# FAMOUS SIEGES

Reducing Sebastopol.

WAS A WELL-WON VICTORY

Sieges Show the Evolution of the Art of War-They Are Shorter Than in the Earlier Ages.

In view of the critical condition of affairs at Port Arthur, which the army and navy of Japan are endeavoring to wrest from the control of Russia, it is interesting to look back a few decades and recall some of the contests of a similar character:

The siege that attracted most attention in the nineteenth century was that Sebastopol, in the Crimean war, 1854-5. It began in September of the former year, the besiegers being the French and English, with a small force of Turks, Sebastopol, by the Russians was accounted impregnable. THE ARABIA AT SHANGHAI 'art of Cargo Was Corfiscated and Ship Released.

Shanghai, Aug. 29. - The German

steamer Arabia, belonging to the Hamourg-American Line, has arrived here from Vladivostock. This is the vessel that was captured by the Russian Vladivostock squadron in July. A prize crew was put on board her, and she was taken to Vladivostock, where she arrived July 28. She was tried before prize court, which condemned 20,000 barrels of flour and 71 railroad carbodies. The remainder of the cargo and the vessel was released. The British steamer Calchas, from

Tacoma, for Japanese ports, which was arrested by the Vladivostock squadror 30 miles north of Tokio Bay last July was also taken into Vladivostock. The flour and lumber on board the Calchas was confiscated by the Russians without awaiting the action of the prize court. The Calchas is now at ladivostock with the balance of her cargo on board.

The Arabia brought also to Shang-

hai the captain and crew of the German steamer Thea, which was sunk by the Vladivostock fleet. The Russians made attempts to take the Thea into port. .The Arabia reports that there are few signs of war at Vladivostock. Viceroy Alexieff is there, and the town is full of officers and troops. The Rusian cruisers Gromoboi and Rossia ar-

rived from their engagement, Aug. 14, with Vice-Admiral Kamimura's fleet in a terribly damaged condition. The repairs to the Russian cruiser Bogatyr, which was damaged by running aground near Vladivostock, are nearly ompleted.



London, Tuesday, Aug. 30. was a fairly large attendance at the market here today. The market for a great bulk of the supply was confined to the smaller lines. Trade was on the quiet for this small stuff, but for the heavier lines there was a brisk demand. Prices were steady to

Some of the farmers say that they have found quite a rot in their potatoes, especially on heavy land. Grain-Oats, as usual, formed the bulk of the offerings in this line. There was a good demand. All of the loads offered were new oats. Sales were made mostly at \$1 per cwt for good stock; inferior oats sold at 95c per cwt. Wheat brought \$1 per bushel. Hay and Straw-There was 16 loads of hay offered, much of it was of poor quality. Sales were made at \$8 to \$8 50 Straw was wanted, but none was offered.


