





ROSEBERY'S PLAN TO REFORM LORDS

London, March 10.—In the House of Lords this afternoon Lord Rosebery gave notice that he intended to move on March three resolutions, embodying in general terms the course which the peers propose to follow in modernizing themselves. As Lord Rosebery has been in consultation with a majority of the members of the Upper House, there is little question that the resolutions present the general views of the Lords on the subject of reorganization. The resolutions read:

1. That a strong and efficient second chamber is not mcrely an integral part of the British constitution, but is necessary to the well-being of the state and the balance of Parliament. 2. That a second chamber can best be obtained by reforming and reconstituting the House of Lords.

3. That a necessary preliminary to such reform and reconpeerage shall no longer in itself give the right to sit and vote in the House of Lords.


