





students will as far as practicable, be present at the opening lecture, so
as to lose none of the early teachings in the several branches.

The Treasurer and other members of the Faculty will be in attend-
ance at the College on Wednesday, September 18th, 1901, and the follow-
ing days, up to the date of the opening of the session, from 10 a.m. to 12
noon, and from 2 till 4 p.m., to register the names of intending stu-
dents, and to give such information regarding Lectures, etc., as may be
required.

The faculty records with pleasure the constantly increasing prosperity of the College. The last Session was one of the most successful in its history, both as regards the classes in attendance and the assiduous work done by the students in all the years.

THE CONSTITUTION OF TRINITY MEDICAL COLLEGE.

Trinity Medical College has the great advantage of being governed entirely by its own Faculty, composed of Medical teachers of long experience who are fully conversant with all that constitutes a thoroughly practical medical education.

TRINITY MEDICAL COLLEGE IS, AND HAS BEEN FOR MANY YEARS, AN ENTIRELY INDEPENDENT, SELF-GOVERNING, AND SELF-SUSTAINING INCORPORATED BODY OF MEDICAL TEACHERS, QUITE SEPARATE AND DISTINCT FROM EVERY OTHER. UNDER ITS OWN SPECIAL ACT OF INCORPORATION, THE COLLEGE IS EMPOWERED TO ENTER INTO AFFILIATION WITH ANY "UNIVERSITY OR UNIVERSITIES" WITH WHICH IT MAY BE DESIRABLE IN THE INTEREST OF THE STUDENTS TO HAVE IT CONNECTED. THE COLLEGE, THEREFORE, RESTS ON THE BROADEST POSSIBLE BASIS, AND IS IN AFFILIATION WITH

Trinity University,
The University of Toronto,
Queen's University,
The University of Manitoba.

Students attending Trinity Medical College have thus every advantage that ample University connections afford, under which they can, by conforming to the curriculum laid down by the several Universities named, go up for their degree, before any one or more of these. In addition, they have the opportunity of presenting themselves for the several "Trinity Medical College" Examinations, which are held under the provisions of the SPECIAL ACT incorporating the College. Full particulars regarding these Examinations are given on another page of this Calendar. They are equivalent in every way to those required for a University degree in Medicine, and if successful the candidate obtains the "Fellowship by Examination" Diploma. This qualification is fully recognized, separately and conjointly, by the several Examining Royal Colleges of Physicians and Surgeons in Great Britain, as well as in the United States.

Britain and Ireland, with precisely the same exemptions from various parts of such examinations, as are allowed to holders of University Degrees.

Under its special Act, this Medical College is represented on the Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, and upon its Examining Board. It is, therefore, possessed of every privilege enjoyed by any Medical teaching body in the Dominion.

Full instruction is given in Trinity Medical College in all the subjects for the degree in Medicine required by the several Universities with which the College is affiliated, and by the Medical Council of Ontario.

Since the inception of an Eight Month's Session, Summer Sessions are no longer required by the Medical Council.

The Faculty has been greatly gratified by the high standing the students of Trinity Medical College have, for many years, taken at the Examinations of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, and of the various other Medical Bodies at home and abroad, before which they have presented themselves. This clearly shews the **HIGHLY PRACTICAL AND THOROUGH CHARACTER** of the **TEACHING** given in the College.

METHODS OF TEACHING.

Ever since its organization, "**EFFICIENCY, with the BEST TEACHING IN EVERY BRANCH,**" has been the motto on which the College has been and will continue to be conducted, and to this its great success is undoubtedly due.

The only modification made in this Institution for many years was the passing of an Act by the Legislature in 1887, raising "Trinity Medical School" to the standing and dignity of a "Medical College," a position well earned by many years of successful teaching.

TRINITY MEDICAL COLLEGE GOES ON, AND WILL GO ON, ADVANCING AND IMPROVING Session by Session, and keeps fully abreast of the rapid advances of science in every branch of Medical education, and of the requirements laid down by the Ontario Medical Council.

LECTURES.

All the lectures, except those on Clinical Medicine and Clinical Surgery, are delivered in the College Buildings, situated in the immediate vicinity of the Toronto General Hospital. The College has found it

useful to Medical students from the very beginning of their studies, and a great saving of their valuable time, to have all the lecture rooms where they study the nature and the various forms of disease, AND EVERY BRANCH OF SCIENCE RELATED TO MEDICINE, as close as possible to the General Hospital, where cases are seen through their whole course, which practically illustrate what is gone over in the class rooms. The Clinical teaching is all done in the Hospitals. Very special attention has been paid to the fitting up of the Lecture and Dissecting Rooms, Laboratories, etc. They are large, well lighted, and contain every appliance required for Practical Teaching. The Trinity Laboratory in the General Hospital, where the students see practical work relating to disease, is furnished with all that is required for the most careful investigation of morbid products.

BUILDINGS.

The Faculty continues to make every improvement necessary for the comfort and convenience of the large classes in attendance.

Although it is not many years since the erection of our commodious Medical College Buildings, the attendance of students has increased so much as to require from time to time more ample accomodation, and large additions have been made. The buildings have been greatly enlarged throughout, so as to meet all requirements of a well equipped Medical College. The latest additions and improvements are those made in the Laboratories and in the Departments of Practical Anatomy Histology and Pathology, while the heating and electrical lighting of every part of the College, is all that can be desired.

There are in the College two equally spacious lecture theatres, a Laboratory for Practical Histology, one for Practical Chemistry, and one for Pathology and Bacteriology. THESE AFFORD ALL THE PRACTICAL FACILITIES WHICH MEDICAL STUDENTS REQUIRE, OR CAN USE, IN LABORATORY WORK. The Laboratory for Practical Chemistry has been much improved and completely re-equipped.

THE DISSECTING ROOM

is spacious, lighted from the ceiling, and for SANITARY REASONS, IS ENTIRELY SEPARATE FROM THE REST OF THE COLLEGE BUILDING. Large additions have been made to it, comprising a Demonstrator's Room and another room admirably arranged and furnished with finely marked specimens for the special study of the bones, and cross-sections, as well as others, of all parts of the body ; also Vat Rooms, Wash Rooms,

etc., etc. It is furnished with every modern requisite of a Dissecting Room. The entire arrangements for the study and teaching of Practical Anatomy receive such attention in this College, as to have them as perfect as they can be made, taking the best European Schools of Anatomy as the models. The perfect isolation of this Building is considered by the faculty as essential to the health and comfort of the Students.

THE ANATOMICAL AND PATHOLOGICAL MUSEUM AND READING ROOM is one of the largest rooms in the College, well lighted from the ceiling. The Reading Room is well supplied with the leading journals and papers. There is a room set apart as a Gymnasium, and furnished with all the necessary equipment for gymnasium purposes.

MATRICULATION.

The following are the regulations of the Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario for 1901-1902.

Everyone desirous of being registered as a matriculated medical student in the Register of the Medical Council, except as hereinafter provided, shall be required to pay a fee of twenty dollars and to conform to the following regulations :

1. Any person who presents to the Registrar of the Medical Council a certificate that he has passed the examination conducted by the Education Department on the course prescribed for matriculation in Arts, including chemistry and physics, and approved by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, shall be entitled, on payment of the lawful fees in that behalf, to registration as a medical student within the meaning of Section XI. of the Ontario Medical Act.

2. A certificate from the Registrar of any chartered university conducting a full Arts course in Canada, that the holder thereof has passed the senior matriculation of such university or the examination conducted at the end of the first year in Arts by such university, shall entitle its holder to registration.

3. Graduates in Arts, in any university in His Majesty's dominions, are not required to pass this examination, but may register their names with the Registrar of the College upon giving satisfactory evidence of their identity, the presentation of a certificate of qualifications, and the payment of the fee of twenty dollars.

4. Every medical student after matriculation shall be registered in the manner prescribed by the Council, and this will be held to be preliminary to his medical studies which will not be considered to begin until after the date of such registration.

The following requirements will therefore entitle to registration with the Medical Council, as all require to do, who intend to practice in Ontario :

From 1st July, 1888, to 1st November, 1892, Second-Class Non-Professional certificate, with Latin.

Since 1st November, 1892, the Junior Matriculation certificate, with Physics and Chemistry, as prescribed by the Education Department of Ontario.

