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

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CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT.

To the Vestry and Congregation of St. James' Cathedral :

The Churchwardens beg to submit herewith their accounts, for the year ending 29th February last, together with the Auditors' Report thereon.

From these accounts it will be seen that although the amount received from the Congregation for Vestry purposes, during the past year is in excess of that contributed during the preceding year. Much more liberal contributions will be required from the congregation generally to make provision for the ordinary and necessary expenditure for the work of the Church.

The appeal made at the meeting of the congregation, held in February last, was not responded to so generally as was expected. There was, however, \$4612.37 subscribed towards the deficit of the past year, and of that amount \$2659.37 was paid prior to the 29th February, and \$1618 has been received since that date, leaving \$335 yet to be paid of the amount so subscribed.

During the past year the attendance has not been so great as the previous year owing to various causes, one of which doubtless was the interblending of the Temperance Association with the Young People's, and the holding the meetings alternately.

During the winter we have been favored with addresses and readings by the Rev. Canon DuMoulin, the Rev. A. Townend, the Hon. S. H. Blake, and others.

The efficiency of the musical part of the programme has been largely due to the exertions of Mr. W. A. Geddes, whose labours and energy were indefatigable.

We would call attention to the prizes offered by the Association for the best examination on Ryle on St. John, Nelson on Infidelity, and Geikie's Reformation. The competition is open to all young men (not divinity students) members of any Association in connection with the Church of England in the city, and copies of these works will be lent to any intending competitors.

COTTAGE MEETINGS.

The object of these meetings conducted by members of the Devotional Committee of the Young People's Association is, primarily, to reach that large class who seldom attend Divine Service.

The meetings are held in dwellings located in the poorest districts of the Parish, and form the medium of reaching over 200 persons weekly. By this means many are gathered into the Church, children are induced to attend the Sunday School, and the seeds of eternal life sown in many hearts.

The work this season has been encouraging. A special feature has been the introduction of temperance work with gratifying results, particularly at the meeting held in the "Model Lodging House," Lombard Street, at which the pledge of "total abstinence" has been signed and kept by a large number of persons, many of whom had been victims of intemperance.

The social tea-meeting was held on Friday, March 21st when about 500 attendants at the cottage services met in the school house. Addresses were delivered and magic-lantern views exhibited. A most enjoyable and profitable evening was concluded by a bountiful repast, furnished and dispensed by the ladies of the congregation.

The expenses in connection with this work, about \$4 per month for each meeting, are defrayed by special collection. We cannot conclude our report without acknowledging the hearty co-operation and assistance in the work by the Ladies' Aid and District Visitors' Association, to whom, in no small degree, its success is due.

DISTRICT VISITORS' SOCIETY.

During the past nine months the Ladies report the following work done: 4,004 visits paid, 4,748 tracts distributed, 86 children promised, and in many cases brought to Sunday School, 20 adults led to promise attendance on Divine Service, and 68 Relief Tickets given to those in need. Many boarding houses have been visited by the ladies, and some of the young men induced to join the Sunday Morning Bible Class.

Special mention must be made of the temperance work done in some of the districts.

One month's report shows an addition of 20 to the ranks of the Cathedral C. E. T. S., 18 of whom were heads of families, and 21 children to the Band of Hope, the work of one visitor, many others also doing good work in this cause.

The Sewing School has likewise had its numbers enlarged by the efforts of the District Visitors. During the past few months several of the workers have been laid aside from sickness or other causes, or we think the number of visits, &c., reported would have been considerably larger.

One or two have been added in the past year, among whom we gladly welcomed back Mrs. Strachan.

A serious loss was felt in the retirement of Mrs. Gilmor, who for nearly a quarter of a century has been one of our most faithful, earnest workers. Such blanks are hard to fill. There are at present some six districts in urgent need of visitors.

On the whole, however, the report for the year is an encouraging one.

The Home and Foreign Mission Aid Society.

We send in our report this year, with thankful hearts, feeling that we have made more real progress than ever before.

This year we commenced holding missionary meetings every month, when letters from our missionaries and reports of their work have been read. Our great desire has been to make these meetings so interesting, that the members of our church would enjoy coming to them, and that hearing of the vast work being done in the mission fields, and of the pressing need of labourers and of funds, they would be induced to give willingly. The results of this effort already affords considerable encouragement; but we beg that every body in the congregation will try and attend these meetings which are held on the second Friday of each month, and are always given out by the Rector on the preceding Sunday.

The Bishop of Saskatchewan looks to us for \$400 towards the salary of the Rev. H. Bourne, Missionary to the Black-foot Indians at the Blood Reservation, Fort McLeod. This year we also have to pay the additional sum of \$75 for travelling expenses in connection with the mission.

The Bishop of Saskatchewan addressed one of our monthly meetings, telling us of the needs of his large Diocese, and interesting many in its work.

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Beaconsfield, Manitoba, to which we have this year contributed \$101.75, has been for some time without a Clergyman. The Bishop of Rupert's Land, writes that this has been a source of great disappointment to the people there, and deplores the difficulty of getting men to fill the vacant places in his Diocese.

A new and interesting branch of work has been taken up this year, namely, the Zenana Mission, or work in behalf of women of India. We send our contributions through the Church of England Zenana Missionary Society, a branch of the C. M. S., for distribution.

We are glad that we have been able to help a little ; this year we have sent \$323.86. Of this \$41.59 came in the envelopes, which are given to any who will take them, one for each month, to gather during that time the stray cents and little silver pieces which can be saved, by small acts of self-denial.

The young ladies have formed a working party which meets once a fortnight at private houses, and they are making gifts to send out for the pupils in the schools in India to be distributed at Christmas. They are found very useful, in inducing the children to attend at first and also in helping the missionaries to gain an entrance into the Zenanas. Their letters often express grateful thanks for such gifts.

