TO BE CONSTRUCTED FROM MONTREAL TO WINDSOR.

That is Among the Railway Applications sent in to Ottawa—The Record of the Sealing Vessels—Mr. Costworth's Proposal for Despatching Our Volunteers—The Premier and Mr. Hall Caine.

Ottawa, Oct. 18.—Applications for railway legislation next session are expected to pour in. Mr. W. B. McMurich, president of the Nipissing and James Bay Railway, gives notice that his company will seek to amend the bonding powers of the company as may seem advisable, and especially to authorize bonds to be issued upon sections of railway, to extend the time of completion thereof, to authorize the company to amalgamate with, lease or acquire any other railway, and to enter into agreements for the operation of the railway by any other company.

Application will be made for an Act to legalize and confirm a lease by the G.T.R. Company to the Lawrence Electric and Power Co. of the G.T.R. line between the G.T.R. and Windsor.

A striking application is that to incorporate the Canadian Electric Railways, Toronto and London, with power to build a branch line from Toronto to other points on the main line to support a branch, and with power to build branch lines for a radius not exceeding 25 miles from any point or points on the main line, etc.

According to official advices received from the total sealing catch for the Canadian fleet this season amounts to 2,750, against 2,475 last year. WILL FIGHT IN VENEZUELA.

BRITAIN WILL PROTECT HER RIGHTS AT ALL HAZARDS.

Mr. Chamberlain Cables Instructions to Secure Maxim Guns to Defend the Frontier of Guiana Against Venezuelan Invasion—The Minister of War Recommends the Military Force Recommended.

London, Oct. 18.—The St. James' Gazette makes some highly important and sensational statements regarding Venezuela, which seem to show that the dispute between that Republic and Great Britain has assumed a very grave aspect.

It says that since the Rt. Hon. Jos. Chamberlain announced his resignation as Secretary of State for the Colonies, he has paid close personal attention to the dispute between that Republic and Great Britain, and that he has taken the initiative in directing in part the administration of affairs of the British colony of Guiana, adjoining Venezuela.

The fact that the British Government is so actively engaged in the defence of the frontier in this manner is positive evidence that the Imperial Government will not tolerate a repetition of the Venezuelan incident, and that it intends to hold the frontier with the Chamberlain line by force if necessary.

Mr. Chamberlain's hand, it appears, has been felt in the Local Executive Council, and the St. James' Gazette adds: "We are now able to give the tenor of a remarkable despatch in which the British Government has directed towards the colonies. The document is of much importance, inasmuch as it contains instructions to the Governor of British Guiana, Sir Charles Cornwallis, to take the most active measures to secure the frontier of the colony against the advance of the Venezuelan army."

Toronto, 18th October, 1895. UNIVERSITY-BIOLOGICAL MUSEUM.

Recently to be opened to the public at certain hours of the day.

The announcement of the formal opening of this Museum in the immediate future renders a short description of the building and its contents timely. It forms the central portion of the Biological Building, and although accessible to students from the eastern door, which is the principal entrance, the western entrance, which is approached by a handsome flight of steps, will soon be open to the public during certain hours in the day. Within this floor is a vestibule from which the main floor of the museum is reached, and which contains a large section of Douglas pine, presented through Mr. Callaway of the C.P.R. The section is polished, and its annual rings disclose the fact that the tree was born in about 1860, and had already attained a diameter of over two feet by the time that Columbus set his foot on the Continent of America. There are marked on the prominent dates in the history of biology at the corresponding annual rings, so that the tree gives a graphic picture of the development of the sciences. An interesting historical relic is to be found inside, a table which there is good evidence to show belonged to Harvey, the great English anatomist, and which bears the label-creditable to the imagination of the Curator—"On this table Harvey first demonstrated the circulation of the blood in 1615."

The Museum proper occupies approximately the same space, some 1500 feet, as did the old museum in the Main University building, so long a favorite resort of the public, but it is destitute of the architectural pretensions of the latter, and instead of being a single room with a high roof and lighted from above by windows, is now divided into four rooms, with rows of windows on the north and south respectively. In this way considerable additional floor space is secured. While the rooms of the first floor are reserved for the terminated animals, one of those up stairs is devoted to the lower animals, and another in which the magnificent Herbar collection is first arranged. The principal lobby is destined for the mechanical side of the Museum. Connecting the two floors is a staircase, which forms a prominent feature of the Western facade of the building, and which is decorated interiorly with a series of busts of distinguished biologists, the gift of Vice-Chancellor Muck. On entering the north room of the ground floor, one is first attracted by a group of gorillas, lately placed in position, the skins of which were recently brought back from Africa by Mr. R. L. Garner of monkey-warehouse fame, and by him presented to the University. Mr. E. Gerrard has succeeded in giving a very life-like expression to the handsome musk-ox presented by Mr. Joseph Tyrrell of the Geological Survey, and mounted by A. Pride of the University museum. Recent to this, such as the turtle heads deposited by Mr. McTavish of

the Hudson Bay Company, caribou heads presented by Professor Pike and a magnificent hippopotamus skull brought back from Africa by Mr. Geo. Lewis. One of the greatest curiosities contained in the museum is the nearly complete skeleton of the extinct sea-cow of Behring's Island, presented by Dr. George Dawson, director of the Geological Survey. His former dimensions can be estimated by comparing it with its near relative—the Dugong below (the gift of Dr. Garner of Lucknow, Ont.) and the comparison inspires respect for the healthy appetites of those ancient mariners who in the beginning of the century succeeded in eating up the last of those monsters.

The specimens referred to are to be found in the cases on the south wall of the room, while the free cases standing by the windows are occupied with specimens and models evidently more of use to the student than of interest to the general public. Many of these are accompanied by elaborate explanatory labels, which seem to justify the definition of an American museum as a collection of instructive labels accompanied by instructive specimens.

Where both sides of a model have to be examined, space and money have been saved by introducing a mirror behind the series of objects. Throughout the museum attention has been paid to the visibility of the specimens displayed, and no objects have been placed at such heights as to render their inspection uncomfortable. So also the view of the objects is not interrupted by the glare of the glass—large sheets of plate glass being employed framed in iron, and of which material the cases are constructed after a pattern designed and employed by Dresden. Messrs. J. & J. Taylor, the manufacturers, were responsible for carrying out this work, and have succeeded admirably in a case of construction hitherto new to them. The smaller free cases are placed on storage cases formed of sets of interchangeable drawers, in cherry cabinets (the work of Messrs. Rogers & Co.), and the red tone of these offers an agreeable contrast to the dark green color of the iron work.

As this museum is intended primarily as an educational museum for the express purpose of illustrating the teaching in the Biological Department of the University, no effort is made to display large quantities of specimens stored away. The collection of large series for systematic purposes is rather the function of the future provincial museum than of a small special museum of the character of this one, which, it is hoped, will grow by the careful and judicious expenditure of gifts of specimens presented. Prof. Ramsey Wright is hopeful that some citizens may be tempted to follow the example of Mr. William Christie, whose liberality made possible the purchase of the handsome series of corals to be seen upstairs.

While the north room is confined to the quadrupeds, the south room is given up to the remaining vertebrates, and contains some of the handsomest specimens, although many of them, as elsewhere throughout the museum, bear traces of having been rescued from the great University fire, and packed away since then in inadequate space.