Any candidate however, who requires to take LATIN ONLY (having a certificate for everything else), and who DOES NOT INTEND TO PRACTISE IN ONTARIO, can take the LATIN at the "Trinity University Medical Matriculation Examination," which is held in Trinity University Convocation Hall in October and March in each year,* BUT EVERY CANDIDATE WHO INTENDS TO PRACTISE IN ONTARIO MUST BEAR IN MIND THAT THE MEDICAL COUNCIL SINCE JULY, 1888, ACCEPTS ONLY the Latin of the "DEPARTMENTAL PASS ARTS MATRICULATION EXAMINATION." This is repeated more than once, in order that it may be clearly understood.

Any Graduate in Arts, or Student who has matriculated as the Medical Council requires, is exempt from any further matriculation examination, and is entitled to registration in TRINITY MEDICAL COLLEGE, on payment of the fee of \$5, and to registration, as a Medical student, at the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, on payment to the Registrar of that College of the fee of \$20, and to enrolment in Trinity University on payment of the enrolment fee of \$5.



From the foregoing, students will see that there are but three ways of being REGISTERED WITH THE COLLEGE OF PHYSICIANS AND SURGEONS OF ONTARIO, as matriculates ; and they are specially asked to bear in mind that THIS REGISTRATION IS ABSOLUTELY REQUIRED FROM EVERY ONE WHO INTENDS PRACTISING HIS PROFESSION IN ONTARIO.

FIRST—By having passed the Matriculation Examination required by the Council, including Chemistry and Physics, or

SECOND—Having passed the Senior Matriculation Examination, at the end of the First Session in Arts, in a Chartered University in Canada, conducting a full Arts' Course.

THIRD —BY BEING A GRADUATE IN ARTS, IN A BRITISH OR COLONIAL UNIVERSITY.

In the case of Students, desirous of taking their Degree in Medicine, *who do not intend to practise in Ontario*, Trinity University, the University of Toronto, Queen's University and Trinity Medical College do not insist upon the Matriculation examination being passed BEFORE attendance on Medical lectures. But it is very strongly recommended that Matriculation should in all cases be passed as soon after entering the medical college as possible, where this has not been done before,—and in every case, where at all practicable, it should be attended to, BEFORE passing the Second year's or PRIMARY Professional Examination.

A certificate of having passed the MATRICULATION EXAMINATION IN ARTS, or in MEDICINE, in any British or Colonial University, or that of the Medical Council of Ontario, or that required by the various Colleges of Physicians and Surgeons in Great Britain and Ireland, or of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Quebec, or of any of the other Provinces of the Dominion, or of the Law Society of Ontario and Quebec, or of having passed an examination, whether for a TEACHER'S CERTIFICATE in any of the PROVINCES of the DOMINION (which must include Latin), or an examination EQUIVALENT to any of the above, is also accepted by Trinity Medical College and by Trinity University.

Non-matriculated students from the Maritime Provinces, Manitoba, British Columbia, the North-West Territories of Canada, the West Indies, or other British Colonies, the United States, or from any quarter who are not residents of Ontario, and therefore do not require to take the Examinations of the Medical Council, may attend lectures in Trinity

Medical College on payment of the fees. Should such non-matriculated students, however, desire to graduate at Trinity University, or at any of the other Universities with which Trinity Medical College is affiliated or to go up for the "Fellowship by Examination" Diploma, of Trinity Medical College, they must either pass the Trinity University Medical Matriculation Examination, given below, or present a certificate of having passed some other Matriculation Examination equivalent thereto, in every respect.

N.B.—THE MEDICAL MATRICULATION EXAMINATION of any of the Universities with which this Medical College is affiliated is only required by students who have not previously matriculated otherwise, and who do not intend to practise in Ontario, and while strongly recommended to be taken at the beginning of the course, MAY BE PASSED AT ANY TIME BEFORE GRADUATION. Details as to these University Matriculation Examinations are given in this Calendar, under the proper headings.

TO PRACTISE IN THE MARITIME PROVINCES, INCLUDING NEWFOUND-
LAND

Holders of the Degree of M. D. C. M. from Trinity University can practise in these Provinces, subject to local regulations.

To practise in British Columbia, the North-West Territories and Manitoba, holders of the Degree of M.D.C.M. are also subject to local regulations.

Students desiring ultimately to practise in any of these provinces should, when registered in the College, notify the Registrar of that province of the fact, and have their matriculation registered.

TRINITY MEDICAL MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

This examination is that laid down for preliminary education by the Medical Council of Great Britain and Ireland, and appears in its latest publication in 1901.

Students who have not otherwise matriculated and who do not intend to practise in Ontario, and who desire to take the Fellowship Diploma of Trinity Medical College, or to graduate in Trinity University, are required to pass this examination which consists of the following subjects :

(1) Writing and Dictation ; (2) English Language including Grammar and Composition ; (3) Arithmetic ; (4) Algebra, including simple Equations ; (5) Euclid, Books I., II. and III.; (6) Latin Grammar, and Translations from Cæsar's *Bellum Gallicum*, Bks. I., II.; *or* III. and IV.; *or* V. and VI.; *or* Cicero, *de Lege Manilia* *or* Virgil, *Æneid*, Bk. I.; also Translation of easy passages from unspecified Latin Authors ; (7) and *any ONE* of the following optional subjects *which may be selected by the candidate* : (a) Scripture History and Mathew's Gospel, ch. i. to x. incl., in Greek ; (b) Xenophen's *Anabasis*, Bk. I.; (c) French, Voltaire's *Charles XII.*, Bks. VI., VIII.; (d) German, Schiller's *Thirty Year's War*, Bk. I ; (e) Natural Philosophy, including Mechanics, Hydrostatics and Pneumatics (Balfour Stewart's *Lesson in elementary Physics* is recommended) ; (f) *or* Logic.

THIS EXAMINATION, IS HELD in Trinity University Examination Hall, ON THE SECOND FRIDAY AND SATURDAY IN MARCH, AND ON THE SECOND FRIDAY AND SATURDAY IN OCTOBER OF EACH YEAR. Applications may be made to the Dean of Trinity Medical College, or to the Registrar of Trinity University, enclosing the fee of \$5.00, at least a week before the examination. Forms are supplied on application.

LECTURES.

DIDACTIC AND CLINICAL.

The several Professors and Lecturers will illustrate their respective courses by plates, preparations, models and specimens—including the

application of the Laryngoscope, Ophthalmoscope, Sphygmograph, Spectroscope, etc., and the various forms of Electrical apparatus used in medicine. It will as heretofore, be the constant aim of the Faculty to make the entire teaching of the College as THOROUGH as possible. IN THIS COLLEGE ever since its organization, throughout the entire session, Lectures have been given, covering all the subjects, so as to meet fully the requirements of the Ontario Medical Council and all the Boards in Great Britain and Ireland. And on every subject the courses are made not only FULL, but thoroughly PRACTICAL, and they are amply illustrated.

CLINICAL TEACHING.

The **Clinical Teaching** will be carried out during the entire session at the General Hospital, and at the other Hospitals named in this Calendar.

The classes will be so divided, that at the bed-side ample opportunity will be afforded to each student of becoming practically familiar with the methods of physical examination, as well as with case-taking.

Instruction will also be given daily in the out-door department and the students encouraged to diagnose and to prescribe for Medical cases, to perform minor Surgical operations, and to act as dressers for the Surgeons.

Clinical Teaching has always been conducted as fully as possible, and in view of its very great importance SPECIAL and INCREASING attention continues to be given by the Faculty to this essential department of the course. It includes CLINICAL LECTURES, and teaching the DIAGNOSIS of Medical and Surgical Diseases at the bedside, nothing being of more value to those engaged in the study of medicine and Surgery than a close and careful observation of the numerous cases in the Hospital wards. Arrangements were made years ago, and are now very perfect, which have largely increased the amount of clinical instruction given in the Toronto General Hospital, and afford students who attend it as great facilities as are enjoyed in any part of Canada in this important department of their studies. Besides this, the number of Hospital patients is very large, and the College being CLOSE TO THE GENERAL HOSPITAL, students can readily avail themselves of the many advantages there afforded for gaining practical knowledge.

