



New Markets for Canadian Products. When, as a remedy for the evils that were supposed to be imminent on the passage of the McKinley bill, it was proposed to seek out new markets in which to dispose of our surplus products, the proposal was laughed at by some of our contemporaries of the country and city press, moved, perhaps, to such utterance, more by pure party feelings and motives, than by a due ration of the subject. Scarcely had this untimely and unpatriotic cachination subsided when the news came of the successful shipping of eggs to the London and other English markets, on which they had been sold for prices nearly, if not quite, equal to those obtainable in Boston or other American towns. To the Maritime Provinces this was excellent news, especially when it was coupled with the fact that the steamship companies declared their intention to fit out their ships with refrigerators and other necessary appliances, in order to preserve eggs and fruit fresh on the passige, and to make the rates for freight as low as possible. So much for one article of export, which is largely confined to these

It is now stated that living lobsters will sock disposal in English instead of American markets, and, judging from what has been done in that line from the port of Yarmouth to Boston, we may fairly expect other things being equal, a large exporta tion of these shell-fish to the larger and nore profitable market afforded for thei sale in England. Again, when Canada's manufacturers of agricultural implement had to contend with those made in the United States in foreign markets, the former proved more than a match for the latter. The Messieurs Massy, of Ontario have already obtained a large control of the Australian markets for their goods, and now that Canada is rapidly becoming a large flour and grain exporter, why cannot her miller's supply the demands of the nearly monopolized by our cous the way. It appears to us, that, in view of the transport facilities now enjoyed by Canada, and soon to be further expanded, it is no longer in the power of the United States by any tariff legislation to injure her permanently in her growing and prosperous home o


