PUBLIC MEETING OF SHAREHOLDERS AND THOSE INTERESTED IN THE ERECTION OF AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION BUILDINGS

On Saturday afternoon last a large number of the shareholders and others assembled at the Court House, in this town, for the purpose of hearing the final report of the committee, appointed by a former meeting, in regard to the location selected by them for the erection of suitable buildings for the holding of Agricultural and Industrial Exhibitions for the County of Annapolis.

In accordance with resolutions passed at a public meeting held at the Court House, Bridgetown, on February 12th, the committee appointed from said meeting, together with representatives from Agricultural Societies, met at Buckler's Hotel. President of Committee, Edmund Bent, Rev. Mr. Gray, Boyd Magee, Calvin Marshall, DeLancey Harris, Mr. Woodbury, Edwin J. Elliott, Representative from Bridgetown Society, A. Vidito, Paradise, W. H. Bishop.

On motion by Mr. Woodbury, seconded by A. Vidito, Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed from this meeting to examine the proposed grounds at Annapolis and Bridgetown, and to report to this committee at its next meeting.

The Committee met on the 6th inst., and further adjourned until the 16th inst., at 10 o'clock, when the following report was submitted:

BRIDGETOWN, Mar. 16th, 10 a. m. The committee appointed to examine the sites at Bridgetown and Annapolis, beg leave to report that they have attended to the duty, and would recommend the one at Bridgetown as the most desirable.

After the reports were handed in a lively discussion was indulged in, and in relation to the merits or demerits of the place selected. When through, the regular work of the meeting commenced. It was moved and passed unanimously that the company be now formed, and that the necessary officers be chosen, in order that the work be at once entered upon, when the whole amount of stock is taken up, which passed. The following were then chosen as the officers:—William Miller, of Clarence, President; Eugene P. Troop, of Granville, and Robert Fitz-Randolph, of Bridgetown, Vice Presidents; T. D. Ruggles, Treasurer; J. E. Sancton, Secretary, A. Vidito, DeLancey Harris, Col. E. H. Parker, Charles Ramsey, Walter Steadman, Edmund Bent, and James Cornwall, Directors.

HOSPITALS FOR THE INSANE.

Hospitals for the insane were first founded among the Mohammedans and the earliest among Christians appear in Spain, the country most influenced by Mohammedan thought. The reason is that Christians for ages deemed madmen a sort of diabolic possession, fit to be treated only by exorcism or violence. The Mohammedans on the contrary considered a lunatic as possessed by divine inspiration and therefore to be regarded with respect and kindness. Both were in error, but the latter error was certainly the more humane in its results. It is a happy thing that in our day the truth is distinctly recognized, and careful provision made for those afflicted by the worst malady to which the flesh is heir. Indeed the care taken of the insane may be safely used as a test of the ripeness of civilization in any community.

W. & A. RAILWAY VS. WESTERN COUNTIES RAILWAY.

The Honorable Judge in Equity has delivered judgment in the cause of the Windsor and Annapolis Railway Company against the Western Counties Railway Company, in favor of the plaintiff company on all the points. The judgment was lengthy and elaborate, and contained a minute discussion of all the questions involved. Among the most important points decided was that the Act of May, A. D., 1874, by which the Windsor Branch Railway Company, was ultra vires of the parliament of Canada, and was therefore insufficient for the purposes contemplated. The case was argued on the 27th of February last past, on a demurrer to the bill of the plaintiff company. J. N. Ritchie, Q. C., and H. M. C. Henry were for plaintiffs; and Hon. James McDonald, Q. C., N. H. Meagher, and J. S. D. Thomson for defendants.