In connection with the treatment of the out-door patients who apply DAILY for advice and treatment at the TORONTO GENERAL HOSPITAL an OUT-DOOR patients' Clinic is given every day from 1.15 to 2.30 p.m. These patients are examined and prescribed for in the presence of the students. An IN-DOOR Patients' Clinic is also given daily from 3.30 to 4.30 p.m., the patients being brought before the students and everything of importance pointed out by the Lecturers in Clinical Medicine and Surgery, as well as by other members of the *Acting Staff* of the Hospital. In addition to these, there is every day (making THREE HOURS AT LEAST OF CLINICAL WORK) a BEDSIDE CLINIC ON MEDICINE and a BEDSIDE CLINIC ON SURGERY given at from 2.30 to 3.30 by members of the Acting Hospital Staff. The students attend these bedside clinics in regular rotation.

The CLINICAL Teachers on the Hospital Staff act conjointly in giving daily instruction of the most practical kind to the students in the Hospital; and as there are many such teachers, it is manifest that young men studying in Toronto receive an amount of practical instruction not exceeded anywhere on the Continent.

The giving of special daily Clinics at the bedside, as above referred to, by all the Hospital teachers in turn, is a special feature of the greatest value, in addition the Out-door and In-door Clinics mentioned. Much importance is attached to this work, and the greatest care is bestowed upon it, so as to make it as profitable to the student as it can be made.

Special Clinical instruction is given by the Professor of Midwifery at the Burnside Hospital and by other members of the Staff of the Hospital, on Diseases of Women and Children, and on Practical Midwifery,—special Practical Instruction at the Eye and Ear Departments of the Hospital is also regularly given as well as Dermatology. The Diseases of Children, may, during the Session, also be practically studied at the Hospital for Sick Children on College Street, a little west of Yonge Street. Clinical Instruction, Medical and Surgical, is also given at St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, by the members of the Faculty on its Acting Staff.

Trinity University and the Medical Council require CLINICAL EXAMINATIONS in Medicine and Surgery from ALL candidates for the FINAL examination, making careful CLINICAL study a necessity throughout the entire course.

The course on the Principles and Practice of Medicine embraces the following :

I. The General Principles of Medicine, the Nature and Causes of Disease, the Symptoms and Morbid Changes which arise in the course of disease, together with the general principles of treatment, as well as the means to be used for its prevention.

II. The Classification of Diseases, and the Description of the affections of the different Organs and Structures throughout the body.

The Lectures will be Practical throughout, and very fully illustrated by the most recent plates, also by models, and morbid specimens from the Museum, as well as by specimens from the Hospital post-mortem rooms, furnished by the Hospital Pathologists.

SURGERY.

Professor of the Principles and Practice of Surgery and of Clinical Surgery.—F. LE M. GRASETT.

Professor of Clinical Surgery.—LUKE TESKEY.

Associate Professors of Clinical Surgery.—GEO. A. BINGHAM,

The course on the Principles and Practice of Surgery embraces Surgery and Surgical Pathology. The entire course will be illustrated by preparations from the Museum of the College, by specimens from cases at the Hospital or elsewhere, and by those which may be obtained in practice, as well as by the best models and plates.

Surgical Apparatus and Instruments will also be exhibited, and their uses pointed out to the students. In the Departments of Surgery the Hospital will be used as largely as possible to illustrate the teaching, by cases of all kinds, in the theatre and in the wards.

OBSTETRICS, GYNÆCOLOGY AND DISEASES OF CHILDREN.

Professor—J. ALGERNON TEMPLE.

Professor of Pediatrics—ALLAN BAINES.

The course on Obstetrics and Gynæcology, like all others in the College, will be practical and will embrace the Principles and Practice of Obstetrics, and will be illustrated by Diagrams, by Fresh and Preserved Specimens, the Artificial Pelvis, etc. The Principal Diseases of Women form an important portion of the work taken up.

In teaching the Disease of Women, the Anatomy and Physiology of the Female Organs will be demonstrated, and the various methods of Examination fully described—the necessary instruments will be shown and their uses explained. The diseases peculiar to the sex will be considered as fully as time will permit, as follows :—Disorders of Menstruation ; Leucorrhœa, Pelvic Cellulitis ; Peronitis ; Lacerations of the Cervix Uteri and Perineum ; Urinary and Fæcal Fistulæ ; Inflammation of the Uterus ; Displacement of the Uterus ; Tumors of the Uterus ; Diseases of the Ovaries, etc.

The course on Diseases of Children will also be of a practical character, so as to make it as useful as possible to the students.

ANATOMY.

Professor—LUKE TESKEY.

Senior Demonstrator—D. J. GIBB WISHART.

First Senior Assistant Demonstrator—C. B. SHUTTLEWORTH.

Second Senior Assistant Demonstrator—B. Z. MILNER.

Assistants in Practical Anatomy—J. MCMASTER, GEORGE ELLIOTT
AND T. BEDFORD RICHARDSON.

The Course of Anatomy, Descriptive and Surgical, is made very complete, as this subject is unquestionably the foundation on which all professional knowledge is based. It will be taught in the most practical

manner possible. The relations of Anatomy to Pathology Medicine, Surgery, etc., will be fully taken up. The lectures will be illustrated by the fresh subject, moist and dry preparations, sections, models, plates and original drawings.

The College has a large supply of Disarticulated Skeletons, as well as other preparations, and a complete collection of the best models of various parts of the body, to aid in the study and teaching of this all important branch. This collection is being constantly enlarged by bones, models, etc., imported from Europe.

To facilitate the study of Osteology, students under certain regulations can procure the use of finely prepared bones belonging to the College from the Senior Demonstrator of Anatomy on payment of a small fee.

To the Department of Practical Anatomy, so closely connected with Surgery, the greatest attention is paid, and the Demonstrators, with the Assistants in Practical Anatomy, give daily attendance in the Dissecting Room, forenoon and afternoon, while dissection is going on. The Dissecting Room is large, perfectly lighted and ventilated; and under the amended Anatomy Act, recently passed by the Ontario Legislature, an abundant supply of anatomical material is secured. It is the desire of the Faculty that each student should have every facility to acquire a thoroughly practical knowledge of Anatomy in the Dissecting Room, where alone it can be properly studied.

Bone grinds are given daily to limited classes by each Demonstrator during the month of October, which every student must attend, and at the close, an Examination is conducted by the Senior Demonstrator which each student must pass, as a necessary preliminary to actual dissection.

Progress Examinations are conducted by the Senior Demonstrator from time to time upon each part, and the marks obtained at these examinations will determine the relative standing of the students at the close of the Session.

Disarticulated bones and casts are provided in abundance for home study, which students may secure on payment of the small fee above referred to.

A separate room is also provided, equipped with marked bones, models, casts, brain sections, cross sections and dissected parts, which is open at all times, where the students may study.

APPLIED ANATOMY.

Professor—GEO. A. BINGHAM.

The lectures of this course, which is now required by THE MEDICAL COUNCIL, TRINITY UNIVERSITY and TRINITY MEDICAL COLLEGE, are for FINAL students only, and embrace the most important parts of Anatomy as applied to Medicine and Surgery. This practical course will be made more extensive during the coming session than heretofore, and it is of the greatest practical value. The course is made specially interesting by being illustrated with the Lantern.

PHYSIOLOGY.

Professor—CHARLES SHEARD.

This course will embrace a description of the Elementary Tissues of the Body; the structure of the various Organs and Glands; also the functions of Respiration, Circulation, Digestion and Nutrition, Secretion and Excretion. Special attention will be given to the Nervous System, and to Embryology and Development. The last will be fully illustrated in all its stages by specimens.

The Physiological Laboratory is furnished regardless of expense with all the best modern appliances necessary for the practical study of this subject. Amongst the apparatus imported for this Laboratory are a DuBois Raymond's Coils, DuBois Raymond's Keys, Foster's Moist Muscles Chamber, Revolving Drum Cylinders, Galvanometers and Scale; Electrodes, Exciters, Mercurial Keys, Striker's Warming Stages, Hot Air Baths, etc. Further additions are being made from year to year.

HISTOLOGY.

Lecturer and Demonstrator—F. FENTON.

This subject receives ample attention from the several lectures upon the branches in which the microscope is employed; and in addition to this, very complete practical instruction is given by Dr. Fenton in the 1st and 2nd years, upon Microscopy, and the use of the Microscope in connection with Normal Histology, AS NOW REQUIRED BY THE MEDICAL COUNCIL. The best high power microscopes from Europe are provided. The various methods of injecting, staining, mounting, etc., receive special attention.

CHEMISTRY.

Professor of General Chemistry, Chemical Physics, Practical and Analytical Chemistry—W. THEOPHILUS STUART.

