ANNUAL MEETING, 1872.

Monday, 13th May, 1872.

The Annual Meeting of the Members was held in the Music Hall this evening. Matthew Sweetnam, Esq., President, in the chair. The Minutes of the last meeting having been read and confirmed, the Annual Report and the financial statement for the past year were presented.

It was moved by Mr. D. G. Carnegie, seconded by Dr. Adams, and resolved, "that, as the Report is in the possession of the members, the reading of the same be dispensed with."

Moved by Mr. Sheppard, seconded by Mr. L. Samuel, and resolved, "that the Report be received."

Moved by Mr. W. B. Hamilton, seconded by Mr. J. E. Smith, and resolved, "that the Report be adopted."

The President then appointed H. E. Clarke, Esq., J. P. Palmer, Esq., and J. E. Smith, Esq., as scrutineers.

There being only one nomination for the presidency, Matthew Sweetnam, Esq., was declared duly elected.

It was then moved by Mr. Maclear, seconded by Mr. Davison, and resolved, "that the thanks of the meeting are due and are hereby tendered to the Auditors—J. Herbert Mason and Thos. Elgar, Esquires,—for their services in the past year."

Mr. Davison gave notice of the following motion, which he would move at the next quarterly meeting :—"That when any sum of money is at the credit of the Institute, which is not required for current use, the Board of Directors shall have the power to deposit or invest the same to the best advantage, and with due regard to safety."

The President, at this stage of the meeting, addressed the members at considerable length, and explained the action which had been taken by the Board during the year for the interests of the Institute. He expected that he would be able to announce, in the course of a few days, that, through the kindness of the Hon. Mr. McKellar, and the other members of the Ontario

Government, the Institute would be allowed to retain its present suite of rooms. And he further explained that the members would shortly be invited to attend a general meeting of the Institute, for the purpose of considering and adopting such measures as would be best calculated to increase the membership, and to place the Library and Reading Room in a high state of efficiency.

It was then moved by Mr. D. G.

Carnegie, seconded by Mr. J. P. Palmer, and resolved, "that the thanks of the members are due and are hereby tendered to the President, Officers, Directors, and Secretary, for the satisfactory, zealous, and able manner in which the affairs of the Institute have been conducted during the past year."

The President having returned thanks, the meeting adjourned.

In resigning to the members of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute the trust reposed in them at the last adjourned annual meeting, the Directors beg leave respectfully to present their report for the year ended the 1st May, 1872, being the forty-second year of the existence of the Institute.

On the 7th July last the retiring Board of Directors was elected. Shortly afterwards, the usual committees were appointed, and the services of Mr John Davy, your efficient secretary and librarian, were secured.

With as little delay as practicable, your Directors examined minutely, and with patient carefulness, the general condition, and financial position of the Institute. They found that the property was mortgaged for \$23,400; that interest and other liabilities requiring immediate settlement amounted to \$2,580; that the building was very much out of repair, and required an outlay on that account of about \$2,500; and that the library, owing chiefly to lack of means, was much run down, and in an unsatisfactory condition. The liabilities of the Institute, including the estimated cost of repairs, therefore exceeded \$28,400; and the treasury was quite empty.

After a careful investigation of the affairs of the Institute and a full discussion of various plans suggested for its pecuniary relief, the Directors concluded that it was their duty, in view of all the circumstances brought under their notice, to recommend that the building and land belonging to the Institute should be sold, if a good price could be obtained therefor. Before arriving at this conclusion, your Directors long and earnestly discussed and carefully considered the probable effects of the step they were about to offer for your consideration and acceptance. They felt that such a course could only be defended on the ground of positive necessity;

but they were firmly of opinion that the time had arrived when the interests, if not the existence of the Institute required that the sacrifice should be made. The plan contemplated would, it was anticipated, get rid of the money embarrassment which had for years crippled the energies of several preceding Boards of Directors, and prevented the progress of the Institute; and it was hoped that, after paying off all the debts, there would be a cash balance remaining, which, properly invested, would yield a sum nearly equal to the outlay required for rent of suitable temporary premises; a sum, indeed, which, at some future period, would go far towards providing new and sufficient premises for the general purposes of the Institute. It was further believed that, with these difficulties removed out of the way, our successors would be enabled to give their undivided attention to the internal economy and real work of the Institute.

