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AID "CANADA" HAS LANDED GASPE CONTRACT.

Campbellton's Wishes Said
to Have Been Ignored and
Old Boat Put On.

THE OUTLOOK.

The Graphic learns on very good authority that the government has awarded the subsidy for the Campbellton-Gaspe service to the company which has recently purchased the steamer Canada, and that this steamer will perform the service this summer.

The Canada is an old boat and is not a first class accommodation for passengers, although the company have promised to use the steamer and put her in good shape. She is a slow boat, with none of the modern conveniences, and it is said that those who know that she is not fitted for the route she is expected to serve.

Campbellton people will regret to hear that the Canada is not to receive the subsidy but it may be that she is put on the route independently at least the busy part of the season.

At least encouragement should be given to the Thompson Company to put this steamer on, if only the subsidy is not to receive it.

We may add that Messrs Reid and Gill did all in their power to have the contract go to the Seneca, but the contract is considered a Gaspe venture naturally Mr. Lennox's influence and the pressure was light to hear from interested parties in Gaspe.

TOWN COUNCIL HELD MEETING

Special Meeting Held Last Night
When Delegates to Municipality
Meeting Were Appointed.

OBJECTS OF UNION.

The Town Council held a short session last evening, the full board being present. The finance, fire, police and water and sewerage committees reported on accounts and matters referred to them at a previous meeting. Robert H. Warren was appointed a member of the police force to enter upon his duties this morning.

A petition from John White, complaining of unfair assessment on land, asking for a rebate was referred to the Committee on Assessment and Appeals. A resolution was adopted concerning the Town of Campbellton a member of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities for the current year and the Mayor Murray Councilman Mowat were appointed to represent the Town at the meeting of the Union which will be held in Montreal on the 4th and 11th inst.

The steamer Lady Ellen was purchased, and serving the route successfully until last season, when she was wrecked at New Port Island. This was a severe blow to the company, and as the vessel was a complete loss it was felt best to withdraw from the field.

A call to the stockholders has been issued to meet next Tuesday at Port Daniel to take up the matter of choosing a liquidator, and taking the necessary steps to wind up the company.

P. Q. LEGISLATURE NOW IN SESSION (Continued from page 3) been a source of revenue for the settlers of the province.

Up till last year the law compelled the settler who cut any merchantable lumber in the process of clearing his land to sell it to the limit holder from whom limit, the lot had been taken. At the last session we abolished this clause and now the settler is sole master of his lumber and can sell it to whomsoever he chooses.

Again there are many settlers and farmers in the province who have got sufficient wood to their lots for building purposes and for their fences, and we passed a law a few years ago giving the settler the right on producing a declaration to that effect, go and cut in the crown domain what lumber he may need for his own personal use and for the building of his house in the vicinity the right is extended to cutting the lumber in question of the limits.

Next year the government increased the amount of colonization money from one hundred and thirty thousand dollars to one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

seventy five thousand dollars besides the sum of fifty thousand dollars voted for steel bridges and another amount of fifty thousand dollars to assist the roads in the older provinces thus making a total of two hundred and seventy five thousand dollars devoted last year for the purpose of helping the settlers of the province of Quebec.

In order to assist the settlers with their schools an amount of thirty two thousand dollars has been voted for their schools in order to promote the cause of education which is the main element of our natural existence.

Mr. Kelly then went on to take up many other points which had all tended to assist the settler in the province of Quebec, and showed how un founded are the arguments and unjust criticisms of the Nationalist party.

He called upon the honorable members opposite who are men of ability to do their duty as men towards the province. If the honorable members opposite are sincere in their declarations, if they are here to help and not to tear down, if they will join with the members of the government to try and elevate the plane of our life instead of trying to lower it by base personalities such as had fallen from the lips of the member of Montgomery tonight, they will find their efforts will be well received by the supporters of the government.

