TRUST COMPANY EXPANSION.

There are signs that the steady in-There are signs that the steady in-crease in the number of trust com-panies, which has been going on the past ten years, is to be checked. It would appear that the demand for these institutions has been fully satisfied for institutions has been fully satisfied for the present. Indeed there can be no doubt that there had been an overpro-duction, and that time is needed for the development of new business ie-fore new companies should be created. fore new companies should be created. The time has passed for the organiza-tion of a company simply to facilitate the underwiting of some new securi-ties, or for the purpose of providing a tenant for a vacant building. An increase, when it comes, should be a

increase, when it comes, should be a healthy growth.

In the past six years 28 new trust companies have been established in this state and the increase in the re-rources of the companies has amounted to more than one billion dollars. Last year ten new companies were formed, in this city, with a capital of \$7.00,—one of the existing companies increased. year ten new companies were formed, in this city, with a capital of \$7,000, their capital by \$4,500,000. In one year the increase of Trust Co. capital and surplus amounted to about \$25,000,000. The important announcement is made that at least three other trust companies, besides the Union Trust Co., intend to withdraw from their clearing house connections because of the control panies would withdraw. But since then the contrary opinion has pre-vailed, and even now, that three are preparing to retire, the belief is that most will remain in.
