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MINUTES

OF THE

BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE

OF

THE METHODIST CHURCH,

Held in the Town of Peterboro', from June 2nd to June 7th, 1897.

The FORTH Session of the BAY of QUINTE CONFERENCE was opened in the George Street Methodist Church, in the Town of Peterboro', on Thursday, June 2nd, 1887, at 9 o'clock a.m.

Rev. John S. Clarke, President of the Conference, presided and conducted the devotional exercises, which continued for one hour.

Rev. A. CARMAN, D.D., General Superintendent, then took the chair.

The Secretary, Rev. Joseph Young, read the 46th Psalm and the 3rd chapter of 1st Corinthians. The 661st hymn was sung, and Rev. John S. Clarke, President, led in prayer.

Rev. A. CARMAN, D.D., General Superintendent, delivered an address of some length upon the work and prosperity of the Church.

The roll was called by the Secretary, and 98 ministers and 57 lay delegates answered to their names.

The Secretary read the list of transfers, as officially announced. .

By special arrangement with the General Superintendents, and Presidents concerned, George Carpenter has since the meeting of the Transfer Committee been transferred to British Columbia Conference, to take effect June 6th.

The Conference then proceeded to elect its officers.

The Rev. John Leardyn was elected President. Upon being introduced to the Conference he briefly acknowledged the honor conferred upon him.

The Rev. WM. BURNS was elected Secretary. Being called to the platform he expressed thanks for the honor conferred, and assumed his position.

Revs. WM. R. Young and W. Limbert were, upon nomination, chosen Assistant Secretaries.

Rev. C. W. WATCH was, upon nomination, chosen Journal Secretary.

On motion it was resolved that we re-affirm the resolution of last year for the appointment of a Nominating Committee, viz., that one minister and one layman be appointed from each District by the members present from each District; the said committee to nominate all committees not provided for in the Constitution.

REV. C. P. FRIZZELL.

The Rev. C. P. Frizzell was a native of Canada, and was early brought to a saving knowledge of the truth. He entered the ministry of the late Methodist Episcopal Church, within the bounds of the Bay of Quinte Conference, in the year 1874. He was richly imbued with the spirit of his calling. With an apostolic devotion and self-sacrifice he was ever willing to go to any part of the work and unfold the true riches to the poor and to those that were afar off. His urbanity and cordiality made him acceptable to all classes of society. As a preacher he was clear, practicable, and forcible. "He was a good man, full of faith and the Holy Ghost," and many were added to the Lord under his ministry

For several years he served the Church very successfully in the North-West, where, by exposure in the heroic discharge of his Christly mission, his health gave way, when he returned to Ontario. It was fondly hoped for a time by his many friends, and especially by his devoted wife—whom he loved next to his God—that he might recover. Nothwithstanding the exhaustive skill of physicians, and the unremitting care and solicitude of his beloved wife, the fell disease, consumption, terminated in his change, September last. He left this battle ground for his new appointment in the city of our God, to join the great number which no man can number, "whose robes are washed and made white in the blood of the Lamb."

His last hours were characterized by great peace and the exultant joy and triumph of that gospel which he had so successfully preached.

REV. WILLIAM H. PALMER.

The Rev. Wm. H. Palmer was born in the township of Ross, Renfrew Co., Ontario. The earliest recollections of his home life were associated with family worship consisting of scripture reading, singing and prayer.

His parents were members of the Methodist Church, faithful in their attendance on the means of grace, and in his childhood days Bro. P. went regularly to prayer and class-meeting.

As a boy he was marked for his fondness for books, making such progress in study that before he attained the required age he had qualified for and was permitted to enter the profession of teaching.

Early in life he made a profession of religion, giving his heart to God when twelve years of age, and remaining faithful till called to enter into

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uch fied God nto rest. He was deeply impressed with the conviction of a divine call to the ministry of the Word, and commenced preaching when but seventeen years of age.

In 1871 he was admitted a probationer for the ministry at Lyn, in connection with the Methodist Episcopal Church. His preparatory studies were pursued at Albert College, and he was known as a faithful student. His reading was largely metaphysical and philosophical. He was very thorough in his preparation for the pulpit, and plainly and forcibly presented the Gospel message. Socially he was, to those who knew him but slightly, somewhat retiring; but to know him fully was to recognize his warm heart and true friendship, and to rightly appreciate his abilities.