In this Course the general principles of Chemistry will be fully discussed and the laws and theories deduced from suitable experiments. Great pains will be taken to point out its relations and applications to Physiology and other departments of medical science. Physics, including Heat, Light and Electricity will be discussed both theoretically and experimentally, as far as they bear upon or are connected with Chemistry.

The lectures on both Inorganic and Organic Chemistry will deal more particularly with those substances and Compounds of special interest to students in Medicine and Pharmacy. Towards the end of the course a number of lectures will be devoted to Medical Chemistry.

The whole subject will be illustrated by numerous experiments, charts and drawings, every facility being afforded to students for acquiring thorough knowledge of these branches. Professor Stuart will take up the Chemistry of the metals.

Practical Chemistry is taught very thoroughly under the personal supervision of the Professor. In view of its growing importance, great care has been bestowed on the re-fitting of the Laboratory, and the Course will include experiments of various kinds, qualitative and quantitative analysis, etc., etc. In view of the many cases of poisoning coming before the courts of law, Toxicology will have much attention paid to it, no pains being spared to prepare students for the grave responsibilities which such cases impose upon them as practitioners. Each student will be supplied with the requisite re-agents and apparatus, and the course will be adapted to meet the demands of the physician in his daily practice. Special attention will be devoted to *Uranalysis*, also to the normal and abnormal constituents of the animal fluids—to tests for Blood, for Bile, for Albumen etc.—as well as to the other departments of Medical Chemistry.

MEDICAL JURISPRUDENCE, TOXICOLOGY AND MENTAL DISEASES.

Professor—NEWTON ALBERT POWELL.

This course will include :—A full discussion of the inter-relations of Law and Medicine, Medical evidence from the Inquest to the Superior Courts, the making and reporting of *post-mortem* examinations, the

signs and the phenomena of death and the various causes of death by violence, Wounds, the Examination of Blood Stains, Offences against Chastity, Abortion, Infanticide ; also insanity in its Medical as well as in its Legal aspects. Feigned diseases, Mal-Practice, Life-Insurance, etc. In Toxicology, the classification and general actions of Poisons will be considered and the common Poisons will be taken up, their symptoms, treatment and *post-mortem* appearances given, and such tests as a Physician might be called upon to make, will be illustrated before the class.

SURGICAL APPLIANCES.

Lecturer—N. A. POWELL.

This Course consists of twenty Demonstrations upon minor Surgery and Bandaging, the *technique* of Antiseptic Wound treatment, the selection and uses of the various instruments required in general and in special practice, the making and fitting of splints in treatment of Fractures, the fitting of Trusses, and of the Apparatus used in Orthopædic Surgery, the application of Plaster of Paris and other permanent dressings, the methods of inducing local and General Anæsthesia, the Medical and Surgical uses of Electricity, the use of the Photographic Camera in Medical Practice, etc., etc.

This Course is an optional one, and the fee is payable once only. Third year, as well as Final Students, should take it.

SANITARY SCIENCE AND PUBLIC HEALTH.

Professor—D. GILBERT GORDON.

This course comprises lectures upon—

Air—Its chemistry, including the constituents and impurities of external and internal atmospheres and its chemical and biological analysis. The physics of air and the influence of temperature, moisture and heating. Its meteorology, with special reference to winds, malaria, deforesting and transmission of disease germs.

Water—Its chemistry, impurities and analysis.

Meat—Its constituents, and various diseased conditions.

Milk and Cheese—The constituents, impurities, their source, adulteration and inspection.

Canned Meat—Their constituents, impurities, adulterations, changes, analysis and inspection.

Fruits—Fresh and preserved.

Soil—Its constituents, impurities, pollution, examination, methods of purification, cultivation, sewerage, drainage and how to prevent pollution.

Preventible Diseases—Origin and causes, methods of communication, methods of prevention quarantine and investigation.

Municipal Sanitation—Sanitary law, vital statistics, house construction, plumbing inspection, road building, conduct of factories, isolation hospitals, cemeteries, crematories, over-work and overcrowding.

School Hygiene—Technical and physical training, regulation of studies, heating and light.

THERAPEUTICS AND THEORY AND ART OF PRESCRIBING.

Professor—J. T. FOTHERINGHAM.

This Course of Lectures will be given with the main object of filling the gap between didactic and clinical lectures in Medicine. The point of view will be that of the drug or drug class or disease group, rather than that of the isolated ailment. General principles rather than detailed methods of treatment will be set forth. Special pains will be taken to give the class facility in prescription-writing. Remedial measures, other than drugs, will receive due attention. The course being given to both third and fourth years, will be different in alternate years.

PATHOLOGY

Professor—H. B. ANDERSON.

Demonstrator of Bacteriology and Clinical Microscopy—H. C. PARSONS.

The teaching in this department will include the following :

Lectures on General Pathology and Bacteriology, for students of the Third and Fourth years.

Demonstrations in connection with Autopsies at the Toronto General and Sick Children's Hospitals, as cases occur. Bacteriologic and Microscopic examinations of exudations, organs and tissues are made in the College Laboratory, giving the students every facility for becoming practically proficient in the making of cultures and examining the bacteria in various diseases, as well as in preserving, culturing, staining and mounting of specimens.

A weekly demonstration in Gross Pathology is given during the session, for Third and Fourth year men. For this class, museum

specimens and material procured at autopsies during the week, are utilized.

A series of lantern demonstration of Pathological micro-photographs of the different organs and tissues of the body is given. This Course supplements the work in Pathological Histology and is intended specially for Fourth year men ; Third year students may attend.

A Course of demonstrations in Pathological Histology for Fourth year's students is also given. Students are taught to harden and embed, cut, stain and mount sections. Each man receives about one hundred sections during the sessions, illustrating the various morbid conditions found in the different organs and tissues of the body.

There is also a Course in practical Bacteriology for Third year's men. Limited classes will be formed for practical work in methods of Sterilization, making of Culture media, isolation, of Bacteria, etc. The object of this course is to familiarize the student with the *technique* and the fundamental principle underlying Bacteriological work, so as to enable him to continue independent work. The study of the Common Pathogenic Bacteria will receive special attention.

A Course of lecture demonstrations is given in Clinical Pathology and Microscopy, for Third year's men and will include the examination of Urine, Blood, Sputum, Stomach contents, Fæces, Pathological exudations, etc.

The Laboratory is open from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m., a trained assistant being present. Every facility and encouragement will be afforded students wishing to pursue independent or research work.

Classes will be formed for the Pathological Examination of Blood, Sputum, Urine, Stomach contents, Fæces, etc., in the Clinical Laboratory at the General Hospital. This course is free after paying the Laboratory fee.

OPHTHALMOLOGY AND OTOTOLOGY.

Professor—G. S. RYERSON.

Clinical Professor—CHARLES TROW.

Lectures will be given at the Medical College on Diseases of the Eye and Ear, illustrated by the latest appliances—plates and diagrams. The Professor will also give special clinics in the Eye and Ear Department of the Hospital in cases of interest which may present themselves, and regular instruction on Diseases of the Eye and Ear at the Toronto General Hospital.

LARYNGOLOGY AND RHINOLOGY.

Professor—D. J. GIBB WISHART.

A practical Course of Lectures on Diseases of the Throat and Nose, illustrated by cases, plates, models, etc., will be given.

A special Nose and Throat Department has been fitted up in the East Wing of the Hospital, Where Clinical Instruction will be given TWICE A WEEK.

PRACTICAL INSTRUCTION IN OPHTHALMOLOGICAL AND OTHER APPLIANCES.

D. J. GIBB WISHART.

Instruction will be given in the College in the practical use of instruments employed in Diseases of the Eye, Ear, Throat and Nose. Dr. Wishart will form a class for students who desire in this way to become practically familiar with all the Appliances used in the special diseases of these parts. This class is an optional one, but it will be found of great practical value.

MATERIA MEDICA AND PHARMACY.

Professor—E. B. SHUTTLEWORTH.

This course will include Pharmacy: Materia Medica proper; Pharmacology, and Posology of all important drugs named in the *British Pharmacopœia*, as well as those extra officinal remedies which have for some time held a place in Medical practice, or are of recent introduction. The lectures will be illustrated by characteristic specimens of the various drugs described.