Accordingly, correspondence was entered into with the Honourable John Carling, then Commissioner of Public Works for the Province of Ontario, with a view of ascertaining whether the Government would purchase the property in question for the use of the proposed College of Technology. After several interviews it was found that the sale could be effected; but that the best price obtainable was \$36,500.

A special meeting of the members, and subscribers to the building fund, was held on the 6th September last, to consider the advisability of selling the Institute building and land. It is estimated that about 230 members were present, all of whom, except four, voted in favour of disposing of the property to the Government of Ontario for the price stated, \$36,500. This result was arrived at by the members of the Institute after a full discussion of the merits, and with a full knowledge of the facts, of the whole case. Subsequently, on the 22nd September, a second special meeting was convened at the instance of some of the members who disapproved of the sale; but at this meeting the vote stood 72 in favour of the sale, and 16 against it.

In compliance, therefore, with the instructions then given by the members to the Directors, the sale was carried into effect. The debts due have all been paid off, and, as indicated by the financial statements, there is a cash balance in hand of upwards of \$11,000.

THE MEMBERSHIP.

Your Directors regret to have to report a reduction in the number of members and subscribers during the past year; but they were not unprepared for such a result, which is mainly to be attributed to the state of the library, and to a vague impression that the Institute might be removed to some inconvenient locality, or cease to exist altogether. These causes were fully considered by your Directors, and they believe that the reasons which have prompted them to defer leasing or building other premises are such as will meet with the approval of the members.

An analysis of the entry of new members and subscribers during the last three months indicates that with the improvement now taking place in the Library and Reading Room, there has been added support and it is believed that with increased care and the judicious expenditure of a reasonable sum of money each year, in the proper maintenance of these departments, supplemented by a little effort on the part of the Directors and members, the list of members and subscribers is likely to be largely augmented.

Showing a decrease of 203 in the past year, against 196 in the previous year.

The first addition of books to the library on being publicly announced, caused a large number of members and other citizens to visit the Institute, and from the interest thus awakened, and the evidences of approval which were given, your Directors have no hesitation in asserting that so soon as the Library and Reading Room are put in a really satisfactory state, a large increase in the membership may be confidently expected.

THE FINANCES.

A detailed statement of receipts and expenditure, duly examined by your auditors appointed at the last quarterly meeting, and likewise audited by the Rev James Porter, Superintendent of Public Schools, as required by a recent Act of the Ontario Legislature, will be found in the appendix, together with a statement of the present assets and liabilities of the Institute. In order to afford the members the means of comparing the present position of the Institute with its position at the date of the last report, the following statement of assets and liabilities is submitted, in which the selling price of the real estate is substituted for the previous nominal value.

A comparison of the balance in favour of the Institute at the date of the last report with the present balance will show an improvement of \$1,363 14.

READING ROOM.

Your Directors, recognizing the fact that the success of the Institute depends principally upon the completeness of the Reading Room and Library, have given considerable care and attention to these important branches. The undermentioned additions have been made to the supply of newspapers in the Reading Room, viz: *St John's Newfoundland Telegraph*, *Buffalo Courier*, *Philadelphia Ledger*, *Belfast Whig*, *London Graphic*, *London Fun*, *The Dublin Freeman* and the *Illustrated Times* have been discontinued.

The cost and character of the supply of newspapers have been strictly investigated, and the Directors beg to report a saving of \$49 55 per annum in this department. The amount now received for newspapers when removed from the reading room table is \$35 per annum. A few papers still remain for sale.

As many persons were in the habit of availing themselves of the privileges of the Reading Room who were in no wise entitled thereto, your Directors took steps to counteract the practice. It was found that citizens who had long been considered members had not contributed anything further to the Institute than their regular attendance in the Reading Room! The result of the necessary measures taken has been a reduction of fully one-third in the attendance.