As for the honorable member for Montserrat, Mr. Lavergne, and the personalities that he had thrown across the house in his maiden speech, Mr. Kelly said that he understood that the honorable member had probably allowed himself to be carried away by silly notions, and that it had broken from his higher mental organs. This is quite natural especially for a member in his maiden speech as for these reasons he was prepared to forget the honorable member, provided he would promise to try to improve in the future.

We regret that we have not Mr. Kelly's speech in full length especially the latter part that related to Mr. Lavergne's personal attack upon him. With the courtesy of a statesman and old debater he quickly disposed of Mr. Lavergne's arguments and it was only when he had disposed of each one of them that turned to the personalities of his accuser.

P. Q. LEGISLATION NOW IN SESSION

Interesting Session of House Now
Well Under Way—New Party
and Leaders.

MR. KEELY'S SPEECH.

The Quebec Legislature that opened
on Tuesday last, with Sir Panteleone
Pelletier and the new lieutenant gov-
ernor, promises to be one of the most
interesting since the days of confed-
eration. The first night of its open-
ing the house sat till past twelve
o'clock and last night it was away
in the small hours of the morning be-
fore the house adjourned. The pre-
sence of the new party, the Nation-
alists, having as its leaders Mr. Bour-
assa and Mr. Lavergne, and the pre-
sence of the new leader of the opposi-
tion Mr. Talbot, all tend to give an
unusual atmosphere to the House,
which it has not known for many
years.

Mr. Bourassa and Mr. Lavergne
have been holding meetings all over
the province since the last few years
have all kind of suggestions and it
now remains whether they can be ac-
cepted as practical.
Mr. Bourassa and Mr. Lavergne
profited of the first day of the open-
ing of the Legislature to state their
platform, and at every step they
were met by the government which
showed how their arguments could
not stand when put into practice. Mr.
Lavergne having made certain in-
ductions against Mr. Kelly member for
Bonaventure, met with a response
which he did not expect and during
an hour or more the young member
for Bonaventure, took up the pro-
gramme of the Nationalist party
and clearly demonstrated the im-
possibility of accepting a single item
of their programme.

Mr. Kelly's Address
Mr. Kelly, member for Bonave-
nture, then followed Mr. Lavergne
and replied to the unjustified re-
marks that fell from the lips of the
member of Montserrat. He recalled
the fact that they had both been born
together at school and had a long
time together in the same office
during several years. Knowing the
ability as a speaker that Mr. Lavergne
had displayed when a student, and
after having passed four years in
the House of Commons he had ex-
pected to hear from the hon-
ourable member the speech of a statesman
with ideas worthy of the position he
has occupied. On the contrary how-
ever the speech delivered by the hon-
ourable member is one of mere per-
sonalities against the men who took
and nursed him in the cradle of his
political life, and who had helped
make him what he is. He did not
contest the right of the honorable
member to change his opinions so
often as he chooses. He has changed
them in the past, he has changed
them today and he will again change
them tomorrow, according to the op-
portunity that presents itself, but
while he has that right he should at
least have the grace to say so. For
the men who differ from his views and
who were instrumental in securing
his first steps in political life.
Taking up the question of the Ter-
race and Colon Lands (see land to
the free settlers, the speaker re-
marked that the Government's plan
was a plan for the occasion and
which means nothing. The opposi-
tion say that we should not build
houses in one part of the province
and the settlers in the other and keep
them separated so that they may
master on their own points. That
is a fine theory but how can it be
put into practice under present cir-
cumstances. The land for the free
settlers are applying in many cases
are lands that have already been sold
in years gone by to the limit holders
and on which the limit holders have
their rights. The present system of
selling crown lands was inaugurated
about 1842, and in those days and up
till recent years the various govern-
ments that have preceded the present
one did not look to the question of
settlement that was to take place in
the future. And hence it is that we
have the settler and the limit holder
each claiming equal rights in many
cases to the same land. If the hon-
ourable member had been a settler
he would have known that.