The subject of Pharmacy will be first introduced, and the student familiarized with the general processes by which medicines are prepared. The various compounds will then be considered in pharmaceutical groups, as powders, solutions, tinctures, etc., and the application of the operations of Pharmacy applied to each. Special attention will be given to the subject of incompatibility. The Inorganic Materia Medica, including its pharmacology and posology, will then be introduced, and completed before the Christmas holidays.

The succeeding portion of the course will be devoted to a similar treatment of the Organic Materia Medica.

TRINITY MEDICAL COLLEGE.

PROFESSIONAL EXAMINATIONS.

Professional Examinations will be conducted at the close of the 1st, the 2nd, the 3rd and the last sessions, to be known as the *First Year's*, the *Primary*, the *Third Year's*, and the *Final* Examinations, respectively.

I. The First Year.—Anatomy of the Bones, Ligaments, Muscles, also the Viscera of the Abdomen and Thorax. All candidates for this Examination must present a certificate of having dissected carefully at least, an UPPER and a LOWER extremity, and MUST PASS A PRACTICAL EXAMINATION on the parts dissected.

The Physiology and Histology of the elementary tissues, *e. g.*, Connective tissue, Protoplasm and Cells; also of Respiration, Circulation and Digestion.

Materia Medica and Pharmacy.—Drugs and their preparations.

Chemistry.—Inorganic, including Chemical Theory.

Physics.—Heat, Light and Electricity.

A certificate of having passed this examination is required by Trinity University, Trinity Medical College and the Medical Council.

II. The Primary.—Descriptive Anatomy, Practical Anatomy, Physiology, Histology, Chemistry (including Chemical Physics), Practical Chemistry, Toxicology, Materia Medica and Pharmacy.

The Primary or Second Year's Examination should be passed at the close of the second Winter Session. A certificate of having passed it in Trinity College, or in any recognized British or Canadian Medical College, School or University, or at the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, will be accepted by this College.

III. The Third Year's Examination.—The Medical Council requires from all candidates for the Final Examination who are not graduates in Arts,* a CERTIFICATE of having PASSED at the close of their THIRD SESSION in the College or School they have attended, an Examination in such parts of Medicine, Surgery, and Midwifery and other third year's subjects, as may be required by the Faculty of such College or School. This Examination will not in any way interfere with any of the examinations of the Council.

* Graduates in Arts will take this Examination at the end of their Second Winter's Course.

This Examination is held at the end of each **Session**, for students in their third year who intend subsequently presenting themselves for the Final Examinations of the Council, or of Trinity University, or of Trinity Medical College, and will embrace the following :

Medicine.—Causes of Disease, Physical Diagnosis of Diseases of the Chest, Physical changes to which the Nervous Centres and Abdominal Viscera are liable in Disease and Fevers.

Surgery.—Inflammation and its consequences, Dislocations and Fractures, Injuries and Diseases of Bones and Joints, Surgical Diseases of Blood Vessels, Muscles and Nerves.

Midwifery.—Anatomy and Physiology of the organs concerned in Conception, Parturition, Signs and Symptoms of Pregnancy and the Diseases of Pregnancy. The Course, Mechanism and Treatment of Natural Labor.

Pathology.—General and Special.

IV. The Final.—Theory and Practice of Medicine, Principles and Practice of Surgery, Therapeutics, Pathology and Bacteriology, Applied Anatomy, Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children Medical Jurisprudence, Sanitary Science.

A Supplementary First Year's and Third Year's Examination will be held **Annually**, beginning on the **first Saturday** in November.

CERTIFICATES OF HONOR.

Certificates of Honor are awarded annually in all the Professional Examinations to candidates who may have obtained **not less than 75 per cent** of the total number of marks.*

SCHOLARSHIPS.†

There are **Five Scholarships** offered for competition in this College as follows :

First Year.—**Three First Year's Scholarships** known respectively as **FIRST, SECOND** and **THIRD** will be competed for at the close

of the First Session. The value of these Scholarships is \$50, \$30 and \$20 respectively.

Special Prize in Physiology (Dr. Sheard's).

For the highest standing in the Physiology of the first year. This prize is given annually, value \$25.

Second Year.—Two Second Year's Scholarships, known respectively as the FIRST and SECOND, are open to competition at the close of their SECOND Winter Session to all students who have taken out their entire Primary Course at this College. The value of these Scholarships is \$50 and \$30 respectively.

Candidates who take examinations for which Medical College Scholarships and Medals are awarded, or any other College Examinations, must in every case have paid all Examination and other College fees before the Examinations have begun.

It is imperative that every Candidate who wins a Scholarship shall attend the College Convocation at which the Scholarship is presented.

MEDALS FOR THE FOURTH YEAR.

A GOLD and two SILVER MEDALS, known as the "TRINITY MEDICAL COLLEGE MEDALS," are open to competition annually at the close of their FOURTH winter session by students undergoing examinations in this College in the FINAL BRANCHES. They will be awarded to the students who stand FIRST, SECOND and THIRD respectively on the Honor list. All students competing for them must have attended at least THREE full courses of lectures out of the four required, in this Medical College, and must have paid all fees for the same.

FELLOWSHIP DIPLOMAS.

Under the authority of the Special Act of the Legislature incorporating this College, Diplomas will be awarded at the close of the Final Examinations to candidates whose standing has been sufficiently high to merit them. These Diplomas constitute students who obtain them "FELLOWS BY EXAMINATION" of Trinity Medical College, *and such "FELLOWS" are allowed in Great Britain the same privileges as are accorded to holders of Degrees in Medicine from Colonial Universities, by the Royal College of Surgeons of England, the Royal College of Physicians of London, the Royal College of Surgeons and the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh, and the King's and Queen's College of Physicians of Ireland; and also by the conjoint Examining Boards in London and in Edinburgh.*

No Candidate is allowed to present himself for examination for the COLLEGE FELLOWSHIP DIPLOMA who has not passed a recognized Matriculation Examination and spent FOUR entire years in the pursuit of Medical studies and attended during that time TWO FULL COURSES OF PRIMARY, and TWO FULL COURSES OF FINAL LECTURES during FOUR winter Sessions. Attendance on not fewer than FOUR Sessions is in ALL cases (except those of graduates in Art) absolutely insisted on by the Medical Council.* All students who are not graduates in Arts or Science, of a British or Colonial University, who entered Trinity Medical College as freshmen for Session 1889-90 and subsequently, will be required to present evidence of having attended Lectures for FOUR WINTER SESSIONS, either in this or in some other recognized Medical College, before being permitted to present themselves for their Final Examination; and at least ONE Winter course must be attended at this College. In every case ALL the subjects of the Final Examination must be taken.

A certificate of good moral character is required from each candidate.

The obtaining of this Diploma—*which is the Faculty's certificate of Qualification*—or any of the other honors granted by the College, is a guarantee of high professional attainments on the part of those who hold them. **Every successful Candidate for the Fellowship Diploma must be present in person to have it presented and must enrol his name in the official list of Fellows kept at the College. Special attention is called to this requirement.**

THE FELLOWSHIP DECLARATION.

The following is the Declaration made by all who receive the Diploma, and are admitted after examination, to the "FELLOWSHIP OF TRINITY MEDICAL COLLEGE." It is much the same as that made by successful candidates in the higher Colleges in Great Britain.

"We, the undersigned, who now publicly receive the Diploma of Trinity Medical College, and are admitted '*Fellows by Examination*' of that Incorporated Medical Body, do solemnly and sincerely declare that we will exercise the several duties of our profession in its various branches, to the best of our knowledge and ability, for the good, safety and welfare of all persons committing themselves, or who are committed

to our care and direction : and that we will not, knowingly, or intentionally, do anything, or administer anything to their hurt or prejudice, for any consideration, or from any motive whatever.

“ We further declare that we will not divulge anything we may have seen, or heard, while visiting the sick, which it would be improper to divulge. We shall, moreover, do everything in our power to uphold the honor and to promote the welfare of the Medical College whose Diploma we now receive, and to the FELLOWSHIP of which we are hereby admitted.”

HOSPITALS.

TORONTO GENERAL HOSPITAL.

