ORIGIN OF THE INSTITUTION.

At a Meeting of the Staff and Corps in the Garrison of Quebec, held on the 11th of May, 1816,

The following Resolutions were unanimously agreed to :

1. THAT a Garrison Library would, under proper Regulations, be a source of great advantage, as well as of rational entertainment, to the Officers of the Garrison of Quebec.

2d. That the plan of the Garrison Library at Gibraltar be followed in the formation and conduct of that now to be formed.

AND,

At a meeting of the Committee, held on the 2d January, 1821, (present His Excellency Lieut. General the EARL OF DALHOUSIE, Patron of the Institution, and ten Members,) the following fundamental and By-Laws, collected and arranged from the original Regulations of the Society, by a sub-Committee appointed for that purpose, received the sanction of the Committee.

FUNDAMENTAL LAWS.



I.

ALL Officers in His Majesty's Army, resident in the Garrison of Quebec, are *entitled* to become Subscribers.

II.

Officers of the Royal Navy and Gentlemen holding certain situations under His Majesty's Civil Government are *eligible* to become Subscribers. (See Resolution of 19th May, 1818.)

III.

Clerks in Public Departments, and Gentlemen residing at Quebec, who have held commissions in His Majesty's Service, may be admitted as honorary members, with the consent of the Committee of management.

IV.

Ladies in the families of Subscribers are entitled to become Subscribers, without being required to pay the original deposit.

V.

Subscribers are to have a life-interest, which is not to be affected by their absence, in the property of the Library, without the power of transferring their share to any other person whatever : but any resident subscriber withdrawing from the society, forfeits all interest in the Library, and cannot be re-admitted but at the discretion of the Committee of management.

VI.

The amount to be paid on admission, by Military and Naval Subscribers, shall not be less than three days full pay for each rank : and by the gentlemen referred to in No. II, not less than the sum of five pounds, Halifax currency, exclusive of the annual subscription.

VII.

The annual subscription shall be four dollars, to be paid in advance half-yearly, on the 25th May, and 25th November.

VIII.

Gentlemen holding Civil situations under Government, and those who have held commissions in His Majesty's Service, may be admitted to the Library on payment of the annual subscription only, and in this case will be considered Honorary Members, and not entitled to a share in the property, or a vote in the management of the Library.

IX.

Subscribers who leave the Garrison shall, on their return, be considered Members of the Library on paying the annual subscription and conforming to the then existing Rules of the Society.

X.

Subscribers, who are about to leave the Garrison at the commencement of a half-year, are not to be called on to pay the half-yearly subscription for a broken period of less than two months; and persons wishing to join the Society at a broken period, are only to pay their original deposit and proportional part of the annual subscription up to the next half-yearly period.

XI.

The Commander of the Forces is requested to become the Patron of the Institution.

XII.

There shall be a General Annual Meeting of all the Subscribers on the second Wednesday in January; at which time a Committee of management is to be appointed for the ensuing twelve months; and the old Committee is to give over the accounts to the newly elected Members.

XIII.

It belongs to a General Meeting of the Subscribers to make, alter or rescind any of the fundamental Laws of the Society, and to determine other matters of importance. The President of the Committee may convene a General Meeting at his discretion.

XIV.

The Committee is to arrange every thing relating to the selection, purchase, and binding of the books and papers; to enforce the Regulations of the Library; to audit the accounts of the Treasurer; to prepare such reports as it may be deemed necessary to lay before the General Meetings, and to make such rules, not affecting the Fundamental Laws of the Society, as occa-

sion may require: these rules are to have the force of Laws till they can be decided on by a General Meeting. In all discussions of the Committee, the President, or Vice-President presiding, shall have a casting vote.

XV.

The Committee is to consist of a President, Vice-President, Librarian, Treasurer, and Secretary, to be chosen by the General Meeting; together with the Chaplain to the Forces for the time being, and two Officers from each Regiment, one from the Royal Artillery, one from the Royal Engineers, one from the Commissariat, one from the Medical Department, and one from the General Staff; who are to be appointed by their respective Corps and Departments.

XVI.

The Committee is to meet on the first Wednesday of every month, at 12 o'clock, in the Garrison Orderly Room, or at any other time and place which they shall appoint, to transact the business of the Society; and any five of them with the President, or Vice-President, shall be competent to act.

XVII.

If one of the Members of the Committee, elected by a General Meeting, be absent from the Garrison for more than two months together, or absent himself for more than three successive Meetings of the Committee, unless prevented by sickness, the Committee is to elect another Member in his place. And if any other Member of the Committee be absent, as above stated, the Corps or Department that appointed him, is to be called on to name another Officer in his place.

XVIII.

Every thing affecting the Society, that may take

place at a Meeting of all the Subscribers, or of the Committee, is to be entered in a book of minutes, kept by the Secretary for that purpose.

XIX.

The Librarian, with the concurrence of the Committee, shall limit the time for perusing each volume, and the fine to be paid for every day that the volume is detained beyond the time allowed. A printed label, stating the number of days and the fine *per diem* shall be pasted inside the cover of every volume.

XX.

Any Member, whose half-yearly subscription shall be two months in arrear, after having been called upon for payment by the Treasurer, ceases (*ipso facto*) to be a Member, and shall not be re-admitted at any future period, without paying double the amount of the half-yearly subscription.

