At a meeting of the laundresses in North London yesterday after speech-making and some wrangling 300 of the women went on strike. The laundresses demand the eighthour day and 42 pence for a day's labor. The strikers marched in a body to the establishments where "blacklegs" were employed, and after smashing the windows dragged the blacklegs away from their work, upset or emptied the washtubs, overturned the ironing tables, kicked over the clothes horses and played havoc generally. Company are perplexed by a new source of trouble. Following the cave-in a month ago on the Canadian side comes another, now on the American side. The north bank for a distance of 325 feet has caved in, filling the approach to the depth of ten feet or more. As the bank slid down the track leading to the tunnel rose up, in about the same manner as it did on the Canadian side. The mouth of the tunnel is not closed, but to the west the passage is completely wrecked, the building standing at an apple of 45 degrees on the bank. The machinery was not damaged. The building was at once made fast and the planer and engines are being removed. Along the bank are other seams, and it is probable that other cave-ins will take-place.

Wrecked in a Storm-Five or Six Person Killed and Twelve to Fifteen Injured.

CHICAGO, June 17.—A disastrous wreck has occurred on the Milwaukee and St. Paul Rajlroad, half a mile east of Coen Rapids, Ia. A passenger train, consisting of baggage and mail and express cars, several coaches and two sleepers crashed through the bridge over Coen River. Only the rear sleeper remained on the track.

A Remarkable Flot Overheard by Women in a Raifroad Car.

London, June 17.—The Worthing magistracy has just dealt with a case which is believed to be without a precedent. Three ladies traveling in a raifroad coach overheard two other lady passengers discussing an unhappy love affair in which one of them, Edith Spiller, had been engaged, and listened to an agreement, which was finally made, that the despondent girl should commit suicide, the laudanum for the purpose to be procured by her confidante, whose name is Rose Brame. THE DEATH ROLL INCREASED. Over 100 Corpses Taken from the Swiss Railway Wreck—The Dead Number 150.

LONDON, June 18 .- A Basle dispatch says: Over 100 corpses have been re-covered at the scene of Sunday's railroad disaster. The number of dead has reached 150. The unidentified bodies are preserved in the hospital. Stakes have been driven into the river bed to prevent unrecovered

corpses from washing away.

KINGSTON, June 16 .- The General Assembly resumed its deliberations this morning in St. Andrew's Church. The Record Committee reported the following statistics respecting the denominational organ:

"A farmer brought to tewn this morning about ten bushels of potatoes, and could find no market for them. He finally seld them to the Northern Hotel at 56 cents per bushel."

Why do not the farmers of Michigan avail themselves of the markets of 60,900,000? What is the matter with their intelligence? In this city the farmers of Middlesex at present realize over 80 cents a bushel for their potatoes—30 cents a bushel more than the Michigan farmer in his home market. Sir Richard ought to see to this.

This is rather a flippant way to dispose of the great potato question. Let us look

of the great potato question. Let us look at it, not from the point of view of one solitary transaction in a backwoods village, but from the records in the markets to which Canadian potatoes might be sent, in the absence of the duty. If London dealers were buying potatoes for shipment across the border they would never go to a country village in Michigan for their quotations, but to the markets of such potato consuming centers as Detroit, Buffalo and

Now in the Lendon market-we take Free Press quotations—potatoes are selling for \$1 10 to \$1 25 a bag, or, as our contemporary says, fully 80 cents a bushel.

Turning to the latest quotations in the Detroit marker, quoting the Free Press of that city, we find the market quotations

for potatoes \$1 05 to \$1 10 per bushel.

That this price is not exceptional over the border the quotations for potatoes in Buffalo, given by the Express, show. In Buffalo the price is slightly higher than in Detroit, the ruling rates being \$1 10

to \$1 25 per bushel. At Philadelphia the prices are higher still, being, according to quality, from \$1 20 to \$1 30 per bushel. The potato argument against complete

eciprocity is thus a very poor one.

TORONTO CONFERENCE

Takes a Strong Position on the Prohibition Platform—The Heresy Case. Takes a strong Position on the Prohibition Platform—The Heresy Case.

Toronto, June 17.—At yesterday's session of the Teronte Conference, the Committee on Temperance reported. Rev. H. S. Matthews, Rev. W. T. Hicks and Messrs. J. L. Lovering and John Grayden, with Rev. R. McKee and Mr. Edward Savage as alternates, were received as a committee representing the Conference at the meeting of the Alliance to be held in Toronto on Sept. 10 and 11 this year. They are unalterably opposed to all efforts to regulate the liquor traffic by taxation or license, high or low. The complete and immediate legal prohibition of the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes they held to be the duty of the Civil Government. They indorsed the proposal of the Dominion Alliance to secure the election to the Commons of prohibitionists, regardless of party. Efforts should be made in this direction at party conventions and present members of Parliament who have declared for Efforts should be made in this direction at party conventions and present members of Parliament who have declared for prohibition should be supported. In accordance with the request of the General Conference, the committee recommended that delegates be appointed to represent the Conference at the World's Temperance Convention to be held in Chicago during the World's Exposition held there. The report was adopted.

Immediately after the afternoon adjournment a ministerial session was convened for continuing the trial of the Rev. James Thompson, of Honeywood, who is charged with heresy. Mr. Thompson was called on to explain his position and doctrine, and occupied 45 minutes in elaborating and defining what has been called his peculiar heterodoxy. He did not deny that he had been preaching that immortality could not be attained except through persistent continuance in well-doing; that when the wicked die they are absolutely extinct, but after a time they are resurrected, temporarily punished and finally completely annihilated. 
