British United Press ONDON, Oct. 15.—The lack of union and harmony in the Liberal ranks, which has been noticeable for months past, not only continues but is intensified as a result of the resignation of the leadership by Lord Oxford and Asquith, in spite of the warm tributes paid to him by all sections of the press today.

WAR IS BLAMED

The Daily Chronicle, Lloyd George's organ, says this morning: "Lord Oxford commenced his leadership when Liberalism was the dynamic and controlling force in the life of the nation. He resigns his position at a time when the star of Liberalism is under eclipse for the moment." The Chronicle attributes this mostly to the war and says that the future of the party now lies with Lloyd George, the party now lies with Labyu George Le is possible that Liberals will post-pone the election of a new leader for some time as unnecessary. 





Food Controller Sugested To the Editor of The Times-Star:-Sir,—I am enclosing a clipping from recent English newspaper, which should furnish grounds for investiga-tion by the Citizens' Committee, as to

why a food product that is grown in Canada and imported into England, can be purchased there at a much lesser price than in Saint John. According to the clipping, a sack of flour containing 280 pounds can be bought in England for 47 shillings, equivalent to \$11.28 Canadian currency Following the same ratio, a barrel of flour containing 196 lbs., should only cost \$7.85 at Saint John. The difference in bread is much greater. A quartern loaf—4 lbs.—costs 91-2 pence in England—19 cents, or 43-4 cents per pound. Using the same ratio a 11-2 lb. loaf should cost 71-8 cents, whilst the people of Saint John are charged double that price. All of

Dr. H. A. Farris Speaks of Great Gathering in Washington

FIFTY CANADIAN DOCTORS ATTEND

Phases of Battle With Disease Reviewed by Saint John Physician

"The meetings were most stimulating and it was felt that much headway was being made in the fight against tuberculosis," was the statement made by Dr. H. A. Farris, superintendent of the Saint John County Hospital, today, when asked to comment on the international gathering of tuberculosis experts at Washington, from which he returned yesterday.

FIFTY CANADIANS THERE

The convention, he said, was a gathcring of several organizations, the International Tuberculosis Association, the National Tuberculosis Association, the Canadian Tuberculosis Association and the National Sanatorium Association holding sessions one after the other. Practically all nations were represented, including English, French, German, Austrian, Italian, Swiss, Swedish, Japanese, South Americans and others. There were 50 Canadian doc-

One of the most outstanding matters was a report of the work of Dr. Opie of the Phipp Institute, Philadalphia.