He travelled the following circuits: Bay, Demorestville (twice), Tamworth, Wolfe Island, Foxboro', Hallowell and Melrose, and among his congregations was always known as an earnest worker, and, as a preacher, "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

With failing health he took his last service, the Quarterly Meeting service in August. He returned home to toil no more, falling asleep in Jesus on September 15, 1886.

On the following Saturday the Rev. H. Williams, a life-long friend of Bro. Palmer and his father's family, preached the memorial sermon from Phil. iii. 20: "For our conversation is in heaven; from whence also we look for the Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ."

"O may I triumph so
When all my warfare's past,
And, dying, find my latest foe
Under my feet at last.

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GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

TREASURER'S INTERIM REPORT.

Requested to be laid before the several Annual Conferences, and published for information in their Minutes.

Although this Fund has been in existence since the time of the formation of a General Conference in 1874, it has never had a written constitution.

The object of the Fund, as gathered from its history, and found in the Journals of the General Conferences and in the Discipline of the Church, is to pay the travelling expenses of delegates to and from the General Conference, and of representatives to other churches and bodies who are appointed by the General Conference; to meet the salaries and expenses of our General Superintendents, and of all General Conference committees that have no funds of their own; as also to pay the expenses of transfers in certain specified cases.

The different departments of the Church, up till the meeting of the last General Conference, paid one-half of the salaries and expenses of the General Superintendents, leaving only the other half to be paid by the

The income for this moiety was derived from collections taken up from year to year in the several Circuits and Missions in the entire Church, and yet that income has always been insufficient to meet the demands, and hence the Fund has always been in debt.

The present Treasurer was appointed at the last General Conference, and the whole amount necessary to meet all the above claims in full was thrown on the Fund, without aid from any department of the Church.

Nearly all the collections for the year 1886 and 1887 had been paid to the former Treasurer, and yet at the close of the General Conference the Fund was in debt about \$5,000. The present indebtedness of the Fund is between \$6,000 and \$7,000, with large quarterly payments and other heavy special claims to be met as they arise.

The Finance Committee of the General Conference, seeing the very great responsibility involved and the large amounts to be raised, took the following action, viz. (Journal, p. 251): The estimated amount required during the quadrennium, less cash on hand, was \$30,000, or an average of \$7,500 per year. This amount was divided by them as follows: Toronto Conference, \$1,430; London, \$1,000; Niagara, \$1,000; Guelph, \$875; Bay of Quinte, \$875; Montreal, \$1,125; Nova Scotia, \$400; New Brunswick, etc., \$400; Newfoundland, \$125; and Manitoba, etc., \$310. These amounts will therefore be required annually, in the estimation of the Finance Committee, to meet the claims on the Fund. The amount paid by the several Annual Conferences last year, up to the 1st of September, was about \$5,200. Now the Discipline (see p. 50) directs the officers of the General Conference "to disburse only the amount on hand for General Conference expenses," etc. I understand from this clause that the Fund is not to go into debt beyond the quadrennium. As the matter is now carried on, the largest expenditure is incurred in the payment of General Conference expenses at the beginning of the quadrennium, thus involving heavy payments for interest. What is to be done? I suggest-

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neral ving 1st. That every Circuit and Mission shall take up a large all-day Sabbath collection, and forward it immediately, through its proper officer, to the Treasurer. This will reduce the interest account.

2nd. Should there be any deficiency at the close of any year in the amount expected from any Conference, let prompt and energetic measures be adopted to meet such deficiency. It will be found easier to do this annually than to raise the whole amount at the end of the quadrennial term.

Our brethren throughout the entire Church will see that it will require united, vigorous and prompt action to save the Fund from financial embarrassment, and to enable it to pay in full the amounts needed successfully to carry on our work.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Treasurer for the year ending July 31st, 1886, for publication in the Minutes of the Annual Conferences.

The full Balance Sheet, having been properly audited and accepted by the Board, is published in the Journal of the General Conference.

The Fund is divided into two accounts—the Capital and the Annual. The Capital Account is made up of legacies, donations, and other amounts given for the purpose of investment, the interest only being used. This account amounted at the above date to \$167,956.23, less certain unproductive assets valued at \$8,355.14, and leaving as productive capital the sum of \$159,601.09, being nearly \$5,000 over the Capital Account of the previous year. This amount is invested in mortgages, debentures, and other reliable securities, and yields nearly 6 per cent. per annum.