It is to be regretted that paragraphs are frequently cut from the newspapers and periodicals, and your Directors earnestly hope for the co-operation of the members to detect and punish the guilty parties.

THE LIBRARY.

The Library has also received due attention, and immediately after the appointment of the present Secretary, an examination was made to ascertain the number of volumes in the Library, when the following report was made, dated August 19th, 1871:

The books in the Library were found to be in a very unsatisfactory condition, and many valuable works were incomplete through the loss of some of the volumes. Your Directors have commenced the systematic restoration of the missing books.

The sum of \$408 86 has been expended for new books, including an importation, on advantageous terms, from England; and \$293 90 has been paid for binding 161 volumes taken from the Reading Room and Library, and repairing and rebinding 513 volumes which needed overhauling.

It is respectfully recommended that the list of works of standard authors be enlarged as early as may be practicable.

The time allowed for the perusal of paper-cover novels has been shortened, and new works are now obtained by a larger number of members within a reasonable period. This change appears to give general satisfaction. The sum of \$81 has been laid out in this department.

A new catalogue is now in course of preparation, and that part which embraces the novels and tales is nearly ready for publication. It has been deemed unnecessary to inconvenience the members by following the usual custom of closing the Library for one week.

In the course of the special examination which has been given to the Library, it was discovered that many of the missing books had been lost to the Institution through being issued to quarterly subscribers whose places of abode could not be found. In some instances it would seem that the parties had given an incorrect address, and that in others the persons had left the city. To remedy the defect alluded to it has been arranged that subscribers who are not personally known shall be required to supply a satisfactory guarantee that the books they obtain shall be returned.

Your Directors tender their sincere thanks to those friends of the Institute who have kindly made donations of books during the past year. See Appendix C. And their acknowledgments are also due to the proprietors and editors of newspapers who have generously forwarded their papers for the use of the Reading Room—a list of these will be found at the end of this report.

THE CLASSES.

The classes have been conducted in the past year with continued success. In consequence of the sale of the building to the Government, a misapprehension arose with

Your Directors appropriated the sum of \$53, which was increased by the donations of the President and Second Vice-President, to \$73, for the purchase of suitable prize books for the successful pupils; and a silver medal was kindly supplied by Mr W C Morrison, for presentation to the successful pupil in mechanical drawing. The prizes were presented by Professor Buckland and the President.

It is a gratifying circumstance that within the thirteen years of the existence of the classes, in only ten of which they were fully organized, upwards of two thou-

and pupils have received instruction, which to many has doubtless proved the groundwork of studies to be afterwards pursued with pleasure and advantage. In some of the leading counting-houses in this city are to be found young men who received their first lessons in accounts at the Evening Classes of the Mechanics' Institute.

Apart, however, from the instruction received at the classes, there can be no doubt that many of the pupils have been materially benefitted by acquiring habits of industry, and being withdrawn from the many temptations incident to city life. Viewed from this point, the Directors feel that, although not a financial gain, the Institute, by its classes, is fulfilling one of its chief objects, and strengthening its just claims on the support of the citizens generally.

The Institute has again to place on record the liberality of the Northern Railway Company of Canada, through Mr F W Cumberland, M P, the Managing Director, in donating the handsome sum of \$100 to the institute in aid of the classes.

ENTERTAINMENTS.

In consequence of the sale of the Institute Building only two entertainments were arranged for during the year—these resulted in a profit of \$46 31.

CONCLUSION.

In reviewing the labours of the past year the Directors are unable to supply such evidence of marked prosperity and progress in the several departments of the Institute as they would desire; but, having performed their duties with a single aim to its best interests, and having given most careful attention to all the plans that have been adopted, they are confident that, in the long run, the work that they have initiated will be found to tend in the right direction,—and that with suitable premises for the Institute, freedom from pecuniary embarrassments and the other cares consequent upon the management of a large building heavily burdened with debt, their successors will be enabled to give their undivided attention to the immediate and actual business of the Institute.
