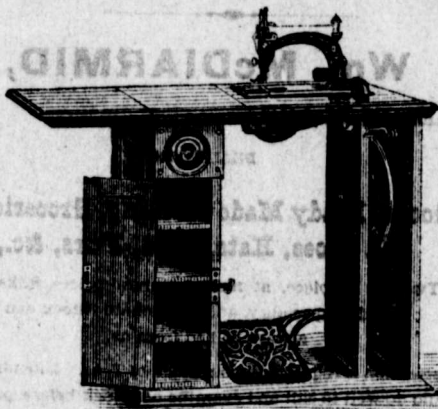

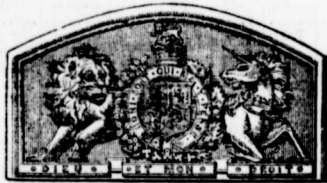

The Gregorian Calendar.

To restore the civil year to a correspondence with the astronomical, Gregory XIII, ordered that the 5th of October, 1582, should be called the 15th. To prevent the intrusion of the same errors in the measurement of time in future ages, and to secure the recurrence of the festivals of the church at the same period of the year, he further decreed that every year whose number is not divisible by four should consist of three hundred and sixty-five days; every year which is so divisible, but not divisible by one hundred, of three hundred and sixty-six days; every year divisible by one hundred, but not by four hundred, of three hundred and sixty-five; and every year divisible by four hundred, of three hundred and sixty-six. A more perfect correspondence of the civil and astronomical years will probably never be obtained. After the lapse of four thousand two hundred and thirty-seven years the error will be less than one day. In the preparation of this rule every source of disagreement is estimated, and as far as possible corrected. The allowance of an extra day every fourth year is indeed a small excess; but this is not allowed to accumulate, for at the commencement of every century the centennial year is not to consist of three hundred and sixty-six days, or in other words, is not to be counted a leap-year, unless its number can be divided by four hundred. Thus the year 1600 was a leap-year, and the year 2000 will be the same; but the years 1700 and 1800 contained, and the year 1900 will contain, only 365 days.

A Few Statistical Facts and Figures.

A legal stone is fourteen pounds in England, sixteen pounds in Holland. A fathom, six feet, is derived from the height of a full grown man. A hand, in horse measure, is four inches. An Irish mile is 2,240 yards; a Scotch mile is 1,984; a German, 1,806; a Turkish, 1,626. An acre is 1,840 square yards, 1 foot and $\frac{3}{4}$ inches, each way. A square mile, 1,760 yards each way, contains 640 acres. The human body consists of 240 bones, 9 kinds of articulations or joinings, 100 cartilages, or ligaments, 400 muscles or tendons, and 100 nerves, besides blood, arteries, veins, &c. Potatoes below three feet do not vegetate; at one foot they grow quickest, and at two feet they are retarded two or three months. There are no solid rocks in the Arctic regions, owing to the severe frosts. The surface of the sea is estimated at 150,000,000 square miles, taking the whole surface of the globe at 190,000,000 square miles. Its greatest depth is supposed to be equal to the height of the highest mountain, or four miles.

HOME MADE YEAST.—Take a handful of loose hops (a pinch only of pressed ones), and tie in a bit of muslin; boil twenty minutes in a quart of water; take them out and throw in four sliced potatoes, and boil till soft; strain all through a sieve, and add half a tea cup of salt, and the same of brown sugar; scald these and let it stand till lukewarm; add sufficient yeast to rise it. When quite light, or when it ceases to bubble up, put it in a jug or covered jar, set it in a cool place, and it will keep good a fortnight in hot weather, and a month or more in cold.

TO PRESERVE EGGS.—The most convenient and satisfactory way to keep eggs fresh that we have ever tried, is to punch numerous holes in a tin pail, fill it with fresh eggs, lower the pail with the eggs into a kettle of melted tallow, which is as hot as can be without burning one's fingers when thrust into the liquid; then lift the pail out quickly and the melted tallow will flow out, leaving a thin coating over the egg. Let the eggs be removed as soon as possible from the pail, and placed on the end of a keg or barrel, which should be kept in a cool cellar until wanted for use. As the eggs are so much colder than the melted tallow, a thin pelicle of cold tallow will be formed almost immediately, which will render the shell almost impervious to air.

CANE BOTTOMED CHAIRS.—To clean cane bottomed chairs, turn up the chair bottom, and with hot water and a sponge wash the canework well, so that it may become completely soaked. Should it be very dirty you must add soap. Let it dry in the open air, if possible, or in a place where there is a thorough draft, and it will become as light and firm as when new, providing that it has not been broken.

APPLE MARMALADE.—Peel and core two pounds of sub-acid apples, and put them in an enamelled saucepan with one pint of sweet cider, or half a pint of pure wine, and one pound of crushed sugar, and cook them by a gentle fire three hours or longer, until the fruit is very soft, and then squeeze it, first through a collander, and then through a sieve. If not sufficiently sweet add powdered sugar to suit your taste, and put away in jars made air-tight with a piece of wet bladder. It is delicious when eaten with cream or milk.