The Annual Account amounts to \$70,918.44. The following are the principal sources of income and expenditure at the date above specified:—

A combination of circumstances which the Board could not control left the Fund in debt at the end of the year, as may be seen from the above statement, over \$2,700.

As the financial year does not close till the 31st July, no definite report can be made for the current year. This report will be presented at the next Annual Conferences. The Book Room grant has been

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increased this year to \$6,000, a result that must be very gratifying to all concerned, and which furnishes an additional reason why our Book Room should be liberally patronized and loyally sustained by both ministers and members. With the assessments from Circuits all paid in full in accordance with our present law, as passed by the late General Conference, we expect to be able to meet all legitimate claims in full, and to reduce, if not extinguish, the deficiency of the previous year. True, genuine loyalty to Methodism and its institutions, and united and persevering effort on the part of our ministers and people, will place the Fund in a position in which it will be a lasting boon and blessing to the Church, and to the aged, the widow, and the fatherless.

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GENERAL EDUCATION.

Your Committee rejoice to be able to report that the educational institutions under the control of the Church have, during the year just closed, enjoyed most gratifying success in every department of their work.

Victoria University has had an attendance and a revenue that have been a pleasing surprise to her most hopeful friends. Her Freshman Class and her Graduating Class were the largest in the history of this noble Institution.

Last year Queen's, Trinity, and Victoria Universities held joint matriculation examinations at all the High School centres, where candidates requested it, and with great satisfaction. The same privilege, by the favor of the Ontario Education Department, is to be granted the current year, and this work will be conducted by a joint board of examiners appointed by the three Universities.

Albert College has had a year of prosperity, and will furnish seventeen candidates for matriculation, being the largest number represented by any school in the Province. The cheering intelligence comes from both Victoria University and Albert College that a gracious, preponderating religious influence has been exerted over the students, resulting in the cheerful observance of discipline, and in many conversions.

We desire to assure all the families under our care that they cannot overestimate the importance of sending their children to our own University and Colleges, where they can receive an education equal to the best afforded by this country, and where their moral and religious interests are carefully guarded.

We urge our people to sustain, with greatly increased liberality, our Educational Fund. Notwithstanding the vital importance of this scheme of our Church work, it has not yet received the support that will overtake the demands in this direction.

We recommend the Conference to appoint, as representatives to Albert College Board, the Revs. John Learoyd and Wm. Williams, D.D.; also as representative to Alma College Board, the Rev. John B. Clarkson, M.A. We also recommend that H. E. Bailey, G. A. Love, and S. J. Thompson be appointed to attend Victoria College.

ALBERT COLLEGE REPORT.

The Rev. W. P. Dyer, M.A., President of Albert College, addressed the Conference, reporting the progress of the College work.

It was moved by Rev. Prof. Reynar, seconded by Rev. A. Browning,

and
Resolved,—That this Conference has heard with very much pleasure
but without much surprise the very satisfactory report of the work of
Albert College during the year, and we pledge ourselves to continue to
the College and its able and devoted workers our unabated sympathy,
advocacy and support.

The Rev. W. P. Dyer, M.A., also reported on the work of Alexandra College.

It was moved by Rev. T. W. Pickett, seconded by Rev. E. N. Baker, B.D., and

Resolved,—That whereas the higher education of women is a vital question, affecting both the social and religious welfare of the present and the future, and inasmuch as we have it on good authority that upwards of one thousand Protestant girls in Ontario are in attendance at nunneries, and as numbers of them are lost to Protestantism forever, and as the evident purpose of Romanism is supremacy in politics and education; therefore, this Conference rejoices in the continued and marked prosperity which has attended Alexandra College, as indicated in the report read, and we confidently recommend the institution as capable, well-equipped and successful in the education of young women. Its advantages, scholastic, social and religious, are unsurpassed for young ladies desiring a first-class education.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE TO THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE.

During the past year, for the first time in the history of the College, we have been obliged, for want of accommodation, to refuse to admit several applicants, and to send them to other institutions. We have enrolled about 170 pupils. We have had a regular attendance throughout the year of over 130, and for the greater part of the year we have had an average attendance of 103 resident pupils. The yearly income will be about \$24,000.