able members opposite will suggest
any way by which to remedy the
present situation and which could be
put into practice. Every member of
this house would be pleased to join
them in that respect. But what are
the suggestions of the opposition in
this respect. The member from Mont-
serrat has suggested that we should
take and hand over to the coloniza-
tion department the lands that should
be placed aside for colonization. Now
admitting that we do this what would
be the result. The situation as be-
fore—the limit holder and the settler
would remain exactly the same, and
it would be so no matter to what
department we would hand over the
administration of the lots. This would
simply amount to a question of ad-
ministration. But whether the sale of
the lots would be carried out by one
department or the other the rights of
the limit holder on the lots thus sold,
and the rights of the settler as they
now exist would remain exactly the
same, and we would be in the same
position as we are today.

This is one of the questions that
would call for great attention from
all governments but our situation
after all is not worse than it is in
other provinces. While we have this
trouble to solve here today the other
provinces and more especially New
Brunswick have questions relating
to their forest which are just as
serious if not more so than what
is at issue in our province. In New Brun-
swick today they are obliged to solve
the question of the leases of the
forests that will expire in the near
future and the difficult questions
that are already commencing to
present themselves in that respect
are far more intricate than the ques-
tion that we have now to dispose of.

The honorable member for Mont-
serrat has declared tonight that the
honourable member of this province during
the last ten years have made a profit
of over two hundred and fifty million
dollars (tax should have been made
by the province. I do not know
whether the honorable member knows
the meaning of two hundred and fifty
million dollars but if he can show
this province how we could have
made two hundred and fifty million
dollars during the past few years his
name will remain in history as a
genius of this time. Such a declara-
tion is one of the many that have
been made by the honorable mem-
bers of the left and which are too absurd
to call for attention.

Since the opening of the debate
the opposition have offered three sug-
gestions. Their leader says that we
should hand over the expenditure of
our monies for education to the coun-
cil of public instruction. This has
been done. We voted for education
purposes last year seven hundred
thousand dollars and out of this amount
only thirty thousand dollars were
left under the control of the provin-
cial secretary.

The second suggestion from the
honorable member from Joliette was
that we should spend our money for
iron bridges in the same way as we
dispose of our money for agriculture.
We adapted such a policy as would
enable the building of iron bridges in
our province, for years to come.

The third suggestion is from the
honorable member for Bonaventure,
who suggests that we should build
new model roads in the province of
sixty or sixty miles in length so that
the people may see how to do like-
wise elsewhere. But in what county
would we go to do this. A few
years ago we built such a model road
or rather contributed towards it, that
the road that leads to St. Anne-
de-Bonaventure, and even tonight the
opposition have criticized the false pos-
ition that they hold simply for the sake
of argument.

The colonist has received much
from the hands of this government
during the past years and the mem-
ber for Bonaventure went on to in-
dicate what the government has done
and called attention to what requires
to be done for the future.

Since the advent of power of the
present government of the province
much has been done to aid and as-
sist the settler who in good faith
wishes to take a lot of land and settle
thereon, but on the other hand the
government has considered it its duty
to wage with unflinching energy war
against the bogus settler who wishes
to obtain land not for the purpose of
settling but for the purpose of specu-
lation.

In order to assist the settler who
takes a lot for the purpose of real
settlement the government a few
years ago passed a law by which the
settler is not called upon to pay any
stamp-duty or the wood cut in the
process of making his improvements
under his location ticket. This has
been a great help to the settler.

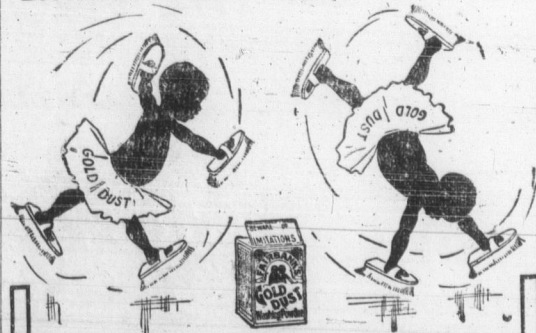
