BOILER EXPLOSION KILLS 7.

Happened in N.C. Sawmill and Other Employees Had Lucky Escape.

Newborn, N.C., Jan. 18.—Seven people, all colored, were killed instantly today by the explosion of a boiler in a sawmill owned by S. A. Sullivan, in James City, near the mill. The mill was demolished and the boiler practically destroyed. No explanation of the explosion has been given. The mill had shut down a few minutes for the repairs of a belt, many of the employees having gone into the yard, thus saving their lives.

SEES MORE YANKEE INVADERS.

London, Jan. 18.—The Quarterly Review publishes a long article by S. J. McLean dealing with the economic and industrial combinations in the United States. Extracts from the article are published in the Review. The article, by the views expressed are colored by the writer's individuality. St. Paul's Church Holds Its Annual Meeting, Showing a Prosperous Year.

Church Managers Design

But St. John's Presbyterian Congregation Straightway Elects a New Set in Hamilton.

PASTOR INTERFERED WITH RIGHTS

But the Session Backed Him Up and There is a Nice Row on.

HAMILTON, Jan. 18.—(Special.)—What is known as a church row took place at the annual meeting of St. John's Presbyterian Church to-night. Some time ago the pastorate of Rev. John Young, M.A., resigned because the session of managers wanted approval of a request that he should preach better sermons. The congregation stood by his pastor, and he finally withdrew his resignation.

The trouble broke out again to-night when E. J. Wilson read the following clause in the Board of Managers' report: "We forbade for funds that we would have to close the church for the purpose of creating a regular monthly meeting in October it was resolved that a statement be prepared and read to the congregation, showing receipts and expenditures from Jan. 1, 1903, to Oct. 1, 1903, which showed a deficit of \$881.72, and also an announcement asking aid in order to reduce their arrears and that the regular constitution of the church be received. This statement and announcement were handed to our pastor, but he declined to read them, and the session ordered his action. We strongly protest against any such interference with the rights of the managers and the congregation, and we believe it to be detrimental to the welfare of the church."

The pastor explained tonight that he had read the report, and that he had no objection to it, but that he could not figure out how there could be an overdraft. He said the deficit was caused by the session's action in July 1, 1903, on a resolution, which was not due till Jan. 1, 1904, and that the session had not approved it. A list of disbursements was read, and the pastor was criticized by the managers, but was not allowed to speak. The session stood by him, and refused to read the report. The managers then handed in their resignation, and were accepted.

WANT 4 PER CENT. BONDS
GRAND TRUNK'S DEMAND

If It is Granted, the Cost of the Road
Will Be Increased One-Third
to the Country.

Montreal, Jan. 18.—(Special).—A
World map got some rather startling
information from a source that, while
it may not be friendly to the Grand
Trunk, is on the inside as far as the
situation in London is concerned.

First, that neither the Grand Trunk
Pacific nor the Canadian Northern
(Mackenzie and Mann) for that matter,
can market the 3 per cent. bonds voted
them by the Canadian parliament last
year for their projects unless at a heavy
discount. The Grand Trunk says they
must have 4 per cent. bonds instead of
3. This advances the cost of the road
as far as the country is concerned by
one-third more than it was computed
last session.

Next, the Grand Trunk refuse to enter
into any commitments as regards the
eastern section of the Grand Trunk Pa-
cific. They will run the road but they
will guarantee nothing in connection
with it.

Third, that the only way out of the
situation is for the Grand Trunk to
consolidate with Mackenzie and Mann,
abandon a lot of the eastern section and
reconstitute the whole agreement. The
World's informant declared that some
kind of negotiations looking to this
end were now on in London, where
Mr. Mackenzie has just arrived.

HOW MILLS VIEWS SOME THINGS
Favors Government Control of the
Express Service.
