

PROVINCES TO APPEAL CASES

Decision That Supreme Court Has Jurisdiction Over Legislation Affecting Fisheries.

Wallace Nesbitt Gives Notice of Appeal to Privy Council—Manufacturers Win.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 11.—In the supreme court today Wallace Nesbitt, K. C., with Bayley, K. C., associated with him on behalf of the provinces of Ontario, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba and Alberta, moved to quash the reference made by the Dominion Government and now pending, in relation to legislation respecting fisheries, insurance and the incorporation of companies, on the ground that the British North America Act did not authorize parliament to constitute a Dominion court for the purpose of answering abstract questions on matters of the kind, the answers to which in any event would be academic, and perhaps dangerous and prejudicial to civil rights.

E. Lafrenoy, K. C., appeared on behalf of the provinces of Quebec and British Columbia, and intimated that they had consented to the references in regard to fisheries and were anxious for a decision respecting them, and he also appeared on behalf of the all Canada Insurance Federation for leave to appear, file a factum, and be heard on the merits of the reference respecting insurance.

Alme Geoffroy, K. C., appeared for the province of Quebec in regard to the insurance reference, and stated that that province was anxious to have the matter submitted. The motion was opposed by Newcombe, K. C. and Mulvey, K. C., on behalf of the Dominion Government.

For Manufacturers. An application was made by Mr. Westcott, asking that the Canadian Manufacturers' Association should be allowed to appear at the hearing on the merits and file a factum. The motions on behalf of the All Canada Insurance Federation and the Canadian Manufacturers' Association were granted. After consideration the majority of the court was of the opinion that the court had jurisdiction to hear and decide the reference.

Upon this decision being announced, Nesbitt, K. C., asked that the hearing of the references upon the merits should not be pressed on for the present, as it was in the contemplation of provinces represented by him that they should apply to the judicial committee of the privy council for special leave to appeal from the decision of the court that they had jurisdiction to entertain the questions referred to them in the reference made by the Dominion Government, in so far as at least, as affected the provinces on behalf of which objection to the jurisdiction was taken.

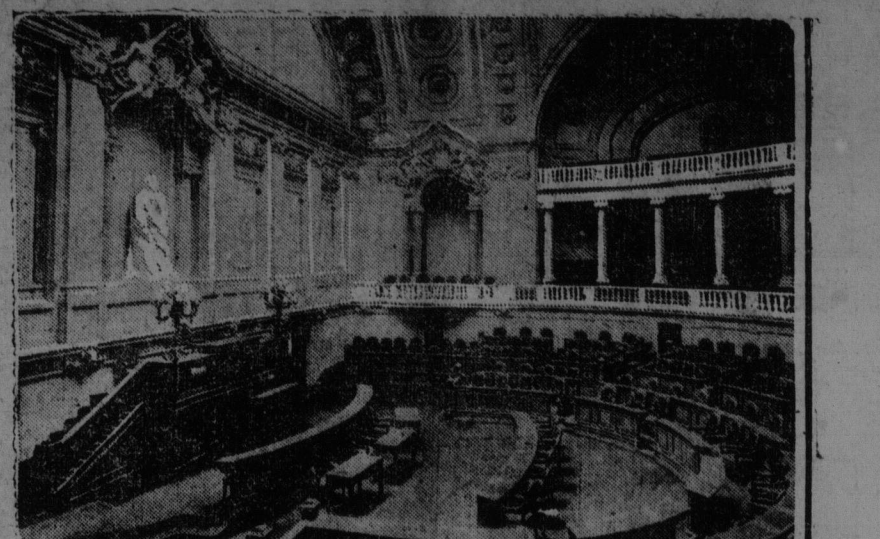
DEMOCRATS MAY RE-ASSEMBLE. Congressman Foss Suggests that Convention Should Be Called Together Again to Agree on Candidate.

Moncton, Oct. 11.—Word was received here today of the death, by poisoning, of Thomas Stegman, at Chatham, Ont., father of Mrs. Hopkirk, accountant in the Bank of Montreal here. Mrs. Hopkirk was summoned to Chatham, Ont., yesterday owing to the serious illness of her father, but word came today of his death.

It appears that the whole family were accidentally poisoned through food about ten days ago but they partially recovered and were thought to be out of danger, but Mr. Stegman was again taken violently ill yesterday passing away today.

From what can be learned here the poison, by some mistake, got into food which was served to the family at mealtime. The poison is said to have been Rough on Rats. Injury to I. C. R. Driver. William Smallwood, the well known I. C. R. driver on the Ocean Limited was the victim of a serious accident at the depot this afternoon about 2:30 o'clock.

GOVERNMENT BY COMMISSION IN LYNN. New Plan Adopted by Majority of 726 at Special Election Yesterday—Patterned After Haverhill Form.

Lynn, Mass., Oct. 11.—The commission form of government was adopted by this city at a special election held today, by a majority of 726. Of the 22 precincts in the city, 18 voted in favor of the change. At the municipal election in December the voters will elect five men as a commission to govern the city, and on the first Monday in January this commission will supersede the present mayor, board of aldermen and city council. The plan is practically the same as that now in operation in Haverhill.