This institution, which is, in every respect, under the best and most efficient management, is now greatly enlarged, and is capable of accommodating more than 300 patients in the various buildings on the grounds, and is visited daily by the medical officers in attendance. The patients—extern and intern—are examined and prescribed for in the presence of the students. In the course of a year the Patients admitted, number between 3,000 and 4,000, besides externs. The operating theatre is well lighted, having been recently greatly improved, and the seats are arranged so as to enable the students to see the successive steps of the numerous operations performed. The theatre is also, through the courtesy of the Trustees, used daily as a lecture room for the delivery of Clinical Lectures. Every Tuesday and Friday regularly, and on other days in cases of urgency, operations are performed in this theatre. It has been recently greatly enlarged and remodeled, and is the largest and finest hospital theatre in the Dominion, and is not surpassed anywhere for accommodation, light and convenience. It is capable of seating 600 medical students. Under existing arrangements the Clinical Course, both in Medicine and Surgery, is very full ; and all the numerous lectures delivered in the hospital by the various members of the Hospital Staff, are open to every student who has taken out his Hospital and Clinical Lecture Tickets. Toronto being the great railway and manufacturing centre of Ontario, accidents requiring operation are of frequent occurrence. The attendance of outdoor patients daily is also very large and increasing, and abundant opportunities are en-

joyed by students for acquiring a familiar knowledge of Practical Medicine and Surgery, including not merely major operations, but minor Surgery of every kind—ordinary Medical Practice, the treatment of Venereal Diseases, Skin Diseases, and the Diseases of Women and Children. Every year very great improvements continue to be made in various parts of the Hospital, so as greatly to increase the facilities for acquiring Clinical knowledge.

HOSPITAL TEACHING.

THEATRE CLINICS.

The teaching comprehends regular Daily Clinics *in the Theatre* on Hospital cases, Medical and Surgical.

OUT-DOOR PATIENT CLINICS.

Also regular daily Clinical Instruction on Medical and Surgical cases in the Out door Department of the Hospital. Obstetrics, Gynæcology, etc.

Burnside Lying-in-Hospital—This Hospital is also on the Hospital grounds, making it very convenient for students attending its practice and affording special and valuable facilities for the study of Practical Midwifery. One of the medical officers will be in daily attendance for the purpose of giving instruction to students. Students who have attended one course of Lectures on Midwifery and who have taken out the tickets for this Hospital are furnished with cases in rotation.

The advantages afforded for studying Practical Gynæcology are also very great and increasing year by year.

The Eye and Ear Hospital is on the same grounds as the General Hospital and gives every advantage to students desirous of making a special study of the diseases of these important organs. This Institution is fully equipped with all modern appliances.

THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN.

This large new Hospital is fully completed and affords students great advantages for the special study of Children's Diseases. It is well worth attending by all Medical Students who wish to become familiar with the many diseases of children, medical and surgical, and is one of the largest and best Children's Hospitals in the world. There are large numbers of most interesting cases of Medical and Surgical Diseases of Children to be seen in this Institution during the Winter Session, and during the entire year. Professors Geikie and Sheard are on the consulting staff, and Professors Bingham, Grasett and Powell, and Drs. Wishart, Baines, Fotheringham, Anderson, Milner, Parsons and Fenton on the Acting Medical and Surgical Staff. Dr. Pepler has been appointed Pathologist to this Hospital.

ST. MICHAEL'S HOSPITAL.

Professors Wishart, Bingham and Anderson, and Dr. Garratt and C. A. Temple are on the staff of this Hospital. A large number of Medical and Surgical cases are constantly under treatment, and Clinical instruction is given by members of the Staff in connection with the cases.

TORONTO DISPENSARY.

From 5,000 to 6,000 patients are yearly treated at this Institution. The cases are very varied comprising a large number of Pulmonary Affections and Children's Diseases. Minor operations are of daily occurrence and excellent practice is afforded in the application of splints and bandages. The hours of attendance are from twelve to one daily. This institution with all its advantages is open to students, and the attending Physicians furnish them with all possible facilities.

APPOINTMENTS OPEN TO STUDENTS.

Hospital Assistantships—The Board of Trustees of the Toronto General Hospital ANNUALLY appoints FIVE final students of this College who have graduated, as Hospital Assistants. Resident Assistantships in the Hospital for Sick Children and St. Michael's Hospital are also annually awarded to graduates of this College.* Two House Surgeons are annually appointed for Grace Hospital, which appointments are awarded as the result of Competitive Examinations, which are open to Graduates of this College. These positions are of great practical value and the recommendation for them from Trinity Medical College

* It is likely that in the near future more positions of this kind will be open to students.

will be given to those graduates whose attendance and standing at the various Examinations, and whose moral character and general conduct throughout their entire course have been such as will show them to be capable of discharging satisfactorily the duties belonging to such appointments.

Clinical Clerks and Dressers—The members of the Faculty who belong to the acting Hospital staff will each appoint two or more students to act as Clinical Clerks and Dressers, whose duties are to take notes of the cases under treatment and to carry out such directions as they may receive from the Professors. These positions are tenable for three months and are of very great practical utility. Under the above arrangements each of the Medical Officers who belongs to the College is able to appoint at least FOUR students during each session. No student can act as Clinical Clerk for longer than ONE period of THREE months during the same session.

Prosectors—There will be appointed annually two students who have distinguished themselves as Practical Anatomists, as Prosectors.

FEES.

MEDICAL COLLEGE FEES.

Registration in the Medical College, payable once only, \$5. The yearly College fee for the Eight Months' Session is \$100. This does not include Hospital, University or Examination fees, or fees for optional branches. Fees are payable in advance each year. If not paid before November 15th, \$5 extra will be charged.

Special arrangements will be made with students taking special courses.

OPTIONAL BRANCHES.

Surgical appliances—Eye, Ear, Throat and Nose Appliances. For the Fees of these classes, intending students will apply to the respective teachers, to whom such fees are to be paid.

All students, after having attended and paid the fees for two full courses of lectures on any subject, are entitled, without further charge, to a perpetual ticket for that subject, except the following: Practical Anatomy, Practical Histology, Pathological Histology and Bacteriology,

MUSEUM.

Special care has been taken in regard to the Museum in order to make it useful, not only to the members of the Faculty in the teaching of their respective departments, but also, so far as is possible, to the student himself in getting up his work. Great expense has been gone to by the College in procuring Skeletons, Preparations, Models, Apparatus, etc., and the collection is not surpassed by that of any Medical Institution in the Dominion. While, at whatever cost, nothing *practically useful* has been omitted, the mere multiplying of specimens of no *practical* value has been studiously avoided.

A large and constantly increasing number of specimens gathered from hospital and private practice has been collected and carefully put up during past years, which are used in illustrating the several lectures of the course. Large additions are made to the number of specimens every session. Many of the very finest French models and preparations have recently been added, and the collection is growing rapidly in size and practical value.

* This fee (\$34) admits to The General Hospital, The Hospital for Sick Children, and St. Michael's Hospital.

The Museum has been much improved by the addition of a very large number of the specimens of the drugs most commonly used in medicine, including the Alkaloids. The greatest care has been taken in the selection of these. They are arranged in their **orders**, as required by the Examining Boards in Great Britain and Ireland, so as to be readily studied by the students. Each year this collection is being made of still greater teaching value.

Former Graduates, Students and friends of the College may do it a great service, and advance the interests of medical science, by sending to the museum, as many have already done, any interesting specimens they may meet with in practice. They may be sent by express addressed to Dr. H. B. Anderson, Curator of the Museum, care of the Janitor, **Trinity Medical College, 41-7 Spruce Street, Toronto.**

The Curator will be glad to give all required information to students regarding specimens and preparations.

GENERAL MATTERS.

The Faculty, in order to give intending students every information, has appended to this announcement the latest requirements of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, before the Board of which, all who desire a license to practise in Ontario, whether graduates or not, must present themselves.

Gentlemen who hold certificates of Registration as qualified practitioners in Great Britain, are entitled to registration by the Medical Council in Ontario, on payment of the required fees, and on passing the required examinations before the Medical Council.

All Ontario students who intend practising in their own Province are required to take the examinations of the Council, whether they intend going into practice immediately after graduating, or going to Europe for a time to pursue their studies still further.



REGULATIONS FOR STUDENTS.

(To which special attention is directed.)

I. Students are required to conduct themselves in an orderly manner in the lecture rooms AT ALL TIMES not only DURING LECTURES, but also when neither Lectures nor Demonstrations are going on.

II. In the case of noisy or other disorderly conduct, or of doing wilful injury to college property, any student may, at the discretion of the Professor or Lecturer, be required to leave the Class Room. Persistence in this, or in any other offence against discipline, after admonition by the Professor or Lecturer, shall be reported to the Dean of the Faculty.