XXI.

Should any Book or set of Books, &c. be lost, damaged or defaced by drawing or writing upon it, or otherwise injured the Person in whose name it was entered at the time it was issued shall pay double the original price of the Book or set, or such part thereof as shall be determined by the Committee.

XXII.

No Book belonging to the Library is to be lent by a Subscriber to a Non-Subscriber; or to be transferred from one Subscriber to another.

XXIII.

The names of the original, and of all future Subscribers, shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose

by the Secretary. And a Register shall be kept in a conspicuous part of the Library-room, of the names of all persons who shall contribute the value of Five Pounds, more than the amount of their original deposit, to the benefit of the Institution.

XXIV.

A Book shall be kept in the Library-room by the Under-Librarian, in which any Subscriber may insert the name (adding his Signature) of any work, which he may wish to recommend to be added to the Library, and the Committee are to decide upon the purchase.

XXV.

Military and Naval Officers visiting the Garrison, and persons not eligible to become Subscribers, may be admitted to the Library-room, when introduced by a Subscriber; but are not to have Books issued to them.

BY-LAWS.



I

No Book of general reference is to be taken out of the Library-room, and the Committee will determine what Books come under this description. Officers of Engineers may, however, be permitted to borrow any Book of Fortification from the Library, which is marked as a Book of reference, for a period not exceeding one Month.

II.

With reference to No. 19, of the Fundamental Laws, the Forfeits are established at the following rates, for each day's detention of the Book beyond the time fixed, and they must be paid when the Book is returned.—

For {	A Folio or Quarto.....	6d.
	An Octavo or Duodecimo.....	4d.
	A Pamphlet.....	2d.

And no Subscriber shall have a second book issued to him, until he has paid for exceeding the time with the former. The time specified within the cover is to comprise a clear number of days, besides the one on which the Book is delivered ; and it is to be returned by 12 o'clock on the day following the expiration of the allotted time.

III.

In order that the above Regulation may not lead Subscribers into unintentional expences, on account of forfeitures, which they may be subject to pay from neglecting to return a Book in due time, through duty, absence, or any involuntary mistake, notice shall be given by the Under-Librarian to each Subscriber, when one day's forfeiture is gone upon the Book in his hands; he may then renew the time in the Book, unless it should be wanted, in which case it must be returned, with one day's forfeit, for the use of the Under-Librarian, as a compensation for his trouble in sending. If any one refuses to comply with these terms, he shall be liable to the fines daily increasing, and the affair shall be laid before the Committee at the next Monthly Meeting.

IV.

Whoever applies first for a Book to the Under-Librarian shall have it, and the rest in order, as they make application, but if two or more apply at the same time for one and the same Book, the preference shall be determined by lot. When any person applies for a Book that is engaged, the Under-Librarian must let him know when it will be at liberty; and, if he desires it, his name shall be put down, and he may have it the next, if no other person's name is down for it.— If he does not come, or send for it, on the day on which it is returned to the Under-Librarian, or on the day following, the Under-Librarian may let any other person have it. But should the Book wanted, come in before the limited time for reading it be expired, the person who first applied, may have it immediately sent to him, provided he will pay the bearer 3d. for taking it to him, otherwise not. Whoever knowingly takes a Book before his turn, when the Book is reserved for another Subscriber, and does not return it on or before the day it was due to the person who has his name first upon the list for it, shall be obliged to

pay two days' forfeiture, as inserted in the Book, and return it immediately to the Under-Librarian, when sent for.

V.

The forfeits shall be received by the Under-Librarian, and all paid by him into the hands of the Treasurer, with the exception of the first day's.

VI.

No Pamphlet or Periodical Publication is to be taken out of the Library-room, until one month after its arrival, except by the Commander of the Forces.

VII.

It is expected that silence be observed in the Library-Room. Servants coming for Books are not to enter the Room, but to remain at the door until they receive an answer.

VIII.

The Newspapers are to be laid on the Library Table for one fortnight after their arrival ; at the expiration of which time, they are to be filed, in order that the Subscribers may be enabled to refer to them. They are not to be taken out of the Room.

IX.

Subscribers shall be entitled to two volumes of a Novel at the same time ; and if the work does not exceed three volumes, they shall be entitled to the whole ; but each volume is to be returned at the expiration of the period allotted for reading it, under the penalty expressed on the printed label.

X.

With reference to No. 2, 3, and 8 of the Fundamental Laws, the name of any Candidate for admission to the Library, as a Subscriber, is to be exhibited in the Room for at least ten days previous to a meeting of the Committee, his name being supported by that of the Subscriber proposing him, and seconded by another.

XI.

The Library shall be open every day except Sunday, the hours to be regulated from time to time at the Monthly meeting of the Committee.

XII.

Such Members of the Committee, as may be prevented from attending the Monthly Meeting, shall communicate the cause of their absence to the Secretary, previous to the Meeting.

XIII.

All Books are to be returned into the Library on the first day of May, and the first day of November in each year, for the inspection of the Librarian. Subscribers, not returning Books in their possession, shall be fined one Dollar. A period, not exceeding three days, will be allowed for the inspection, during which no Books will be issued.
