MAGISTRATE FINDS WHITE NOT GUILTY

Of Charge of Resisting When Officer Crawford Tried to Arrest Him--Police Officer Severely Criticized by Judge Ritchie in Court Today.

The Crawford-White case was finally disposed of in the police court this morning when Judge Ritchie, after reviewing the evidence at some length, declared that Crawford was not justified in striking White on the head with the baton when he was down, and while he declared the prisoner guilty of drunkenness, for which he imposed a fine of \$8 or two months in jail, he pronounced him innocent of resistance.

COMBINED CIRCULATION OVER 15,000

ST. JOHN TO BE TERMINUS OF ALL THE C. P. R. STEAMERS

Plans for Next Season's Sailings Have Been Completed—Arrangements Same as Last Winter Leaving Mails Only at Halifax.

Montreal, July 16—According to present arrangements, the Canadian Pacific railway Atlantic steamships will again make St. John their winter port and, as last year, Halifax will be utilized only as a port of call to embark and disembark the mails.

Friday, Nov. 22, and from this side on Dec. 7. The new steamer Corvian will leave Liverpool on Thursday, Nov. 28, and from this side on Saturday, Dec. 14.

STORE COLLAPSED AND SEVEN KILLED

London, Ont., July 17.—Seven persons were killed and several others injured by the collapse of W. J. Reid's Crystal Hall grocery store here last evening when men were excavating under it.

At 1 o'clock this morning work of rescue was in progress, and very few details can be obtained. A large number of clerks, including young girls, were taken out in an injured condition and it is supposed there are more in the debris.

NO DEMAND FOR BONDS

The Investing Public is Very Apathetic—The Experience of Union Pacific and Atchafalaya. (New York Commercial) Despite the declaration by a "high official" of the Union Pacific Railway Company to the effect that "We have sold them all, I am glad to say, and Union Pacific is financed for at least a year to come," the fact remains that this statement as to its bond sale is only technically true; its offering to stockholders of \$75,000,000 in convertible 4 per cent debentures at 90 had been underwritten by a syndicate at 88, a payment of 20 per cent of the full amount having been due and paid on Wednesday; but it is very generally understood that the stockholders did not subscribe for more than \$3,000,000 of the \$75,000,000 offered—less than 7 per cent of it. And responses to the Atchafalaya offering of \$20,000,000 in 5 per cent bonds at par were only very slightly more in proportion—possibly for \$4,000,000 of the securities, or about 20 per cent. All sorts of reasons may be advanced for this apathy of the investing public in the matter of bond issues—its declination, in one instance, of a well-secured promise to pay \$4.40 a year on every \$100 invested—but the real explanation lies largely, no doubt, in the conditions pointed out by the Commercial last Monday: That the three great life-insurance companies, through the operation of the new "trust" laws, have about \$100,000,000 a week less for investment than formerly; and wholly regardless of the extent to which they may be stockholders in the railroad companies in question, this impairment of a demand of \$1,000,000 per week has been a factor, not without influence upon the general market for securities; naturally this has produced investment indifference on Pacific stock holders' part, and And in view of the continued menace of government interference in the conduct of the business of the country, it will probably be some time yet before pecuniary cash to invest will get into anything like a scramble for bonds of any sort.

In Cwms, England, municipal gas works have netted \$55,000 in five years, which has been applied to reduction of the city's indebtedness."

A GRATIFYING RESULT

In our Ottawa despatches of yesterday there appeared the pleasing announcement that Mr. Butler, deputy minister of railways, had refused the application of the Atlantic, Quebec & Western Railway Company for approval of its route map, locating its railway from Metapedia to St. Leonard and thence up the valley of the St. John River to Edmundston.

A great deal has been printed of late about enterprising cities whose merchants have raised funds for advertising to promote the growth of population and industries. An interesting report comes from Dallas, Texas.

The action of the New Brunswick government in vigorously protesting against the proposal to parallel the International Railway will meet with general approval upon the part of the people of the province, which is deeply interested not only in the financial success of that railroad but in concentrating, as far as possible, the trade of the Gaspé peninsula at Campbellton.

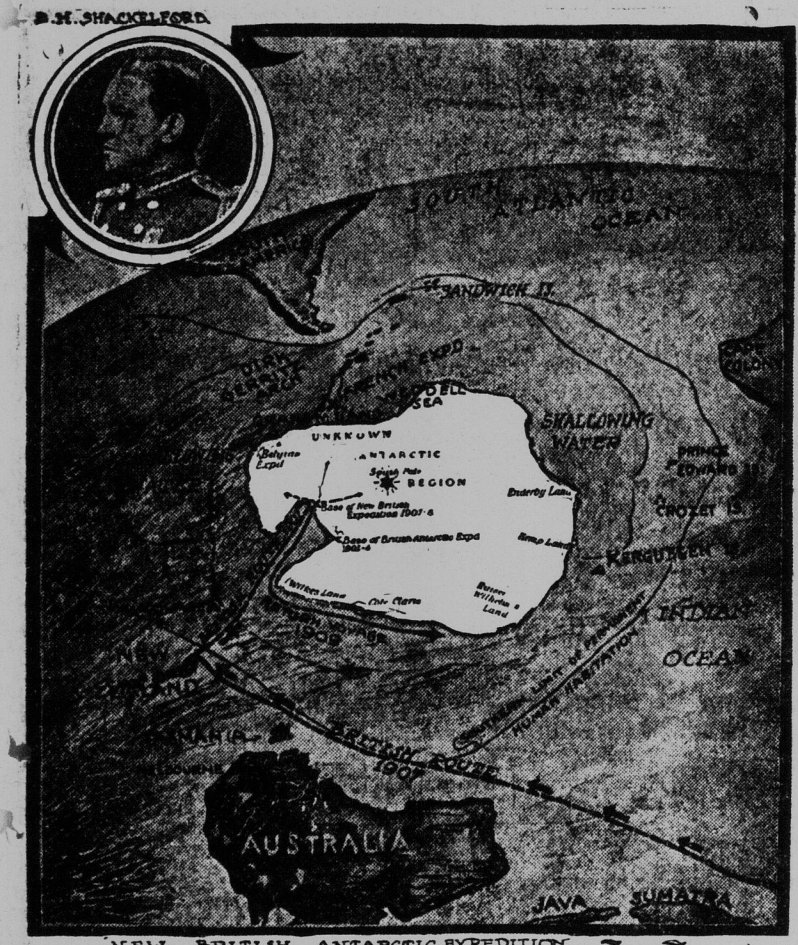