To meet the wishes of the numerous friends of the institution it has been decided to make an addition to our accommodation by connecting the private residence with the southern wing of the main building, thereby opening for use of our pupils a large number of beautiful and airy rooms. This steady growth in reputation and prosperity we attribute largely to thorough and honest work done in every department of study, combined with unusually pleasant and healthful surroundings.

The Principal, Lady Principal, and every member of the staff, are admirably adapted for the positions they hold, and the country is becoming more fully aware of the fact that our College affords facilities for education and culture unsurpassed, if equalled, in the Dominion of Canada.

Believing that the Course of Study in a Ladies' College worthy of the name should advance with the times to meet the wants of the most clever and ambitious pupils, we have decided to take a step in advance by bringing certain branches of study into our College course that are considered most advantageous to ladies, fully up to the University standard. With this object in view, several hundred dollars will be spent next year upon the Natural Science Department alone. Modern Languages and

English Univer

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English will also be carried to the same extent as in a thoroughly equipped University. Friends of the College are referred to our latest Calendar for a fuller account of the aim and work of the institution. In the matter of University Matriculation, which lies at the basis of a thorough course of study, we are pleased to be able to say that we have led the way, and now that we have undertaken regular University work no effort will be spared to meet the reasonable expectations of our patrons.

Our Musical Department is generally known to be built on a solid foundation. As an evidence of the inspiration to study that our pupils receive, it may be mentioned that three of them are now pursuing courses of study in the Conservatory of Music in Leipsic, Germany.

The Director of our Fine Art Department is President of the Royal Canadian Academy of Artists, established at Ottawa by Lord Lorne. At the Industrial Exhibition, held in Toronto, September, 1886, our pupils won first prize for the best display of painting from natural objects, shading from antique, etc.

Our Elocution Department is modelled after that of the Philadelphia School of Oratory, and is directed by a gold medallist from that School. Our Commercial Department affords a practical education in book-

keeping, telegraphy, phonography, etc.

Thanking the members of this Conference for the deep interest which they have always taken in our success, and assuring you that it shall ever be our highest endeavor to merit your hearty approval and support, we look hopefully into the future, believing that a very bright career is before the Ontario Ladies' College.

REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:-

Having organized, your Committee looked for memorials, but there were none. It is the unanimous belief of your Committee that the violation of the Fourth Commandment is on the increase throughout the land. We believe that in almost every case of railway and steamboat running on the Sabbath there is committed an imposing and public breach of an unchangeable moral law.

Your Committee recognize the fact, with gratitude to God, that Toronto is earnestly endeavoring to maintain its proud position as the city on this American continent which outwardly observes the Sabbath

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day better than any other. This must have a far-reaching influence for good in the direction of the public observance of the Sabbath law.

Your committee recommend that, whenever an opportunity is given the members of the Conference of strengthening the hands of those who take action with the view of securing from Government legislation in support of the better observance of the Lord's day, that they will attach their names to petitions appealing to Government on this behalf, and seek to induce others to do likewise.

Your Committee also recognize the fact that on many of our Circuits—more or less on all—the Sabbath is violated by the well-known practice of Sabbath visiting. This contravenes the spirit of the Sabbath, not only by drawing off many from the house of God, but also by breaking in upon the quiet which should characterize domestic life on the Lord's day. Your Committee urge that this sin against the Sabbath be rebuked faithfully from the pulpit as well as in private.

But your Committee bear in mind that public life is but the reflection of private life/that national life is but the aggregate life of all the families that make up the nation, and that, therefore, the surest remedy for the public desecration of the Sabbath is to purify the home life of the people; therefore your Committee recommend that every minister in his pulpit ministration will seek to impress upon the heads of families the duty of so ordering family religion in general, and the domestic keeping of the Sabbath in particular, as to insure a greater respect to all God's laws, and to that one in particular which says "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy."

First Claim—Regular Conferential expenses, including those of the

President, Secretary and Committees.

Second Claim.—Special affliction, funeral expenses, and ministerial

supply.

Restrictions.—(1) No bills in cases of special affliction and funeral expenses shall be entertained by the Committee unless accepted and assurances given that such bills have been paid. (2) No claim for Circuit supply shall be entertained unless such supply be secured or consented to by the Chairman of the District, and at a salary not to exceed that of a probationer. (3) Assistance to weak Circuits.

