From newspapers received from the Old Country, it appears that the workpeople in the woolen district of Yorkshire have had a general advance in their wages, the Cloth Finishers of Huddersfield, have had an advance of 20 per cent, field, have had an advance of 20 per cent, and in some cases without even asking for it, in the card-rooms the card cleaners who got 20 shillings sterling per week, have had an advance of two shillings per week, for the same work here they pay 80 cents per day; and I am told by a weaver from the Old Country that the manufacturers pay near half as much again for weaving a yard of cloth, as they do here, and so on through all the process of manufacturing. There is one process of manufacturing. There is one vantage that the manufacturers in the Old Country have over the manufacturers here—the children under 13 years of age are not so well paid as they are here, but the law only allows them to work


