The news of the embargo came to provincial shippers like a "bolt from the blue" as they had taken the matter of the threatened embargo up with the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa and this department had had High Commissioner Larkin put the situation up to the British Government. The shipper said the commissioner had assured them that it was not proposed to pass the embargo against the Canadian product.

The feeling seems to be that the loss of the English market will again force down the price of potatoes in the province. They were as low as 60 cents abarrel this season but lately they have advanced until the present price is between 90 cents and a dollar.

Shipments Have Been Heavy.

Thus far this season approximately 250,000 bushels have been shipped to England through the port of St. John. Of this quantity the five steamers, Falkenstein, Hitherwood, Ully, Amanda and Caid, which took full cargoes, carried about 165,000 bushels while the balance was shipped in smaller consignments on the regular liners. The Caid, which only sailed on February 14, is still enroute to England but under the ruling she will be permitted to land her cargo.

Although several other shipments were being arranged and at least one steamer was to be secured for a full cargo within the next two weeks no definite charter had been made so far as could be ascertained this morning from local shipping companies.

Havana Market Booming.

The Havana market, however, is still booming, a shipper said, and it is hoped that approximately 21-4 million bushels will be shipped to Cuba before the season is finished. This, however, will not entirely dispose of the crop in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and the shipper said that he expected that the price would drop owing to this embargo.

Since the news had come suddenly the shippers have not decided what steps they will take in an endeavor to have the embargo lifted but it is understood that efforts will be made through Ottawa to impress the British Government with the idea that the Canadian potato shipments are entirely free of the Colorado heetle the pest which is the

ments are entirely free of the Colorado beetle, the pest which is the cause of the embargo against United States potatoes and the alleged cause of the embargo now being put on Canadian potatoes.

Speaking of the matter a government inspector pointed out this morning that the English market supplies have been shipped chiefly in 112 pound bags while those to Cuba are demanded in 180 pound bags or barrels containing 165 pounds. The potatoes already prepared for the English market and the bags on hand will entail a considerable loss to shippers since they will have no chance to ship them in that shape.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Feb. 21.

—John Smith was shot and probably fatally wounded early this morning after defying the police for more than three hours and keeping them at bay from a barricaded house.

Smith ran amuck with a revelver about 9 o'clock last night, firing more than a score of shots into two houses, one occupied by relatives, and then took refuge in the home of Stanley Zemwaski.

Smith took a position at a cellar window from which he fired more than one hundred shots at the officers. It became apparent early this morning that his ammunition was running low, if it was not entirely exhausted, and the terrified family was finally induced to make a dash from the front door.

With the house clear, the police opened fire. Smith ran upstairs and climbed out of a rear window upon the roof of a shed. Smith tumbled from the roof with three bullets in his body.





He likened this island to a ship which he called H. M. S. Britain.

"H. M. S. Britain," said Mr. Kipling; "carries a passenger list, including stowaways of 45,000,000 and owing to the peculiarities of her construction there are never more than six weeks supplies of consumable stores aboard her at one time. The balance must come by ship, and if the shipping does not come, a fortnight would deliver us to panic indescribable, and three months would see us embarked on the gallant adventure of cannibalism. whose death was announced yesterday, was one of the oldest members

Alan Cobham Now Considering Trip to Storm Swept 'Roof

LONDON, Feb. 20.—Will the secret of Everest, which has hitherto eluded man, be solved by an airman?

This question is prompted by the news that Alan Cobham, the "taximan of the air," who flew from London to India with Air-Vice-Marshal Sir W. Sefton Brancker, has reached Darjeeling, the Everest base, by aeroplane. His intention is to reconnoitre, by air, the towering snow-capped mountain.

It will not be possible for him to reach the summit of Everest, for the maximum altitude attainable by the D. H. 50 machine which he is using is only about 20,000 ft.

There is little doubt, however, that with a plane of suitable design the whole of the storm-swept "roof of the world" could be photographed and reconnoitred from the air without any risk to the pilot.

When the question was put to Capt de Havilland, the famous aircraft designer and the only British pilot who flies his own machines, he did not harbor the least doubt that it would be quite a feasible project to "scale" Everest by air.

Some of the most thrilling hockey matches ever played were of the low score variety and were featured by sensational goal tending, superb checking, brilliant passing, shots that went at the goalie like bullets, aggressiveness that kept the fans keyed up to a high degree of excitement and speed that was almost dazzling to the eye. What more could any fan desire. On the other hand in 99 games out of 100 when the score is high it is usually a listless game when a goal tender shows "yellow" or the need of glasses, or when the defense of one or the other team crumbles. In baseball it is different, fans love heavy hitting, but they do not always relish high scoring. Occassionally high scoring tends to create excitement if the teams are both tallying, but it is the exception and proves the cule.




