### WOMEN'S AUXILIARY.

### THE WAR.

Again St. Alban's school flag has been raised in honor of British victories in South Africa, and on 13th March was perhaps the first in the Empire to mark the circumstance of Bloemfontein having become a British town, for the telegraphic reports were so indefinite that the fact was not generally so accepted until two days later. Those acquainted with the locality, however, understood the seizure of the railway station by General French, to be virtually the taking of the town, and when our flag was raised General Roberts had made his formal entry.
