THE STORM AT CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, NOV 17—The electric storm to day extended from the Atlantic coss to a point beyond Omaha, and from Kansas City north to the terminus of tel-graphic communication. The first began to be felt about 4 am and increased in intensity till 9:45, when communication from every direction was cut off. The switch board was on fire a dozen times and half a dozen keys of the instruments were melted by the current. The du lex and quadruplex wires were rendered entirely useless. Word was received from Milwautkee that the atmospheric electrity coming in on a wire from the country has send at immense power as to keep the electric lamp burning.

"When the amalgamation of the Great unpunctuality and carelessness which in bygone times were synonymous with Grand Trunk management have reappeared over the entire system. The late change is one which has worked adversely to the public interests in every way, and confirms all our predictions as to the danger of permitting any single company to establish a monopoly of traffic."

It almost takes one's breath away to read the above, after what the Globe did last winter, while the local house was in session. At that time the Grand Trunk and its allies were applicants for charters for new lines west of Toron:o, on the ground that competition with the Great Western was necessary for the traffic of the peninsula. Application was at the same time made for power to amalgamate together the Midlaud cystem of railways, erst of Toronto, it being well understood that all the roads included were virtually to become part and parcel of the Grand Trunk system. The Globe, under these circumstances, threw its influence in favor of competition west of Toronto, and in favor of amalgamation east of Toronto. That was rather a mixed kind of railway. policy, to be sure, for a leading journal; but it was the policy of the Globe. The logic of it must remain an everlasting

We cannot give the Globe credit for having been at that time so ignorant as not to know that the Grand Truck's demands for competition west of Toronto were part of the sura egy adopted for forcing the Great Western into fusion. The Globe now laments a result which itself very much helped to bring about. There was a crisis in the railway amalgamation business Ontario last winter. Had the Globe then stardily taken the ground that no railway amalcama ion whatever should be allowed in Oats io, as far as the people of this prevince could prevent it; had it said boldly-"the separate identity and independence of the Creat Western must and sha'l be prese ved "-we doubt whether fas on would have been a fact to-day. But even this was not all. With startling incorsis ercy he Globe actually supported the Grand Trunk Midland amslosmation schene, for the country east of Toronto, thereby making it e'f a Gund Trunk organ and advocate all through. In view of all this the Globe's present derunciations of "G and Truck monopoly" show a breadth of the kand front of brass perfectly astoundi g to behold.