PAID SMALL FORTUNE IN CUSTOMS DUTIES. Charges on Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt's Silk Gowns Totaled \$11,000—Also Carried \$200,000 Worth of Jewels.

New York, N. Y., Oct. 11.—Eleven thousand dollars in duty, mostly on Parisian gowns, was paid by Mrs. Wm. K. Vanderbilt when she returned from Europe on the Kron Prinzessin Cecilie today. This is the season's record, if not for all time, of duty paid on individual baggage.

COMING TO ENGLAND. Gibraltar, Oct. 11.—It is announced that King George has ordered the British royal yacht Victoria and Albert to proceed to Gibraltar to embark King Manuel and the queen mother Amelie.

CROPS BETTER IN EASTERN PROVINCES. Census Bulletin Gives Higher Percentage for all Crops Except in Western Canada—20 Per Cent. Decrease.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Oct. 11.—The census office publishes a bulletin on the condition of crops in Canada at the end of September. The reports show lower average conditions for the whole of Canada, than those of a year ago, but the reduction applies chiefly to the north-west provinces.

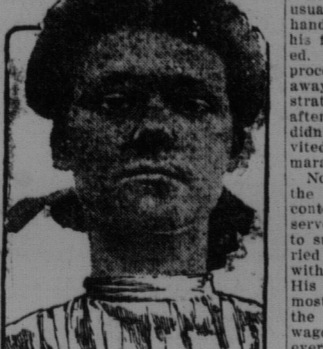
CORNER STONE OF NEW SCHOOL LAID

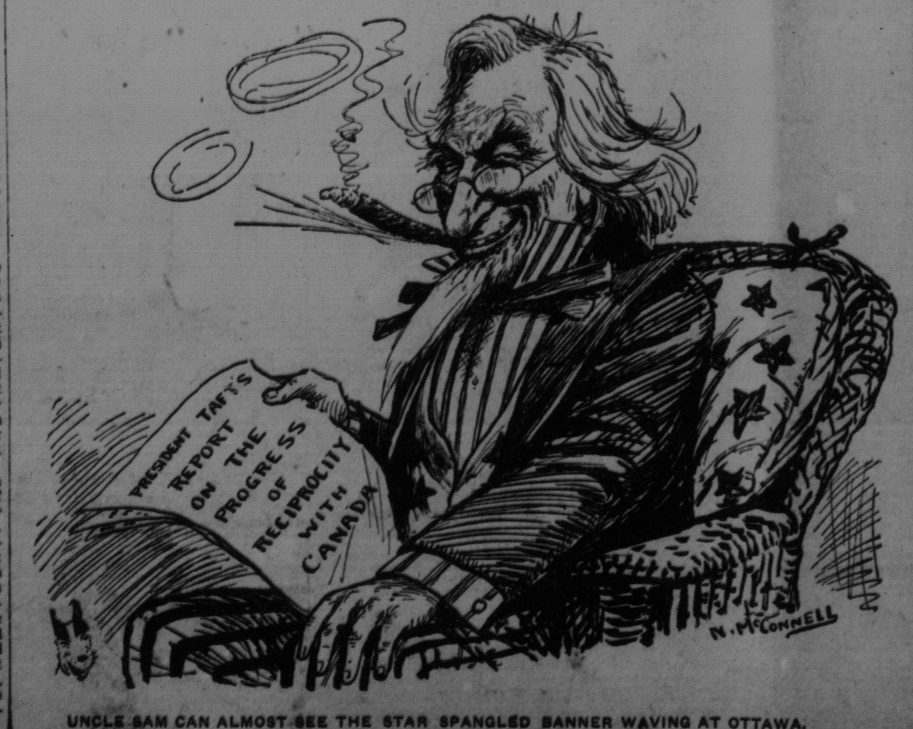

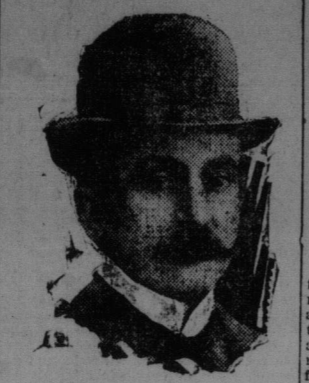

SIDELIGHT'S THE REVOLUTION

May be American Money Behind the Uprising—Chances of the Pretender.



Munich, Oct. 11.—Prince Miguel of Braganza, the pretender to the Portuguese throne, in an interview here asserts that the ringleaders of the revolution are not republicans, but "conservatives who were moved to take the present step by their hatred of the Liberals. Prince Miguel does not believe that the republic will last long. He was aware, he says, that the present movement was in preparation, but refused to take part in it while the existing dynasty was on the throne.

There is some speculation, in view of the revolution now in force in Portugal, over the chances of Prince Miguel, who married Miss Anita Stewart of New York, for reaching the throne abandoned by King Manuel.

