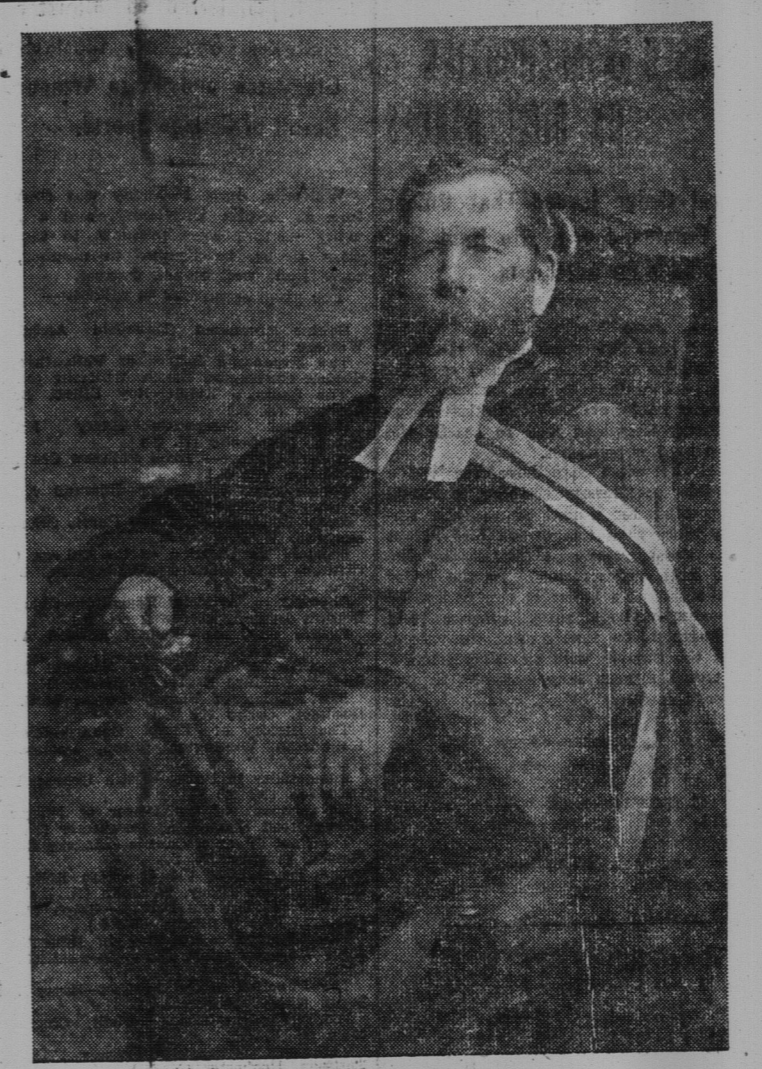

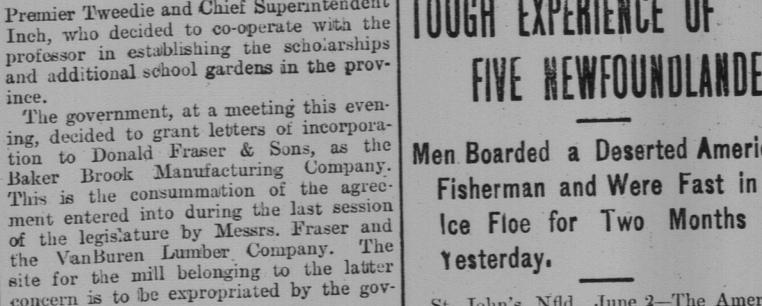

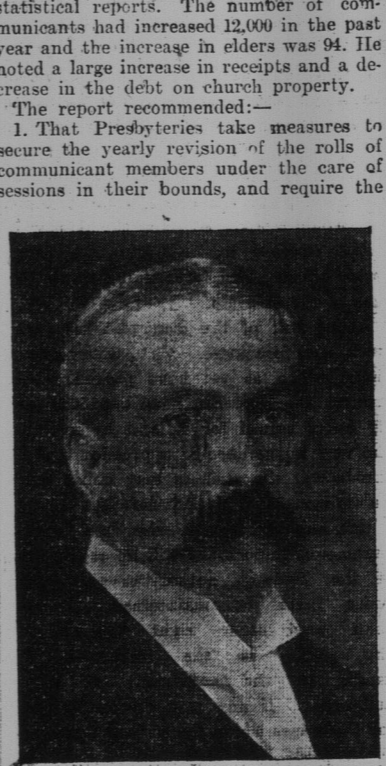
Dr. C. S. Marshall, of Bridgewater, who has been in town several days assisting his brother, left on Saturday for New York.

Dr. Warden strongly opposed the section. In no particular should the church exercise more care than in the matter of receiving ministers from other churches.

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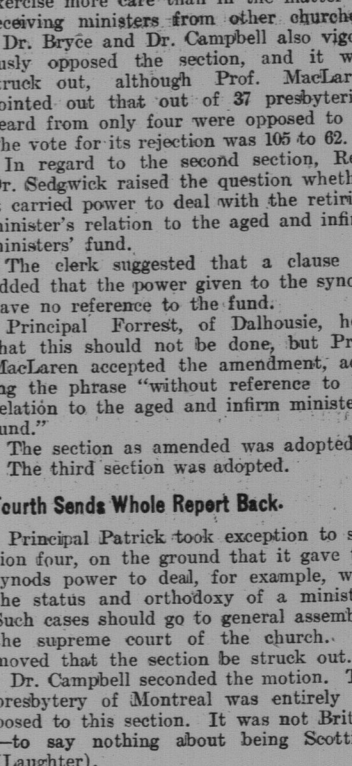
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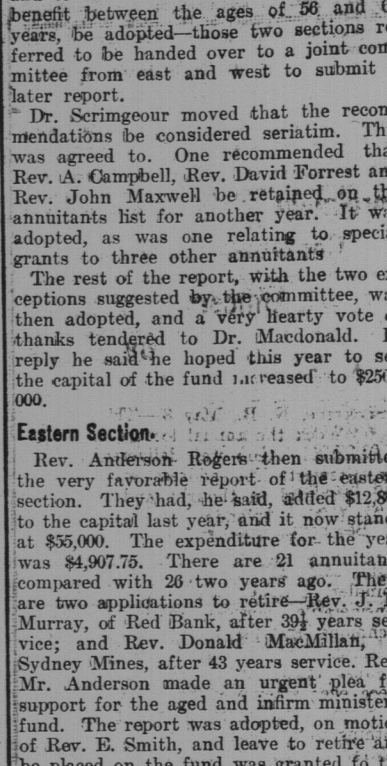