Restriction.—No claim under Two and Three shall be entertained by the Committee without the recommendation of the Fourth Quarterly Official Meeting and the Annual District Meeting. Superintendents of Circuits or Missions shall be required to pay directly to the Financial Secretary all sums raised for this Fund.

REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following report, viz. — That they met and duly organized, the Rev. A. Browning being

appointed Chairman, and Rev. W. H. Emsley, Secretary.

Your Committee, discerning the signs of the times, are fully convinced that temperance sentiment is fast advancing toward total prohibition. The march of the foremost temperance men of Great Britain is towards this goal. In several States of the Union it has been already reached, whilst in many counties in Canada, despite the opposition of its enemies, the cowardly inaction of many professed friends, and the disfavor of many in Government place and authority, the Scott Act is preparing the way for a Dominion Prohibitory Law.

In this connection we would mention with pride the names of Cox and Flavell, of Peterboro', and Miller and Robinson, of Brighton, worthy laymen of our Conference, who have both worked and suffered to make the

Scott Act a success.

Your Committee would recommend memorializing the Government praying that the amount of fines now collected for infraction of the Scott Act be paid over to the Board of License Commissioners, to be by them expended in enforcing and carrying out the provisions of said Act, instead of as now being deposited with the County Councils.

We would also strongly urge the formation of prohibitory associations of young men for the purposes of information and work, and thus be prepared for action along the whole line of the electorate when candidates

for Parliament are in the field.

The victory must be won at the ballot-box, and that only by a steady,

courageous and persistent fight.

We rejoice in the passing of the temperance resolutions in the open Conference by an almost unanimous vote, and hope that ministers and laymen will go forth to fight the common foe everywhere, and at all times, until temperance resolutions are no longer needed and Conference Temperance Committees are things of the past.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Browning, and Resolved,—That whereas the vile traffic in intoxicating liquors still continues to exert its baneful influence throughout the length and breadth of the land, wasting the material resources of the country, entailing poverty and crime, and involving annually the destruction of many thousands of human lives; and

Whereas there is abundant evidence to show that prohibitory legislation, where it has been granted and even fairly well enforced, has invarieffor Tem part ener vinc Sena men

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ably been followed by the diminution of drunkenness and crime and an increase of temporal prosperity among the people: therefore be it resolved, that the members of this Conference view with alarm and indignation the efforts now being made to seriously impair, if not to repeal, the "Canada Temperance Act," accompanied, as these efforts are, by indecision on the part of professing friends, by thorough organization on the part of avowed enemies, and by the "nfriendly attitude of both the Dominion and Provincial Government, as manifested by the recent appointment to the Senate of men in sympathy with the liquor traffic, and the retention of men in the positions of inspectors, commissioners and magistrates, who take every opportunity of frustrating the proper enforcement of the law.

Resolved also, that believing the time to be fully come when party alliances and party predilections must be subordinated to the great cause of temperance reform, the members of this Conference do hereby pledge themselves by every legitimate means in their power—in the pulpit, on the platform, in the press and at the ballot-box—to oppose any government, or any party, or any individual member of Parliament, who either by vote or influence shall seek to destroy, or seriously impair, the existing prohibitory legislation.

Resolved also, that we declare our readiness to unite with all other Conferences, Synods, Assemblies and Associations throughout the country in educating and directing public sentiment to the point of demanding from the House of Commons an efficient prohibitory enactment for the whole Dominion.

Resolved also, that we gratefully acknowledge our obligations to Messra Jamieson and Fisher, M.P.'s, for their faithful exertions in the House of Commons in behalf of the cause of temperance.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Returns from the several Districts show a gratifying increase in the number of schools, of scholars, and in financial support. Thirteen hundred and ninety-one conversions—an increase over the previous year of one hundred and seventy-eight—is a very cheering feature in the reports.

The circulation of our Sunday-school literature, by 5,798 copies increase, as against a decrease of "all other papers" of 945 copies, indicates a growing appreciation of our deservedly popular Sunday-school periodicals. Your committee are of opinion that the study of the Methodist Catechism should be more general, and that a copy of the Banner should be placed in the hands of every teacher.

