The Power of Books.

Henry Ward Beecher, in a recent address on The Religious Literature needed for the Future," paid an eloquent tribute to the permanent power of books, in contrast with the power of

The unmartyrable books have great advantages over the frail living speaker, while the speaker, in enthusiasm and present power, has a great advantage over books. We need more of both. We need more preachers of the Gospel-professional and lay preachers; but we need more than we ever did before, the silent preaching of

Handel was also extremely passionate, and had o remarkable irratibility of nerve that he could never endure to hear the tuning of instruments, which process, therefore, was always completed before he arrived in the orchestra. A musical wag, who knew how to exact mirth from his irascibility of temper, stole into the orchestra on a night when the Prince of Wales was to be present at the performance of a new oratorio, and untuned all the instruments, some half a note, thers a whole note lower than the organ. As soon as the Prince arrived, Handel gave the signal of beginning con spiritio, but such was the kettle-drum, which he threw with such violence at the leader of the band, that he lost his fullbottomed wig by the effort. Without waiting to replace it, he advanced bareheaded to the front of the orchestra breathing vengeance, but so much choked with passion that utterance was denied him. In this ridiculous attitude he stood staring and stamping for some minutes, amid a convulsion of laughter, nor could he be prevailed on to resume his seat, till the Prince went personally to appease his wrath, which he with great difficulty accomplished. The trick, although productive of amusement to the perpetrators, was a cruel piece of heartlessness, and any one who could so sport with feelings so wrought to the highest pitch of intensity, with an author who had so much at stake, merited the unbounded reprobation of every amiable and sympathis-


