- Five hundred and sixty sovon Missionries hava been engagod in the past yoar in the various fields. They are thus distributed:-In Asia, 135 ; in Africa, $121:$ in Anstralia and the Pacific, 60 ; in America and tho West Indies, 2.18 ; in
Europo, 2. There aro also about 1,200 catechists and lay teachers, mosily natives in heathen countries; and about 250 students in colleges abroad.
