

A BUNGLING GOVERNMENT. It is plain that the Provincial Legislature will be largely occupied during the present session with patching and mending the 'prentice work of the Government at the preceding session.

The speech of the Provincial Secrethe Conservative convention in Mount Brydges yesterday was a lengthy and labored apology for the educationlast year. Here is one abject confession of incompetence:

"The Government, in taking the value as the basis for assessment act of three years ago dicated by the instrument. would result in actual values, being letters received from various quarters, it was found that the municipalities in practice are adopting the same ratio of assessment as before the passage of the new act. In the same county we may find a municipality assessed, according to the report of the county judge, as low as 30 per cent of the actual values, while other municipalities in that count were assessed as high as 100 per cent In that case we would have this condition, on one side of the township line a school section representing an actual value of \$200,000 and assessed for that amount, and required to pay \$500 to their teacher; while on the other side of the township line a section of like size and value assessed at but 30 per cent, or \$60,000, and required to pay but \$300 to its teacher. This presented an apparent injustice and the Government resolved to remedy it at the first opportunity, and in the new proposition the assessed value of the section is therefore abandoned as the basis for fixing the rate of