Believing that the success of Sunday-school work depends upon the careful, earnest efforts of organized and systematic labor, we call the attention of the Conference to page 131, paragraphs 321, 322, 323, of the Discipline

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PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

"Grace and peace be multiplied unto you through the knowledge of God, and of Jesus our Lord." By the good hand of our God we have been kept through another year, and led to meet again in our Annual We gratefully remember the mercies of the past, and would unite with you in renewed consecration of ourselves and our resources to the service of the Lord Jesus Christ. The year has been one of peace and prosperity; harmony has prevailed in all our borders, and the goodliness of our heritage been maintained. An intense desire to work together for the glory of God, and the advancement of the interests of our beloved Methodism, has characterized both our ministers and members. Connexional Funds have been nobly sustained; the varied and important enterprises of our Church have been carried on with intelligence, zeal, and success; many sanctuaries have been dedicated to the worship of God; revivals have been reported from a number of fields, and the membership largely increased. This is as it should be. Living as we are under the "dispensation of the Spirit," having the promise of "power from on high," preaching a full and free salvation, using evangelistic methods second to none in their efficiency and adaptation to the requirements of the day, we should expect a rich harvest of souls. We cease to be Methodistic when we are no longer aggressive. We can only keep what we have by surrounding it with new territories, won from the world. To stand still is to prepare the way for recession and loss. We are grateful to be able to say that our spiritual as well as our material resources remain unimpaired. Our principles require no revision; there is not an article in our creed that needs modification. Every doctrine we hold we are able to publish to the world without limitation or qualification. We have no contradictions to reconcile, no tenets that it would be prudent to conceal, or to reveal only to the initiated. Our efforts have been, through the blessing of God, effective in the salvation of sinners and the edification of It is to be expected that a community so eminently the child of Providence should advance with the age. The Shekinah that guides our march ever shines upon new fields and widening areas of territory, and a voice is heard in our midst, as we look upon one land of promise after another, saying, "Let us go up at once and possess it: for we are well able to overcome it."

The year now closing has been signally marked by the meeting of the second General Conference of the Methodist Church. During the sessions of that large and eminently representative body, some important changes were made in the details of our discipline, and some modifications in our

Among the most significant of its decisions methods of administration. was that in favor of University Federation. It is our duty, as true and loyal members of the Methodist Church, to do all that we can to carry into practical effect the measures adopted by the General Conference. But it becomes us also carefully to ascertain whether the conditions upon which its legislation in this respect was based have been or are likely to be fully met; whether the Act passed at the late session of the Ontario Legislature contains all the provisions contemplated by the General Conference when it took the action referred to. As that action required the Board of Regents to "take the proper steps to give effect to such Federation at as early a period as a due regard to existing interests and to the necessary financial and other arrangements should render it practicable." it becomes us to see that the interests referred to are adequately protected, and all the financial requirements provided for, before the final and irrevocable step—such as the removal of Victoria College to Queen's Park, Toronto, would be-is taken.

The sessions of our Annual Conference have been characterized by harmony and brotherly love. Though many and in some cases conflicting interests have required attention, though questions of great importance have been debated with that freedom of expression which fidelity to convictions required, the discussions throughout have been marked with that kind consideration for the views and feelings of others which should ever find a place among "brethren in Christ Jesus." The public religious services in connection with the Conference have been distinguished for

their spiritual power and their influence for good.

In addressing you as "brethren beloved" we cannot too earnestly urge upon you the importance of personal holiness. Sin is the source of weakness; purity is power. As instruments in the hands of God for the accomplishment of His saving and sanctifying purposes, as "laborers together with Him," it becomes you to divest yourselves of every moral weakness, clothe yourselves with power, and perfect holiness in the fear of the Lord. To this end you will need to use all "the means of grace." Enter into your closet, cultivate communion with God, and your Father who seeth in secret shall reward you openly. Maintain family worship; let no interruption of the ordinary routine of domestic life, no pressure of business, no social calls, interfere with the performance of this duty. Train up your children in the way they should go. Send them early to the Sabbath-school, and encourage them to attend it in later life. "Search the Scriptures," look into their blessed depths for the treasures hidden there; so shall you be rich toward God, and wise unto salvation. Be not among those who excuse themselves from attendance upon the class meeting; maintain your own spirituality by fellowship with your brethren in Christ. "If we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin."

