London, Dec. 11 .- Friday night's action of the House of Lords in adding a "contracting-out" amendment to the Employers Liability Bill is practically accepted by the Government as a declaration of open war against the principle of the bill. If the Lords stand firm this must precipitate a conflict, which, very pessibly, will end in the speedy dissolution of Parliament and an appeal to the people of Great Britain on the great issue of "mending or ending" the House of Lords, with Home Rule and other Liberal measures as only subordinate ques-

In fact, the News deliberately intimates this morning that the entire bill must now be abandoned "until the House of Lords has been dealt with." When it is remembered that Arnold Morley, the Postmaster General, is the chief owner of the News, the significance of this statement becomes apparent, as it doubtless was inspired by Mr. Gladstone and the Cabinet.

The Chronicle, a recognized and able organ of the masses, goes further still. It says: "The attitude of the Lords is an invitation to a trial of strength which, for aught we know, may bring us nearer revolution than any political question since 1832. The challenge will, we hope, be instantly taken un."

Prime Minister Gladstone may force a dis-In the event of an appeal to the country Prime Minister Gladstone may force a dissolution before January is over, and Great Britain may then be plunged into a conflict more momentous than any since that, when, on March 19, 1649, "the Commons of England assembled in Parlament, finding by too long experience that the House of Lords is useless and dangerous to the people of England," did ordain and enact, "that from henceforth the House of Lords in Parliament shall be and is hereby abolished and taken away, and that the Lords shall not from henceforth meet or sit in said house called the Lord's House, or in any other house or place whatsoever as a House of Lords." The return of Charles II. brought about a revocation of this act, but it does not seem improbable that it may now be re-enacted after another 245 years.

The fact that the Centrists voted in favor of the treaty of Roumania originated in the rumor that the Government had promised to give effect to the Reichstag vote to recall the Jesuits to Germany. The Associated Press learns that nothing of the kind occurred and that the present indications are quite to the contrary. The Emperor has congratulated the Catholic Prince Fuerstenberg for his vote against the repeal of the Jesuit law, and a movement is beginning to manifest itself in evangelical circles against the repeal.

"After 25 years I see little change in France, but much change in England.
Beauty, to my eye, is distinctly more frequent. Intelligent beauty is immensely commoner. Bright, pretty girls now abound here and there in the lower class. The upper class remains much where it was, but in the middle classes the improvement is unspeakable. Prettiness is general, and real beauty is much more frequent than formerly. Girls are better grown, have finer figures, look much more intelligent and possess better-chiceled features on an average than their mothers."

Ghastly Experiments. The French Academy of Medicine has re-seived an interesting if ghastly communication from Dr. Chauvel, an army staff surgeon, as to the penetrating powers of modern vifle bullets. Dr. Demosthens, the shief surgeon of the Roumanian army, Onio,

has been practicing on human corpses and live horses with the improved Maennlicher rifle. A bail passed through a box of sulphur without igniting it. The human body, therefore, would not be burned. Of five corpses placed one behind the other at a distance of 1,800 feet three were pierced by one bullet. The wounds made in the soft tissue were smaller than those caused by the arms last used in warfare, but the bones struck by the bullets were splintered and arteries were cut so completely that stoppage of hemorrhage would be almost impossible.

AWFUL PLIGHT OF MR. MEREDITH The Patrons of Industry favor the election, by popular vote, of all officials employed in counties except county judges.

Why except county judges? At present county judges are almost invariably appointed by the party in power, not because of their eminence in the legal profession, but because they are good party men. Sometimes very objectionable appointments are made, and at other times judges degenerate to such an extent that it would be a positive relief to those over whom they are set if they could vote them out of a position that they are unworthy to fill. There is no reason why the American system, proposed by the Patrons, if adopted, should not be extended to the judges as well as to other officials, and if to county officers why not to postmasters in towns and cities, to collectors of customs, and so on?

THE TUBERCULOSIS "SCARE." Political exigency, and not the public welfare, dictated the recent Conservative ewspaper attack on the Ontario Minister of Agriculture and the staff of the Experimental Farm at Guelph. It is true that tuberculosis was discovered in the herd at the farm, that a series of tests have been conducted with Koch's lymph, and that five infected animals have been slaughtered. Though not a welcome revelation, no wellread agriculturist could be astonished to find that tuberculosis had attacked some of the animals at Guelph. The fact is that the disease prevails elsewhere in Canada. and is found in every stock-raising land on the face of the globe. In the United States and in old world countries the subject has been carefully investigated, and the same course has been pursued openly in the presence of 100 students at the Guelph farm, though the detractors of the Minister of Agriculture have pretended that the utmost secrecy was observed. At the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa, which is under the charge of Prof. Saunders, 26 cattle have been slaughtered because they suffered from tuberculosis. The deputy minister at the Dominion capital says that the disease is quite common throughout Canada as well as in other lands, and that no government has taken steps to stamp it out because it does not come within the administrative scope of ar administration. Indeed, before the em bargo was placed on Canadian cattle in England, if a case of tuberculosis was discovered in a cargo sent from Canada, it was not deemed necessary to slaughter the animals. Having these facts in view, it

does seem to be carrying partisan animus to an extreme to attack the Ontario Min ister of Agriculture in connection with the outbreak at Guelph. No newspaper blamed Prof. Saunders or his staff for the preval-

ence of the disease at Ottawa.

True Protestantism, or at any rate true religion, should be too deeply imbued with the spirit of equal rights, of fair play, of the golden rule, to seek to deny to members of another faith the rights of citizenship which it claims for itself. 