Prince Miguel Maximilian Sebastian Mari de Braganza was born on September 22, 1878, in Richenau, lower Austria, and comes from the second branch of the house of Braganza. His grandfather was Prince Miguel of Portugal, and of Charlotte, the Infanta of Spain. King John's eldest son was Dom Pedro, who renounced his rights as King of Portugal in favour of his daughter, Maria, and became the first Emperor of Brazil. His son, a cousin of the present Prince Miguel, was the famous Dom Pedro, the last Emperor of Brazil, who was forced to abandon his throne and seek refuge in Europe in 1889. This makes Prince Miguel of semi-royal lineage. His mother was Princess Elizabeth of Thurn and Taxis, one of the mediocrity houses of Austria.

On September 15, 1909, he married Miss Anita Stewart, of New York, in Dingwall, Scotland. Miss Stewart just previous to her marriage, was created a princess of the Austrian court in her own right. She was reported at that time to have brought a large fortune to her husband. Prince Miguel is a daughter of Mrs. Rhinelander Stewart-Smith; Stewart after she was divorced and Smith after she had been before the partition with "Silent," a southerner with \$500,000 or thereabouts. Miss Anita's father is also a multi-millionaire and Silent Smith left mother a considerable sum.

Now the question is asked: How much did "Silent" Smith's money figure in working up a first-class revolution in Portugal?

It is in the smaller country that the peasantry are still the wealth of the land and the actual embodiment of the national character. To an American they are alternately an exasperation for their antiquated methods of agriculture. As Mark Twain said of the Azores farmer, "He prays not to be allowed to know more than his grandfather knew, and to plough with a sharpened stick as his grandfather ploughed."

"To an Englishman, read in the classic, the Portuguese farmer offers an almost literal preservation of the golden age of the classical pastoral. The pursuits of the vineyard, the field and the herd are here; and the very implements of the Roman. The grotesque and graceful superstitions persist, and the naive way of life. Instead of the distrustful politeness of towns, the traveller encounters an open-hearted candor and unconscious dignity. More than one has borne witness to this modern survival of a life which we know today only through Theocritus and Vergil; supposing, too, that theirs was a literary version of it.

stock and his trellises; his daughters ramble in the gardens rich with flowering plants of the old fashion; the children swim oranges in the irrigation trenches and the sons hunt.

A Typical Hunt.
 An Englishman after one experience of a Portuguese hunt, defined the occasion as "the greatest amusement of the greatest number of men and the least expenditure of money." As it was his fortune to hunt again and often, he has furnished a composite picture of these occasions, worth noting for what it tells of the people. "In a long series of runs we range through the great pine forests, or the chestnut woods, poking our sticks into the matted gorse and clats, banging the tree trunks with resounding blows. The dogs hunt a little, wrangle, bark and light a good deal, and would do so still more, but for the occasional flight into their midst of the ground, or thrown with random aim into the tall undergrowth. Several guns are fired off. Nothing is hit, not even a dog. Presently I make out a little animal which the gentlemen with guns stationed on a neighboring knoll. These sportsmen cock their pieces and aiming, apparently at the points of their own boots, fire. We run up and look. We find nothing but the hole of the burrow over which these gentlemen were mounting guard, and into which the rabbit has safely escaped.

M'DONALD WINS A HARD FOUGHT MATCH

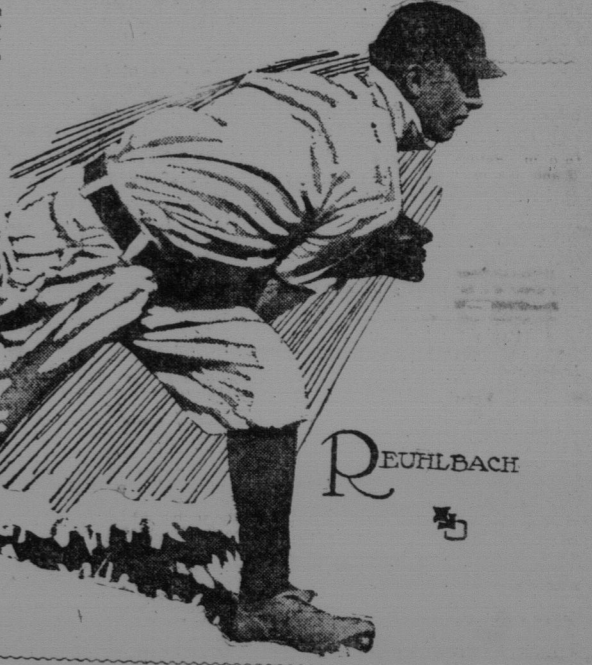

Several persons reported by the inspectors for non-compliance with the law regarding the installation of modern sanitary improvements were before the board and were granted extension of time in which to install improved facilities in their houses.

The secretary's monthly report showed the general health of the city to be good, and the amount of infectious disease in the city below the usual mark.
