TWO MURDERS.

Bloody Work at Holmesdale and Mimico.

A Jealous Husband's Deadly Revenge.

Fatal Sequel to a Drunken Spree—A Hamilton Man Stabbed to Death.

Mimico, Ont., March 24.—A young man named John Wade, whose parents reside in Hamilton, was fatally stabbed last night by John Byron, who resides in Merritton. Both men are employed by the constructors of the new asylum buildings in course of construction a mile and a half west of this place. Wade, who is 23 years of age, was a carpenter, and worked for Dickinson Bros. Byron is an elderly man, about 50 years old, and is employed by Miles, Bunting & Co. His friend took out his handkerchief to bind up the wound, while another of the dying man's companions ran for Dr. Oliver, who was soon in attendance on the poor fellow, who in the meantime had been carried to the waiting room of the Grand Trunk Railway station. The Doctor pronounced the wound fatal and Wade breathed his last a few minutes afterwards.

THE VICTIM.

The deceased came from Hamilton. He was in his 23rd year, and lived, previous to going to Mimico in August last, with his father, Jas. Wade, carpenter, Cannon street east. London, Monday, March 24.

BRITISH Columbia seems to afford a good field for enterprising dairymen as well as poulterers. A few days ago we referred to the fact that eggs were selling in Vancouver at 40 cents and 50 cents a dozen. Now it is announced that milk brings 10 cents a quart at the same place. Fewer speculators and ore dairies and henneries are what the peo ple at the Pacific jumping-off place require

THE Northwest residents cannot eat their cake and have it too. For years past, the Indians and the new settlers have been indiscriminately slaughtering the game with which the prairies at one time abounded; and now the announcement is made that the wild animals and birds have almost entirely disappeared from the dis trict. The Northwest people, who are, bit by bit, forcing the Dominion Parliament to give them full control of their local affairs, should take warning from the early experiences of the older Provinces, and pay some little attention to the preservation game, and thus ensure a very material addition to their food supply, embracing many toothsome dainties that they will be deprived of if they do not enforce a clos

It is said that Mr. Hesson, of North Perth, has never given an independent vote since he entered Parliament. He resembles, in some measure, the late Mr. Merry, M. P. for the Falkirk (Scotland) Burghs, who knew more about race horses than politics, and who invariably voted with his party. He was asked one day how he came always to go straight, and he frankly confessed that he always watched how Mr. Crum Ewing, the member for Paisley, was going, and followed him into the same lobby. Mr. Hesson always watches how Sir John Macdonald is going, and follows suit no matter what the question. He interprets his duty as did Mr. Joseph Marshall, M.P. for East Middlesex, when taken to task for voting against disallowing the Jesuit Bill. "I was sent to Parliament to support Sir John Macdonald," explained the pliable Joseph, "and what can I do but vote as he


