The news spread rapidly and rumors had it that the death his red six persons and that Dr. Bonnell was dead, but when communication with Truro by long distance telephone was made it was learned that only the two ladies mentioned were killed, that Mrs. Ross Cameron of Montreal received a broken arm and three other ladies, Mrs. R. S. Boyd, Mrs. J. E. Sponigle and Mrs. E. G. Moxon of Truro were more or less slightly injured, while the chauffeur, L. Lance, was quite badly hurt and, with the others injured, was taken to a hospital in New Glasgow.

The accident happened on the narrow part of a road when the Ogilvie car met another automobile and tumbled over the embankment. Mrs. Ogilvie was killed almost instantly, and her sister, Mrs. Bonnell, only lived a few minutes after she was removed from under the car.

Warren Ogilvie, husband of one of the deceased, is the managing director of the Eastern Hat and Cap Company at Truro, N.S. He was returning from a business trip to New York and Montreal and passed through St. John on the At-lantic Express Saturday at noon en route to his home. 