The Dean may at his discretion reprimand the student, or refer the matter to the Faculty at its next meeting, or he may suspend such student or students from attending the Classes till the decision of the Faculty has been reached. MISCONDUCT ABSOLUTELY DISQUALIFIES A STUDENT FOR COMPETING FOR MEDALS, SCHOLARSHIPS OR FOR ANY HONORS, OR FOR RECEIVING A RECOMMENDATION FOR ANY HOSPITAL OR OTHER POSITION.

III. While in any part of the College building, students are required to conduct themselves in the same orderly manner as in the Classrooms.

IV. When students are brought before the Faculty under these regulations they may be (a) reprimanded, or (b) suspended from classes, or (c) summarily expelled, according to the circumstances of the case.

V. Regular and punctual attendance on all lectures taken, is expected from every student. Non-attendance to any considerable extent, unless from illness, or from some other unavoidable cause, will prevent the tickets from being certified at the end of the session.

VI. Damage done to College property must in every case be made good by the party who does the damage.

TRINITY UNIVERSITY.

(INCORPORATED BY ROYAL CHARTER.)

RULES AND REQUISITES FOR GRADUATION.

DOCTOR OF MEDICINE AND MASTER OF SURGERY.

The candidates for this degree must have matriculated in one of the following ways :—

(a) By having passed the Matriculation Examination in Arts or Medicine of Trinity University, or of some other recognized University.

The Medical Matriculation Examination* will be held twice in the year in the Convocation Hall, Trinity College, beginning on the second Friday in March and October respectively.

Notice must be sent to the Registrar of Trinity University, or to the Dean of Trinity Medical College, together with the Examination fee of \$5, at least one week before the Examination, on a form which will be supplied on application.

The subjects for this Examination will be found on page 19.

The standard for passing is 25 per cent. on each paper and 33 per cent. on each department.

Candidates who pass in two departments may, at the discretion of the Examiners, be allowed to take the remaining subjects at a subsequent Examination, a fee of \$5 being required for each Examination.

No change in the Curriculum shall affect any Student who has registered in the University before March 1st in the year in which such change is announced in the University Calendar, except that any change in the requirements for the Final M. D., C. M. Examination shall apply to all Students who have not passed their primary Examin-

ation at the time of the issue of the Calendar containing notice of such change, provided also, that Students degrading into a lower year shall be bound by the regulations affecting the year into which they have degraded.

The Candidate for Degrees in Medicine or Surgery must be of the full age of twenty-one years.

He must furnish certificates of having attended at least four Winter Sessions at some Medical College recognized by the University, except he be a graduate in Arts or Science, when attendance at three Winter Sessions will be accepted.

Before admission to the Primary Examination in Medicine he must have attended in some recognized Medical College the following courses of Lectures :—

Two courses (attended in different years) of eight months each, on Descriptive Anatomy, Practical Anatomy, General Chemistry, Materia Medica and Pharmacy, Physiology, Histology.

And one course of four months on Practical Chemistry, and on Toxicology respectively.

Before admission to the Final Examinations he must further have attended, in different years, two courses of Lectures of eight months each, in some recognized College on Theory and Practice of Medicine, Principles and Practice of Surgery, Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children, Clinical Medicine, Clinical Surgery.

Two courses of four months each on Medical Jurisprudence, Therapeutics and the art of prescribing.

And one course of four months on General and Special Pathology (taken during the Third Year.)

And one course of four months on each of the following subjects : Applied Anatomy, Sanitary Science, Pathology, Practical, General and Special (taken during the Fourth Year.)

He must have attended for at least *eighteen* months, the practice of some general Hospital, and, during two sessions, Clinical Lectures on Medicine and Surgery.

He must have attended for at least six months the practice of a Lying-in Hospital or must give satisfactory evidence of having otherwise had equivalent advantages of gaining obstetrical knowledge, with a certificate of attendance upon at least six cases of labor.

He must have passed two University Examinations, viz., the Primary and the Final Examinations in Medicine.

Before admission to the Primary Examination, he must produce a certificate that he has passed the First Year's Examination in some recognized Medical College.

PRIMARY EXAMINATION IN MEDICINE.

This Examination may be passed at the end of the Second Year. The subjects are : Descriptive Anatomy, Practical Anatomy, Physiology, Histology, General Chemistry (including Chemical Physics), and Toxicology, Practical Chemistry, Materia Medica and Pharmacy.

The Primary Examination of other recognized Universities, or that of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, Quebec or Manitoba, will be accepted in lieu of the University Primary Examination, provided that the Candidate shall in all cases pay the full fee for the Degree, but if any of the subjects of the Primary Examination do not form part of the Examination allowed, the Candidate shall be required to take such subjects together with his Final Examination.

Graduates of any recognized University will not be required to take such subjects of the Primary Examination as they have already passed in their University Examination.

FINAL EXAMINATION IN MEDICINE.

Candidates for this Examination will be required to furnish proof that they have passed an Examination at the end of their Third-Year in such subjects as the Faculty of the Medical College or School they have attended, may require.

In cases where this has been unavoidably omitted, as from illness, an equivalent Examination must be passed prior to taking the final Examination.

The final Examinations shall take place at the end of the Fourth Year. The subjects are : Theory and Practice of Medicine ; Principles and Practice of Surgery ; Clinical Medicine, Clinical Surgery, Midwifery, Gynecology, Diseases of Children, Medical Jurisprudence, Sanitary Science, Therapeutics, Applied Anatomy, Practical Pathology, General and Special Pathology, including Bacteriology.

In order that a Candidate may pass in either of these Examinations he must obtain thirty-three per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper, and fifty per cent. of the total marks of the Examination. Can-



didates who satisfy the Examiners will be arranged in order of merit ; the standard for the first class being the obtaining of Certificates of Honor, and for the next two classes, being 70 and 60 per cent. of the total marks, *i. e.*, First and Second Class Honors respectively, and the Pass standing.

Candidates who fail in not more than four subjects in the Primary, or five subjects in the Final Examinations of the Faculty of Medicine shall be allowed to take these subjects at the supplemental Examination or at the next regular Annual Examination, provided that a Candidate shall not be given credit for any portion of the Examination unless he shall have obtained at least thirty-three per cent. of each paper and fifty per cent. of the total marks of such part of the Examination. A Candidate who does not complete the Examination as above, will be required to take the whole of the subjects over again.

Candidates in the First Class of the Final or the Primary Examination in Medicine, shall be awarded Certificates of Honour, provided they obtain at least seventy-five per cent. of the marks given at the Examination.

The Primary and Final Examinations may be taken together at the end of the Fourth Year.

Supplementary Examinations will be held for Final Candidates on September 23rd, 1901, and for Primary Candidates on September 26th.

MEDALS IN MEDICINE.

A Gold and a Silver Medal are annually awarded to the Candidates who are first and second respectively in the Final Examination, and two Silver Medals to the Candidates who are first and second in the Primary Examination for the degree of M.D., C.M., provided that a Medal shall not be awarded to any Candidate who obtains less than seventy five per cent. of the total marks of his Examination.

All Candidates for the Final Medals must have taken the Primary Examination in this University ; and if they have not already done so, they may take it at the same time as the Final Examination.

In case of equality for the Final Medals, the Gold Medal shall be awarded to the Candidate who obtained the greatest percentage of marks at the Primary Examination. It shall be open to any Candidate who desires to do so, to take the Primary Examination a second time

with the Final, and in this case the primary marks so obtained shall be those counted for the Medal.

The Examinations are held annually in the Spring, and the time of holding them is so arranged as not to interfere with those of the Medical Council of Ontario, which are held annually in Toronto.

The Curriculum of this University being formally recognized by the several Royal Colleges of Physicians and Surgeons of Great Britain, all graduates of Trinity University are entitled to every privilege enjoyed by the holders of Degrees from any Colonial University.

Conferring of Medical Degrees.—These are conferred at a Special Convocation held annually at the close of the Winter Session.

Graduates of Trinity, who desire to take the Conjoint Examination of the Royal College of Physicians of London and of the Royal College of Surgeons of England, are required to take the Third or Final Examination only, of the Conjoint Board of these Colleges. Fee for such Examinations, Fifteen Guineas. After passing these Examinations Twenty Guineas is the further fee, required for the Diplomas of the two Colleges named.

UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO.

This University has by Statute the power as heretofore, with the approval of the Governor of Ontario in Council, to affiliate with itself Independent incorporated Medical Colleges or Schools.

