Washington, May 10,—Col. Golejewski, military attache of the Russian embassy here, issued the following statement tonight:

"During the last week of April very considerable Austro-German forces assumed the offensive between the Vistula and the East Beskid range of the Carpathians.

"Supported by considerable heavy artillery the Austro-Germans, after a stubborn resistance by our troops on the second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth days of May, succeeded in crossing the river Dunajec and in establishing themselves between the latter and the River Wisloka.

JAPANESE CRUISER REFLOATED.

Tokio, May 10.—The Japanese armored cruiser Asama, which ran ashore on the coast of Lower California on February 4, has been refloated, according to official announcement madehere. The Asama will probably be docked and repaired at San Francisco.

"America," said the President, "must have the consciousness that on all sides it touches elbows, and touches heart, with all the nations of mankind. The example of America must be a special example. The president made no direct reference to the Lusitania tragedy, but the audience did not hesitate to read the application of his statement. The President pointed out the true goal of right American citizenship to be loyalty, not to the country of one's birth, but to the land of one's adoption.

"While you bring," he said, "all countries with you, you come with a purpose of leaving all other countries behind you—bringing what is best of the place where you go. You cannot be an American if you think of your sist of groups. A man who considers himself as belonging to a national group is not yet an American. "My advice to you is to think first, not only of America, but to think first, of humanity, and you do not love humanity if you seek to divide humanity in jealous camps."

Parls, May 10.—The following official communication was issued by the War Office tonight:

"To the north of Arras, in spite of several German counter-attacks we have maintained all our gain of yesterday, and we have enlarged it at certain points, notably between Carency and Sauchez.

"Our success is developing. The total number of prisoners at three o'clock today exceeded 2,000. Among these were about 40 officers, including a colonel.

"We have captured, in the last two days, more than ten cannon and 50 machine guns.

"At Berry-Au-Bac a German attack has been repulsed, as well as one in the forest of Le Pretre."

"We made progress on the coast in the Dunes, in the direction of Nieuport, taking several of the enemy's trenches and machine guns. A counter-attack by the enemy during last night advanced as far as Lombaertzyde, but was completely driven back.

"In Flanders we also gained more ground. We took 162 British prisoners at Verlerenhoek. Southwest of Lille a great Anglo-French attack, anticipated as a reply to our successes in Galicia, was begun and directed itself against our position situated to the east of Fleurbaix, to the east of Richebourg, to the east of Vermelles, and at Ablain, Cerebey, Neuville and St. Lourent, near Arras. The enemy, French, as well as white and colored British, brought at least four new army corps into the fight, besides the force which has been employed in this line for some time past. Nevertheless repeated attacks have been nearly everywhere repulsed, with heavy losses for our opponents. This is especially so in the case of the British attack. About 500 prisoners have been taken.

"Only in the region between Carency and Neuville did our opponents succeed in penetrating and establishing themselves in our foremost line trenches.

"A counter-attack is now proceeding.

GOVERNMENT KNEW ABOUT SUBMARINES

Despite this one awful case, British sea trade has suffered but very little from enemy's ships.

London, May 10.—The First Lord of the Admiralty, Winston Churchill, stated in the House of Commons this atternoon that Captain Turner, of the Lusitania, had acknowledged receipt of messages from the Admiralty giving him warning and directions for the course he was to take.

"The Admiralty had general knowledge of the German warning issued in America," Mr. Churchill declared, "and from that knowledge and other information concerning submarine movements it sent warnings to the Lusitania and directions as to her course. I think, however, it is not right to go into that matter in detail, as it is going to be a subject of inquiry, and it might appear that I was endeavoring to throw blame on the captain of the Lusitania in a matter which will be a subject of full investigation."

Continuing, Mr. Churchill said this investigation would be conducted by Lord Mersey, assisted by skilled assessors, and that it would be opened without avoidable delay. Mr. Churchill's remarks were drawn by questions from Lord Charles Beresford and others asking for details as to what speed the Lusitania was making when she was torpedoed; whether there was a patrol boat in that locality; whether all points where vessels arrive and depart are now adequately patrolled; what provisions were made in the case of the Lusitania in view of the warning issued in America; whether Mr. Churchill was aware that previously to last Friday German submarines had for some time been actively at work on the south coast of Ireland; whether he was aware that the Admiralty had provided torpedo boat destroyers and other naval vessels to meet on the south coast of Ireland steamers carrying horses from the United States on government account to convoy them to Liverpool, and finally, what arrangements, if any were made to convoy and protect the Lusitania.

Berlin, via London, May 10.—The following despatch has been sent by the German Foreign Office to the German embassy at Washington:

"Please communicate the following to the State Department:

"The German government desires to express its deepest sympathy at the loss of lives on board the Lusitania. The responibility rests, however, with the British government, which, through its plan of starving the bivilian population of Germany; has forced Germany to resort to

ing the bivilian population of Germany; has forced Germany of the retailatory measures.

"In spite of the German offer to stop the submarine war, in case the starvation plan was given up, British merchant vessels are being generally armed with guns, and have repeatedly tried to ram submarines so that a previous search was impossible.

"They cannot, therefore, be treated as ordinary merchant vessels. A recent declaration made to the British parliament by the parliamentary secretary, in answer to a question by Lord Beresford, said that at the present practically all British merchant vessels were armed and provided with hand grenades.

"Besides, it has been openly admitted by the English press that the language of the present practical and previous voyages, repeatedly carried large quantities of



# ANTI-GERMAN RIOTS CAUSE MARTIAL LAW IN VICTORIA

Victoria, B. C., May 10.—Victoria is under martial rule, the result of released attacks upon German establishments by mobs bent on ravenging the sinking of the Lusitania. 





It should have been 'too dyspeptic,' From drug store he richochets to doctor, blaming the weather, the money market, the irusts or Teddy for what is really due to Little Mary. Your middle-aged man is at his worst when on his travels—his only exercise a sad procession to and from the dining car."

Another William is of the same opinion, Mr. W. A. Cooper, who claims that among other things he provides three million meals a year to travellers on the Canadian Pactific Railway. Mr Cooper is not a philosopher, but a practical man, and in his own way set out to investigate and solve this problem. He wrote to, or consulted personally, the leading stomach specialists in Europe, the United States and Canada. What he wanted was the flappy travellers on his dining cars, who would really enjoy the three million meals on which his chefs spent some trouble. Was the man of forty hopeless?




