All Delville Wood Now In Hands of British; Counter-Attacks Failed

AND ARWENIA Fifth Brandenburg Division Driven Out of Strong Position by Haig's Men, Leaving 2 Officers and 158 Men Prisoners.

STILL GOING AHEAD AT LONGUEVAL AND POZIERES.

Germans Penetrate British Trenches at Neuve Chappelle, But Are immediately Expelled.

(Canadian Press.)

London, July 28 .- British troops have captured Delville Wood in its entirety, a British official statement announced this afternoon. The German position in the Somme region had been defended by the Brandenburg Regiment, which was driven out.

GERMANS DRIVEN OUT. The text of the British official statement follows: "After severe fighting we have driven the Fifth Brandenberg division from their remaining positions in Delville wood, capturing three officers and 158 men.

COUNTER-ATTACKS FAIL. "The whole wood now is in our hands, and two German counter-attacks have been beaten off with heavy loss to the enemy.
"We made further progress in Longueval village and near Pozieres, and in the latter area we captured 48 wounded Germans. 'Last night the enemy guns were active against our new positions, and there were heavy artillery duels in various sectors of the battle FIGHTING AT NEUVE CHAPELLE.

"Near Neuve Chapelle small parties of Germans succeeded in entering our front trenches at two points, but at once were driven out by a counter-attack, leaving a few wounded in our hands. "Northeast of Souchez and at several other points our artillery shelled the enemy's front line and communication trenches."

Officials of International Company Declares Ottawa Controls Since War Began.

New York, July 28.—James L. Ashley, sales of nickel made by his company since the beginning of the war have been under the supervision and control of the Canadian Government. 





Desperate Fight Gives British Possession of German Second Line

PARIS, July 27.—The capture of the village of Pozieres from the Germans, military officers say, means that the British are in complete possession of the German second line in the Somme region. The fight for Pozieres lasted eleven days, from July 14 to July 25.

The place was defended by 200 machine guns of which all but 30 were destroyed or put out of action by the British artillery. A species of fort in the centre of the village was defended by a company of Bavarian infantry. These troops resisted for twelve hours and at the end of that time only four men were found alive. In a dugout close by a heap of 60 bodies remained unburied.

The last defenders of the village were the men of a Bavarian battalion were decimated as they crossed the 300 yards between the village and a cemetery where they made their last but unsuccessful stand.






