Detroit, Aug. 21.—The inquest on body of Mrs. Phipps, who was shot by her husband on the steamer Hope on Sunday evening was held in Windsor yesterday. After the evidence was taken the jury retired to consult, but were unable to agree upon a verdict. The inquest was adjourned great many people in Detroit yes-terday expressed the hope that Phipps would not be extradited, and give as a reason the certainty of his pun-ishment by hanging if tried in Canada. The Michigan law imprisons murderers fer life. The question as to where the crime was committed is an interesting one, and opinions as to the effect the matter will have on the case differ. 