A little has been done for the Society for the propagation of Christianity amongst the Jews. Extracts from accounts of their work have been read at our meetings, but this we have only commenced, and hope to have more to tell about it another year.

The Rev. W. F. Campbell, General Secretary for the Board of Management of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada, addressed one of our meetings, and henceforth a statement of our work and contributions will be sent to that Board.

Altogether \$1,192.15 have been raised during the year.

But this sum represents the interest and money of only a small number of our congregation, and we appeal to all who in the past have not taken any active interest in missionary work, to come forward and find out for themselves what a fascinating field of labour it is, and to bear their part in responding to our Lord's command: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature."

THE SEWING SCHOOL.

The Sewing School opened as usual the first Saturday in October. There are 175 children on the books in attendance varying from 90 to 130. The increased attendance made it necessary to occupy the large School-room which has proved a very beneficial change. We record, with much regret, the resignation of Mrs. Wyld and Mrs. Campbell, in former years president and manager. Since then Mrs. DuMoulin has acted in both capacities, assisted by Miss Cook and Miss Himsworth. Up to the present date, March 15th, 260 articles of clothing have been cut out by them, and a very large number of handkerchiefs hemmed by the younger children, some only five and six years old. The funds have been provided as follows:—\$3.73 in hands since last year; \$33 subscribed by different members of the congregation; a grant of \$18 received from the Dorcas Society; \$50.61 paid by the children. Most of the materials are sold at half price. The School will be continued till the end of May, when it will break up for the summer. Prizes will be distributed for good work and attendance. The ladies connected with the School are:—Mrs. Grasett and Mrs. DuMoulin, Patronesses; Mrs. DuMoulin, President and Manager, assisted by Miss Cooke and Miss Himsworth.

**Church of England Temperance Society, St. James'
Parochial Branch.**

ANNUAL REPORT

This branch was organized on Friday the 18th May, 1883, when a constitution and by-laws were adopted.

Since then five meetings have been held in connection with the Young People's Association, and two meetings separately.

Much interest in this special branch of the work of the church has been manifested, we have now on the register eighty-five (85) members belonging to the General Section or Non Abstainers, and three hundred and ninety (390) Total Abstainers, making with the Juvenile Section (Band of Hope 470) nine hundred and forty-five (945) members.

In addition to the above two meetings of the Central Organization have been held in the School-House.

This work has also been brought before those attending Cottage Meetings, through these meetings and in other ways. It is hoped many slaves of intemperance have been rescued.

It is felt that at least a satisfactory beginning has been made in a useful and important work of the church.

THE CATHEDRAL BAND OF HOPE.

Was organized June, 1883, when 74 members were enrolled. On Nov. 3rd, a meeting was held at which officers were appointed, and order of meetings arranged.

The meetings are held every fortnight, on Saturday afternoons, at 3 o'clock, and are open to all children. Songs and recitations are given by the children, and an address delivered by some friend of the cause. After the opening responsive service, a black-board lesson is given by the chairman.

Through the kindness of Mr. Lloyd, of Wycliffe College, a magic lantern entertainment was provided for the children on Monday, March 31st.

THE CATHEDRAL HOME.

This Institution is as yet of a very simple kind. The Rector being conscious of the helplessness and discomfort of many of our aged Pensioners, at the beginning of last winter rented the house 34 Sherbourne Street. Six of our aged people were removed there. One was placed in charge of the premises. A comfortable hall stove was purchased, coal laid in, a room allotted to each, and a large room on the first floor reserved for Divine Service, and for weekly Cottage Meetings. The Home on this limited scale has been a great success. Its inmates are very sensible of the greater comfort enjoyed therein, and the facilities afforded the Clergy at all times to visit them and know their condition. A Sunday afternoon service for those unable to attend the Cathedral is held in the Home, with monthly Communion, by the Rev. R. Greene. A Cottage Meeting is held every Tuesday Evening. The Home is regularly visited by the Clergy, by Mr. Beatty, and by some of the district visitors. The inmates are comfortable and happy, and the Home is so managed that the cost to the Parish has not been thereby increased. It is hoped that the adjoining house may be rented at May, and the remainder of our aged pensioners gathered into it. Thanks are due to a member of the Cathedral by whose liberality coal was provided, and the Home well heated during winter. The inmates were provided with dinner together at Christmas, and tea at Easter.

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NORMAL SCHOOL Class. Rev. R. Green, Teacher. The Devotional Class in connection with the above institution, has been rather larger than in past years, and the attendance regular. Two of the class are preparing for confirmation, and one intends after June studying for the ministry.

HOSPITAL.

The Hospital has been visited regularly every Thursday afternoon for the past year by Rev. D. Hague. Generally there are about five patients who belong to the congregation but often ten or fifteen. They belong to that class that more zealous efforts should be made to get hold of, viz.: those who attend regularly, without having their names on the church books. The work in the Hospital is most gratifying. Four or five of the ladies of the Cathedral are among the most earnest visitors there.

THE IMMIGRANTS.

This largely increasing class has demanded and received much attention. With the arrival of every steamer at Quebec those bound for the west are met by the Church of England Chaplain, and provided with a letter of introduction to the clergy at their destination. Many persons presented themselves to your Rector during last winter when their arrival in a strange land was to be regretted. To some timely and greatly needed aid and sympathy were given. For others employment was obtained, while more were helped on their way to other places. "The Shed" was regularly visited by Mr. Beatty, and much was done by him to help those strangers to future usefulness and independence. Their arrival in midwinter is to be deprecated, and it is hoped that by representations in proper quarters, they will in future reach our shores at more seasonable times.

THE JAIL.

A weekly service is held by the Scripture Reader, Mr. Beatty.
