

## OLD ALASKAN PLACES **VISITED BY SPOKANE**

Northland—Steamer Sails Again With Big Crowd

(From Thursday's Daily.) Owing to the fact that perfect weather saved the time usually allotted on her schedule for fog delays the Alaskan cruising steamship Spit kane, which arrived here this morning from the first trip of the season, was able to visit a number of out-of-theway spots seldom seen by Northern tourists. On her last trip the Spokane succeeded in entering Queen Inlet through Glacier Bay and obtained a view of Carroll Glacier. James Carroll, who years ago was master of the historic old steamship Al-Ki.

Owing to the fact that there was not a cloud in the sky the tourists were afforded a splendid view of the wall of ice a mile broad and more than two hundred feet high, which they saw from a distance of 300 yards. As the vessel was ahead of her schedule a call was made at old Fort Tongass, which was found entirely deserted and overgrown with weeds and nettles. Fort Tongass was the first military post established in Alaska after the territory was taken over by the United States, but has long since been abandoned. The buildings since fall-




