

LONDON, July 12 (A.P.)-America is being used as the horrible example by the English anti-prohibitionists in

The Rev. Wyndham Heathcote, of Maidstone, recently addressed a meeting at the Corn Exchange, during which he described the working of the ilicit drink traffic in the United States as he observed it on a recent trip. He produced canes, dummy books and even a cigar capable of carrying small quanities of liquor which he stated were used, with many other novelties, in a continual if unlawful service. America under prohibition, he declared, had become a more corrupt, more criminal and drunken nation.

The speaker said he opposed proh bition because it was subversive to democracy and was opposed to Christianity. The democracy in him, he said, was too strong to allow him to compel his neighbor to do what he did not want to do in the conduct of his private affairs. anese boycott of American goods as required to make business better a result of the passage of the exclusion law by the United States Senate will merely react as a boomerang against those making the protest, in the opinion of leading Japanese industrialists and merchants.

"The United States would never feel a hovcott such as the Japanese people could practice." said N. Ikeda a director of Mitsui and Co. "The United States is so big, has such an enormous domestic market and so many customers in other parts of the world that the elimination of Japan as a buyer would have very little effect on that country. But to Japan such a boycott would be a terrible blow. Japan is virtually dependent on the United States for a wide variety of basic materials. If Japan were to cease buying from the United States, it would mean that she would have to get along somehow without using imported machinery such as we receive from across the Pacific, without petroleum, lumber and raw cotton. If we attempted to secure these things from other countries exclusively, it would be to our disadvantage much more than to the Americans. The whole proposal is childish and rash."

Baron Shibusawa, regarded for many years as the best friend of the United States in Japan, but who expressed deep regret at the action of the American Senate, similarly described the boycott as futile and ill-

"If Japan wants a boycott, let it be a boycott of luxuries and let it be applied to every country," said the baron. "If Japan wants to get out of its present economic dopression, there is one thing that will hasten the change more than anything else and that is concerted abstinence from luxuries."

Shibusawa has urged Japanese immigrants to settle in Formosa, Korea and Hokkaido now that they have been debarred from the United



New York, July.-The Ghetto is still in a state of disquiet and extra police patrol its teeming streets as a result of a recent outbreak of racial and religious antagonism which followed the death of Jennie Lefkowitz, wife of Dominick Scola, for love of whom she had renounced the religion of her own people and thereby started a flood of religious hatred which for a time threatened to cause serious rioting in the neighborhood. On the day of the woman's funeral mob demonstrations were subdued by force as the police escorted the body accompanied by the husband and his friends to the Church of the Most Precious Blood and thence to Calvary

4. The City. all react upon the welfare of the child, that is why the Infant Mortality Rate is recognized as the most sensitive index to the health of the Community.

It is our endeavour to get the Infant Mortality Rate of St. John's lower than it is. Let us take a short survey of the life of a child to five years and thus show how these last three months we have been trying to make our children and therefore our City healthier.

ANTE NATAL.

There is very little ante natal work done in the City and therefore to some extent our foundation is upon "sand instead of rock." My Committee authorized me to start an Ante Natal Clinic but I have been hindered in this by not having suitable rooms, and in order to get any success in Ante Natal work conditions must be favorable to get the mothers to come, I am determined this coming quarter to get this work established, as every day we are seeing the necessity for it.

The birth of the child in the first ten days of the puerperium is not for us to deal with, as the mother and child during this time, come under the care of the medical profession and mid-wifery service. At the birth of every child a Doctor should be in attendance, as there are no recognized certificates for midwives in this country at present. Under these circumstances, the following figures are of interest:-In the month of June, out of 102 cases. 54 had 'Doctors, 48 had "Midwives" with no Doctor in attendance.

Our Post Natal work depends to some extent on the midwifery and the lying-in beriod; and therefore we are bound to take interest in, and have knowledge of, the birth of the

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POST NATAL.

The baby being ten days old, our work as recognized by the Public, now begins. But I nope I have made it clear, that in the saving of Child Life, to get a strong healthy nation, and the infant mortality rate low. there must be adequate and efficient ante-natal work and good midwifery. The baby is ten days old, and a large percentage of babies are strong and well at this age. We want to keep them well.

HOME VISITING.

This quarter we have done 2,257 home visits. We thus come in contact with the surroundings in which Baby has to live, and see the difficulties so many mothers have to fight against; so with a wide understanding we try and advise and help, as much as we can for Baby's good. I would like to mention here the necessity of a District Nurse in St. John's. Only this morning one of the nurses had done 4 visits, which by right should have been done by a Visiting District Nurse, not a Child Welfare Nurse.

WELFARE CENTRE.

Our activities at the Welfare Centre have greatly increased this quarter. At our weighing and consultations afternoons, we had 424 attendances. This figure we would like to see larger. So many in the City think the Sick Baby is the one to come to the Centre: but this is quite wrong, it is the Well Baby we

can advise on feeding so much bet-3. The need for minor operations is noted and referred to general

practitioner. 4. Abnormalties noted for Institutional treatment. (This is one time when our work is disappointing and discouraging. No Children's Hospital. Can we not get one?)

5. We help with the clothing, and so try to make baby comfortable. so many are either underclothed or overclothed.

DENTAL CLINIC.

At our Dental Clinic we have had 16 cases. We have had sufficient experiences in June and July to merit firm establisment of this Clinic. cannot lay sufficient stress on the importance of this clinic as a preventive means of giving mother and baby Health. 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
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