Trinity Medical College is, and always has been, by its special Act of incorporation, FULLY AFFILIATED with the Provincial University, and is represented on the Senate. All the Degrees and other Honors of this University are legally, as open to the students of this College who fulfil the requirements laid down in its curriculum, as to those of any Affiliated Medical College or School in the Province.

QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.

Candidates for the degree of this University, with which TRINITY MEDICAL COLLEGE is affiliated, must be of the full age of twenty-one years, and must have completed a period of *four year's study* and have passed the Matriculation Examination.

The matriculation Examination and the curriculum of professional studies during the four years are very similar to those of Trinity University, as laid down in this calendar.

College of Physicians and Surgeons

OF ONTARIO.*

Every one desirous of being registered as a matriculated medical student in the register of this College, except as hereinafter provided, must present to the Registrar the official certificate of having passed the "Departmental Pass Arts Matriculation Examination," and in addition, Physics and Chemistry—whereupon he shall be entitled to be so registered upon the payment of twenty dollars and giving proof of his identity.

* For the special regulations regarding this Examination, see pages 15, 16 and 51 of this calendar.

* The sole licensing body in Ontario. Matriculants in Arts in any British or Colonial University on or prior to November, 1895, are entitled to register. Students registered with the Council after November 1, 1892, are required to spend *Five* years in Professional Study.

SUBJECTS OF THE MEDICAL COUNCIL'S MATRICULATION EXAMINATION. (Up to date.)

The following are the subjects of the examination conducted by the Education Department in the course prescribed for Matriculation in Arts, which for medical students must include Chemistry and Physics.

PART 1.—Arithmetic, Grammar, History of Great Britain and Canada, Physics.

PART 2.—Literature, Composition, Ancient History, Algebra, Euclid, Latin, Chemistry, and one of the following: (a) French; (b) German; (c) Greek.

1. Parts I. and II. may be taken in the same or in different years; Physics may be taken with Part I. or Part II.
2. Candidates failing in one or more subjects of either part may take at any one subsequent examination held for that Part the subject or subjects in which they failed.
3. Junior Leaving or Form II. and Form III. and Senior Leaving or Form IV. Certificates are accepted pro tanto, for the above Examinations.
4. The conditions referred to in 1, 2, 3, are applicable to Examinations passed or attempted in any year prior to 1900 subject to certain restrictions to be learned by application to the Education Department.

MEDICAL CURRICULUM.

Every student must spend a period of five years in actual professional studies, except as hereinafter provided; and the prescribed period of studies shall include four winter sessions of not less than eight months each. The fifth year shall be devoted to clinical work, six months of which may be spent with a registered practitioner in Ontario, and six months at one or more public hospitals, dispensaries or laboratories, Canadian, British or Foreign, attended after having been registered as a medical student in the Register of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario.

Graduates in arts or science of any college or university recognized by the Council who shall have spent a year in the study of physics, chemistry and biology, and have passed an examination in these subjects for degrees in arts or science, shall be held to have completed the first

year of the five years of medical study, and, after three years of attendance upon medical lectures, shall be eligible for the Intermediate Examination, and must thereafter comply with the requirements for the Fifth Year.

No tickets for lectures will henceforward be accepted by the Council unless it is endorsed thereon that the pupil has attended at least 75 per cent. of each course of said lectures, as shown by the teacher's roll.

Application for every professional examination must be made to the Registrar of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario two weeks prior to the examinations. No application will be received unless accompanied by the necessary tickets and certificates, and by the Treasurer's receipts showing that the fees have been paid.

Every student must attend the undermentioned courses of lectures in a University, College or School of Medicine, approved of by the Council, viz. :

Two Courses of Eight Months each, in different years, upon Anatomy, Practical Anatomy, Physiology, Histology, Theoretical Chemistry, Materia Medica and Pharmacy, Therapeutics, Principles and Practice of Medicine, Principles and Practice of Surgery, Midwifery and Diseases of Women and Children, Clinical Medicine and Clinical Surgery.

Two Courses of Four Months each upon Medical Jurisprudence, Practical Chemistry, including Toxicology and Diseases of Children—*One Course of Ten Lectures* on Mental Diseases.

A Course of Five Lectures and Five Demonstrations upon the use of Anæsthetics.

Not fewer than *Fifty Demonstrations* upon Normal Histology, and not fewer than *Fifty Demonstrations* upon Pathological Histology and Bacteriology, and one course of twenty lectures on Sanitary Science and *One* course of *lectures* on Medical and Surgical Anatomy. * This last course is for FINAL candidates and is to be taken in the 3rd or 4th year.

Every candidate must have carefully dissected the entire adult human body.

He must have attended the practice of a General Hospital for 24 months.

He must have attended six cases of midwifery.

* Generally called Applied Anatomy.

He must, before being registered as a member of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, have passed all examinations, hereinafter prescribed, and must have attained the full age of twenty-one years.

Students or Graduates in Medicine from recognized Colleges outside the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec who desire to qualify themselves for Registration in this Province must pass the Matriculation examination recognized by the Council and must attend thereafter one or more full "Winter Courses" of Lectures in one of the Ontario Medical Schools so as to complete fully the curriculum required by the Council and pass before the Board of Examiners appointed by the Council, all the examinations prescribed by that body.

British registered medical practitioners, on paying all fees and passing the Intermediate and Final examinations, may be registered, provided they have been domiciled in Britain for five years after being registered in Great Britain or Ireland.

MEDICAL COUNCIL FEES.

The following scale of fees has been established by the Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario.

Candidates who are unsuccessful are entitled at a subsequent time to a second Examination on payment of \$20.

All fees are to be paid to the Treasurer of the Medical Council prior to the several Examinations.

Any student registered with the Medical Council as a matriculate PRIOR TO JULY 1, 1889, pays \$20 for the Primary and \$30 for the Final Examination Fee.

EXAMINATIONS.

The following branches are embraced in the Primary Examination :

a. Anatomy ; *b.* Physiology, Histology ; *c.* Chemistry (Theoretical and Practical) ; *d.* Materia Medica and Pharmacy.

Every candidate for the Primary Examination is required to present, with his lecture tickets, a certificate of having undergone and passed an examination at the school he has attended at the close of his first winter session on Primary branches. Also a certificate of ability to make and mount microscopic specimens.

Each candidate for final examination must present a certificate of attendance at six post mortem examinations, and a certificate of ability to draw up a report of a post mortem examination ; and a certificate of having reported satisfactorily six cases of clinical medicine and six cases of clinical surgery, and of having passed his Intermediate Examination. The certificates to be signed by the teachers referred to upon these subjects, or the practitioner holding the post mortem. All candidates shall present a certificate of having passed at the close of their THIRD session, in the college or school they may have attended, an examination in such parts of medicine, surgery and midwifery and such other subjects as may be thought advisable by the faculties of the respective colleges or schools. This examination is not in any way to interfere with any of the examinations of the Council. Arts graduates may take this examination at the close of the second session if they prefer to do so, and have attended one course of Final Lectures.

The following branches shall be embraced in the Intermediate Examination :

a. Medical, Surgical and Topographical Anatomy (Applied Anatomy) ; *b.* Principles and Practice of Medicine ; *c.* General Pathology and Bacteriology* ; *d.* Surgery, other than operative ; *e.* Surgery, Operative ; *f.* Midwifery, other than operative ; *g.* Midwifery, Operative ; *h.* Medical Jurisprudence, including Toxicology and Mental Diseases ; *i.* Sanitary Science ; *j.* Diseases of Children ; *k.* Diseases of Women ; *l.* Therapeutics.

* Full instruction is required by all the Candidates on the subject of Pathology, including Bacteriology, as it is examined in by the Council, as well as by all the other examining bodies.

The Primary and Intermediate Examinations shall be "written" and "oral." The Final, "oral" and "clinical."

The following branches will be embraced in the Final Examination :

a. Clinical Medicine ; *b.* Clinical Surgery (including Vaccination) ;
c. Diseases of Women ; *d.* Diseases of Children, Medical and Surgical.

Any candidate who makes 60 per cent. in three or more branches but fails in the others, shall receive credit for the subjects so passed, and be compelled to pass in the other branches only, at a subsequent examination.

The Fall Examinations of the Medical COUNCIL will be held in November, 1901. The Spring Examinations will be held in May, 1902.
