line again, he could do so, and the resulting jamming the traffic required the services of five policemen to get the Newfoundland car straightened out.

Running the gauntlet of the numrous photographers was an ordeal which was very embarrassing. The first morning Mr. Warren landed, the camera man snapped his party on Brook Street, and this photo was shown in one of the newspapers the next day. Thenceforth they were snapped at least five times a day. Every time he and his party made an exit from a train they were made stand in line on the platform for e benefit of the camera men. At the opening of the Conference there were at least 70 photographers and oving picture men. Yells of "stand please" were quite frequent, and rime Minister Smuts, who refused to tand for the camera men, was given column of newspaper sarcasm next

Regarding the personalities of those tho attended the Imperial and Political and Economic Conferences, Mr. Warren said, that perhaps the most interesting character was Mr. Baldwin. He is rather a shy man who does not strike one as an outstanding political figure, but one could not help being struck with his straightorwardness and honesty of purpose. In appearance he is very similar to that of Mr. Warren's self, An amusing incident occurred at a dinner when Commodore Hose, who had met Mr. Warren 20 years ago, hearing that he was coming expressed his pleasure at the anticipation of seeing him, and remarked to Sir Patrick T. McGrath and Sir M. G. Winter, who were present, that he would easily recognize Mr. Warren. Just then Mr. Baldwin entered and Mr. Hose stepping up quickly to him said "welcome Warren old man." Of course explanations were in order and the error adjusted in laughter. Shortly after Mr. Warren arrived and made his way to Sir P. T. McGrath and Sir M. G. Winter, who were in conversa-tion with Commodore Hose, and they told Mr. Warren of the mistake which and been made. The characteristic feature of Mr. Baldwin is his tact. 

The most striking event witnessed by Mr. Warren was the War Memorial Service at Westminster Abbey, at which the Royal Family, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Cabinet Ministers, etc., were present. The impressiveness and pathos of the scene will long be remembered, and tear-dimmed eyes could be seen everywhere when the ceremony closed. Mr. Warren had an interview with the King on two occasions, and his Majesty was very reminiscent of his visit to Newfoundland. He had vivid recollections of the Grand River at Codroy, and even gave a description of the fall Pool. The banquet given by the Lord Mayor of London was a most brilliant and gorgeous affair, and Mr. Warren's recital of the passing around of the loving cup was quite amusing.

The Prime Minister was accorded hearty vote of thanks for his pleasing and interesting address. Among the guests were Rev. Dr. Curtis, A. B. Morine, Hon. R. K. Bishop, Dr. W. Roberts, J. C. Jardine, J. C. Hepburn, N. Duley, W. A. McKay, L. E. Emerson, H. A. Winter, C. F. Bond Halifax, and F. E. Pittman.



#### DIXMUDE LOCATED. MARSEILLES, Jan. 4.

A wireless message has been intercepted reporting that searchers by means of captive balloon sent from Toulon have located the position of the French Dirigible Dixmude, which met destruction with all hands on board in the latter part of December. The wreck according to these messages lies in about twenty fathoms of water within a circle of half a mile in radius, three miles South of Cape San Marco, Italy. A Bizerta despatch reports finding two bodies off the coast, believed to be victims of the Dixmude disaster.

The position of the derelict which is the British schooner Governor Parr wrecked months ago and abandoned at sea was given as 45.48 North and 42.48 West. The Governor Parr has been reported at various times since she was abandoned. Ten days ago the United States Coast-guard cutter Taupa was sent out to find and destroy the menacing hulk, and succeeded in taking the wreck in tow on New Year's Day but the towing hawser parted yesterday during a gale and shortage of fuel forced the Taupa to make for Halifax.

#### Paying for the Wheat Pool

The opinion of a Western large-cale farm operator, who this year larketed one hundred cars of wheat, regarding the wheat pool experiment is that it is merely adding one additonal operation to the marketing machinery, and increasing the cost of that machinery by three-quarters of a cent a bushel, without providing material benefits. And as three-quarters of a cent a bushel is not added to the price to the consumer he figures that eventually it must be deducted from the price to the producer.

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This bears out the opinion of The Financial Post that there can be no benefits from a change in the marketing system unless the costs between the producer and the consumer can be reduced thereby. Efforts to boost the price of wheat to the consumer must in the long run prove futile. The justification for the pool experiment then was the hope that the cost of marketing might be reduced. If the result is that the cost is merely increased through the establishment of an additional handler of the product who turns it over to the elevators without performing any real service, the producer will be the loser to just that

The price to the consumer is ruled by world conditions. All wheat-producing countries compete. Even if it were possible to pool all the wheat in the world the raising of the price would automatically reduce consumption. Carrying wheat from one season to another would merely increase the costs between producer and consumer by the storage and interest charges and it is evident that the former rather than the latter would have

to bear this in the long run. All efforts to reduce the costs of marketing, co-operative or otherwise, are to be encouraged. Anything that will increase the profits of the farmer will benefit the whole community. But the success of the co-operative efforts of the California fruit growers in organizing a new industry for an unsupplied market should not be confused with an experiment in changing a wheat marketing machine which has been rendered highly efficient through generations of development. -Financial Post.
