Is it a temperance society? Not distinctively, though it always heartily supports any work which promises to be effective in reforming men. What, then, is the Young Men's Christian Association? It is an organization whose object is to seek out young men, to extend to them sympathy in discouragement; to lend a helping hand, if needed; to surround them with good influence; to draw them out of bad, and into good company, out of the saloon and into the house of God; and finally to win them to Christ. It will not do to omit or slur over this last point. The word "Christian" is an essential part of our title, and we are not yet sufficiently "advanced" to be ashamed of Do you like the platform? 
We take the following from a recent number of the Oakland (California) Y. M. C. A. Bulletin.

IX weeks ago, our Visiting Committee found a young man, in the Newland House, in a destitute condition, dying

with consumption, and without a hope beyond this world. The committee had him removed to the Hospital, where he was taken care of by the institution, the committee furnishing watchers, and such extras as the hospital did not After some conversation in supply. reference to his soul's salvation, he became anxious, and finally gave himself into the hands of his Saviour, and bore his severe sufferings with wonderful patience, and would repeatedly say, "Jesus is with me." We were called to his bedside at half past 2 o'clock, on the afternoon of June 27th, to witness his departure for the world above. His last words were, "Say amen," signifying that the end was near and he was ready. The funeral services were held in our hall, Wednesday afternoon, June 28th, at 2 o'clock. A large number were present, many bringing floral offerings.

As is well-known in Oakland, the hall of the Young Men's Christian Association used to be a billiard and bar-room; and strange to relate, this young man was the bar-keeper, on the very floor where his remains were laid during the brief services preceding the burial.

Such a case of the reclamation and peaceful end of a young man, all alone in the world, is an encouragement to every friend of Association work.