Our benevolent institutions are worthy of the loyal and hearty support you have given them in the past and are prepared to accord them in the future. The Missionary Society of our Church is doing a noble work It maintains a number of domestic missions which, there is reason to hope, will soon become self-sustaining circuits. It is sending the gospel to the French in the Province of Quebec, the Indians of the West, the

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Chinese of British Columbia, and the Japanese in their distant land. The economy and ability with which this Society is managed, the self-sacrificing zeal, the untiring devotion and acknowledged efficiency of its missionaries, and the great results of their labors as reported from year to year, commend it to your warmest sympathy and render it worthy of your largest liberality.

The work accomplished by the Educational Society deserves special mention. The provision made for the higher intellectual training of the young under Christian auspices, the maintenance of educational institutions of great mental and moral efficiency, and the arrangements made for the more perfect preparation of our probationers for the work of the Christian ministry, commend it to your favorable notice as not the least in importance among the many great enterprises of our Church.

In this age of culture we need scarcely remind you of the importance of securing for yourselves and your families the best religious and general literature. The magazines and newspapers of the day are, in a certain sense, the leading educators of the people. There is scarcely a phase of literary, scientific, moral, religious, or irreligious thought and feeling that is not reflected in the periodical literature of the day. The press, mighty as a power for good, is also a tremendous power for evil. It becomes you to see that nothing is admitted to your homes that is not promotive of sound thought and healthy religious life. Our Book Rooms, our Sundayschool and connexional publications, provide to a large extent for the culture of your mental and moral nature, and are eminently worthy of your support. As the limits of our work become wider, as our connexional enterprises become more numerous and far-reaching, the necessity for full, prompt, and reliable information concerning them will become more pressing, and no member of our Church should be ignorant of these The "Course of Reading" recommended by the late General Conference, for similar reasons, commends itself to your favorable attention.

The Methodist Church is distinguished for the special attention paid to Sabbath-school organization and instruction. The fact that we have in Canada more Sunday-schools, more teachers and more scholars than all the other Protestant Churches in the Dominion put together, is one of immense significance. While we should not forget to be grateful to the Giver of all Good for this token of His favor, we should also remember that it involves tremendous responsibility. The future of this country is in the hands of the Sabbath-school teacher. Fidelity to the duty of to-day in this department of Christian work will secure the predominance of Christian thought and action in the near future. A grand opportunity is before us; may it be faithfully improved.

One of the most deserving institutions of our Church is the Superannuation Fund. As you are aware, it is intended to provide a small allowance for our worn-out ministers and for the widows of those who have been called to their reward. Many of you owe, under God, your salvation to the venerable men who are now to a large extent dependent upon your aid. You did not fail to appreciate the work they wrought when in the fulness of their strength, and you will not deny yourselves the pleasure of making the years during which they wait for the Master's coming more pleasant and comfortable, by your sympathy and support. It has been found necessary to apply the assessment principle to the resources of the Circuits in order to secure for them the disciplinary allowance. We are sure that you will see the reasonableness of this arrangement, and co-operate with your pastors in carrying it into practical

No Church has a better right to make itself heard in relation to the great moral and social reforms of the day than ours. You have the power to say—without declaring for a third party—that in the near future questions involving the peace, the purity and the prosperity of our homes shall rise above all the purely political issues of the hour. For nearly one hundred and fifty years our General Rules have required our people to avoid "drunkenness, buying or selling spirituous liquors, or drinking them." To-day our host is marching with unfaltering step toward the prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating liquors. Let there be no stragglers from the advancing column; let there be no delay in the forward movement, and a near and decisive victory is ours.

"And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge; and to knowledge temperance; and to temperance patience; and to patience godliness; and to godliness brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness charity. For if these things be in you and abound, they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in

the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ."

"Now the God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever."

CONFERENCE ANNIVERSARIES.

The meeting was held on Thursday evening, the President in the chair. The Rev. Dr. Williams, Conference Treasurer, presented the Annual Report, after which addresses were delivered by the Rev. Dr. Burwash, Dean of Faculty of Theology, Victoria University; George A. Cox, Esq., Bursar, Victoria University; the Rev. Dr. Potts, General Secretary of Education, and the Rev. Dr. Carman, General Superintendent.

RECEPTION INTO FULL CONNEXION.
