City Improvements and the Dole

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.-The spending of \$10,000 per week by the Government in able bodied relief without any returns cannot be successfully defended in a town like St. John's, every street of which cries out for much needed improvements. Until the need for the spending of this money is passed the Government should place this amount at the disposal of the Municipal Council, not as a loan bearing interest, but to be spent for the benefit of the unemployed on profitable work It is nothing short of Legislative crime to spend \$40,000 during a fine month like April without returns, when we consider that we have not a ecent length of sidewalk clear of Water Street. If we cannot afford concrete sidewalks, we certainly can have graded gravel walks. How many tourists will pay us a second visit after ruining their shoes as they stumble along our rough, uneven and stony sidewalks.

LeMarchant Road is one of our most used streets, especially Sundays and evenings, yet the people cannot use the sidewalks which represent succession of miniature hills and valleys. This is typical of the majority of our streets. If those in receipt of the dole were given pick, shovel and rake under competent inspectors the sidewalks of our town could be transformed, and if permanent sidewalks cannot be made then use tarvia. This material is cheap and stands up under horse traffic, so why not use it for sidewalks? The city has never received more than 10 per cent. of its per capita grant for roads from the Government, and is certainly entitled to the above consideration.
